

# **Public Hearing on Sidewalk Construction**

The Town Council will hold a public hearing on Monday, October 21, to receive citizen input on plans for sidewalk construction at nine locations around town. The hearing will be part of the regular Council meeting, which begins at 8 p.m. at Town Hall.

Sidewalks are proposed for the following streets:

- Tapawingo Road from Frederick Street to the W&OD Trail:
- Church Street from Glyndon Street to Beulah Road;
- Moore Avenue from Cottage Street to Ninovan Road;
- Glyndon Street from Glyndon Park to Maple Avenue;
- Plum Street from Courthouse Road to Cottage Street;
- Creek Crossing Road from East Street to Fairway Drive;
- Pleasant Street from Courthouse Road to Maple Avenue;

TOWN HALL WILL BE CLOSED ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 14, FOR CO-LUMBUS DAY. TRASH WILL BE COLLECTED AS USUAL.

- Nutley Street from Maple Avenue to the Town property yard; and
- Jiffy Lube property from Maple Avenue to the existing bus

These locations were recommended by the Pedestrian Task Force, a group appointed by Council in 1989 to study pedestrian needs in Vienna. The estimated cost for the sidewalks, on one side of the street only, is \$224,280, which would come from the \$235,-000 allocated for sidewalk construction in the Town's Capital Improvements Program.

The 45th annual Vienna Halloween Parade will step off at 7 p.m. Wednesday, October 23. Please note that this date is different from that shown in the 1991 Town Calendar. # Fall Leaf Collection Begins This Month

Fall leaf collection will begin on October 28 in north Vienna and the first week of November on the south side of town. See page 6 for the complete schedule.

Department of Public Works crews using leaf vacuum machines will collect leaves raked to the curbside. Leaves placed in plastic bags are picked up on trash collection days (limit 10 bags per collection).

Please rake leaves just to the curbside, not into the street. Cars parked on leaf piles may catch on fire, and children playing in the

leaves may be struck by a passing vehicle. In addition, leaves may prevent rainwater from reaching storm water inlets.

Residents are reminded that household trash must be placed at the curbside by 7 a.m. on collection day and the empty trash cans removed as soon as possible after pickup.


Trash should not be placed at the curbside until the night before a scheduled pickup. Please make sure trash cans are tightly covered to keep down odors and deter animals.

# Vienna's Beauty Is Source of Pride

The citizens of the Town of Vienna can be proud of the appearance of their town: most homeowners try to keep their yards shipshape; many businesses have planted flowers and shrubs; and the garden clubs have beautification projects in the commercial area that certainly add to the overall appearance.

Your Town government also values an attractive community. Vienna's Landscape Horticulturist Mark Allen and Gardener's Assistant Billy Penny have done an outstanding job of landscaping on Town-owned properties, in the median strips on Maple Avenue and Nutley Street, and along the W&OD Trail.

In the spring, with all the flowers and flowering trees and shrubs, the town is beautiful. In the fall, all the trees put on a display of color that is equal to or better than what can be seen on the Skyline Drive. And at Christmas time, the many decorated homes and businesses are a real delight.

But we can always improve on anything. Here are a few suggestions for simple ways to further improve the appearance of our town:

In the summer and fall, sidewalks and streets are unsightly because of the grass that grows up through the cracks in the sidewalk, between the sidewalk and the street, and in the cracks in the asphalt on the street. The Town government simply does not have enough personnel to maintain these areas in the manner it would like, and so we request that individual citizens control the grass and weeds next to their property.

I regularly pull the grass and weeds from the cracks in the curb and in the road abutting my property when I am cleaning up the brick walkway along the driveway. An early start each year when the weeds first appear keeps the maintenance easy.

I get many calls from citizens about shrubs and trees encroaching on the sidewalks to the extent that the sidewalks cannot be used. More and more citizens are walking today - to work (particularly to Metro), for pleasure and for their health. When bushes extend across the sidewalk or tree branches are so low a person can't walk under them, then pedestrians must walk in the street, which, of course, is not safe. Another problem surfaces at this time of year when fruit, nuts and berries from the trees litter the sidewalks and make them very unsafe.

Again, the Town does not have the personnel to take care of this problem. On the few occasions when a Town employee has been directed to trim tree branches that were scraping cars or were too close to the sidewalk, some property owners have become angry; however, Chapter 16, Article 4, Sections 16:25-28 of the Town

Code holds property owners responsible for trimming what is necessary to keep sidewalks free of any encroachments from their property. Let's all make sure we are not guilty of forcing pedestrians into the street when they walk.

Finally, litter along our streets, in residential neighborhoods as well as in the commercial area, is an eyesore that spoils Vienna's beauty. To help keep the problem under control, citizens are asked to pick up litter around their homes and businesses. And, of course, we should not be guilty of contributing to the litter problem by tossing food wrappers, cans, bottles and other trash from our cars.



# **YIMBY Promotes Yard Debris Reduction**

Fairfax County has launched a new program to reduce the amount of yard debris entering the County waste stream called YIMBY (Yes In My Back Yard!). The goal of the YIMBY program is to educate residents through seminars and literature on how to reduce yard debris (grass, leaves and brush). The program teaches citizens to view yard debris as a resource rather than as waste.

The YIMBY program promotes back yard composting; mulching of grass clippings, leaves and brush; landscaping alteration; and "grasscycling" - leaving grass clippings on the lawn. When fully implemented, it is estimated that this new source reduction can divert over 20,000 tons of leaves, grass and brush from the waste stream in Fairfax County.

The County Department of Public Works will hold a YIMBY symposium at 10 a.m. Saturday, October 5, at Fairfax High School, 3500 Old Lee Hwy. in Fairfax. Those attending may enter a drawing for a free backyard compost bin. For more information, call the County's Recycling Hotline, 246-5052.

#### FREE COMPOSTING SEMINARS

The County Department of Public Works and Department of Extension and Continuing Education will co-sponsor a backyard composting seminar from 10 to 11:30 a.m. Saturday, October 19, at Meadowlark Gardens Regional Park, 1624 Beulah Rd. just outside Vienna.

The seminar will teach participants how to develop and manage a backyard compost pile. Samples of commercial composting bins will be on display.

The program is free, but space is limited and registration is required. Call 324-5326. Composting seminars will also be held October 26 in Annandale and November 9 in Centreville.

Composting is easy and inexpensive and conserves valuable landfill space. Backyard composting can be as simple as putting all vegetative waste into a shallow depression in the ground or as complex as building or purchasing a compost bin.

Composting is a natural process that converts organic kitchen, garden and yard waste into an additive to enrich soil. If you have a lawn, trees, shrubs, or even planter boxes, you have a use for compost. For general information on composting, call the County Recycling Hotline, 246-5052.
