



# Careless Use by Public Threatens Vienna's Cardboard Recycling

The Town has been warned by Metro Recyclers, the company that services the recycling facility at the Vienna Community Center, that the containers for cardboard may be removed unless the public uses them more responsibly.

In a letter to Public Works Director John Stockton, Metro Recyclers President Jim Murphy stated that many people "are content with leaving their droppings outside of the containers rather than flattening the boxes and putting them inside." Murphy said his company is losing money on its contract with the Town because of the added cost required to clean up "materials strewn throughout the

parking area . . . even though the containers were not full."

Metro Recyclers' profits are designed to come from the sale of collected recyclables. Its services cost the Town nothing, while saving a significant amount in landfill fees. Citizens are urged to recycle responsibly so that this benefit will not be lost.

- Reinstated parking on the north side of Church Street be tween Lawyers Road and the entrance to the Post Office parking lot. The three spaces adjacent to the parking lot driveway will be unrestricted parking and the remaining spaces limited to 30-minute parking.
- Approved a temporary free-standing sign containing the names of all the businesses at each of the two separate locations of the Vienna Shopping Center. The signs are to be placed adjacent to Maple Avenue for a period not to exceed six months and are to be considered semi-public in nature due to

the renovation of the shopping center. Requested the Town Attornev to draft an amendment to the zoning ordinance to provide for temporary signs during renovation in shopping centers.

- Approved a site plan modification for Guarantee Shoe Repair, 131 Church St., N.W., for a reduction in width of the driveway entrance. The Director of Public Works is to delineate the edges of the driveway as it lines up with the edges of the curb and delineate the entrance of the driveway with painted stripes.
- Reduced the cash bond for public improvements for Beulah Heights Subdivision, 410 Druid Hill Rd., N.E., from \$51,393 to \$25,000, as the improvements have been installed according to plan.
- Approved the landscape plan for Vienna Camera, 109 Mill St., N.E.
- Approved the Town's application for a litter control and recycling grant from the Virginia Department of Waste Management.
- Authorized the Town Manager and Town Attorney to negotiate the necessary agreements with Fairfax County and the federal government to provide Section 8 home repair for the elderly and home improvement loans. Arrangements are to be approved by Council prior to implementation.
- Adopted amendments to the motor vehicle code to bring it into conformance with state law.
- Established a new section of the Town Code regarding punishment for conviction of a misdemeanor.

The Extension Department recommends leaving firewood outdoors and bringing it in only as needed. Insecticides should never be used on firewood because of the hazardous fumes they may produce when burned.

### Watch Your Ash!

Every year, hundreds of thousands of dollars in damage occurs and dozens of families are displaced because of fire in their homes caused by the improper disposal of fireplace ashes. Fireplace and wood stove ashes retain enough heat to ignite other combustible materials for several days after a fire.

Learn the proper way to dispose of fireplace and wood stove ashes:

- Do not throw ashes into a kitchen trash can with other combustibles, a cardboard box or a paper bag.
- Do put ashes into a noncombustible metal container.
- Do pour water into the container to make sure the ashes are out.
- Do keep the can outside the home, away from combustibles.



Jars and/or bottles, provided they are rinsed clean and separated in three color categories of green, brown and clear. Lids and caps should be removed, while labels and ring tops should not be removed.

CANS

Tin and aluminum food and beverage cans, provided labels are removed and cans are rinsed thoroughly. Aluminum foil and aluminum pie pans, provided they are clean and free of food. Aerosol cans are also acceptable. Do not attempt to clean aerosol cans.

**PLASTICS** 

Plastic milk jugs, two-liter soda bottles, plastic liquor bottles and laundry detergent bottles, provided caps are removed from all bottles and they are thoroughly rinsed and flattened.

CARD-BOARD Box board and brown bags, provided they are flattened, dry, and all linings removed. Cereal boxes, shoe boxes, noodle boxes, soap boxes, and egg cartons.

## Flu/Pneumonia Vaccinations Offered

The season for flu and pneumonia is approaching. The Fairfax County Health Department is offering special clinics for those at high risk from these illnesses, including senior citizens, adults and children with chronic disorders who require regular medical care, and residents of nursing homes.

Those at risk for flu should be vaccinated every year to protect them against new strains of the virus and maintain high levels of immunity. Those at risk for pneumonia should only receive the

vaccine once.

Anyone requesting either vaccine should have a physician's approval; those under 65 must have a written physician's order. Anyone under 18 must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. The pneumococcal vaccine is not recommended for pregnant women or children under two years old.

There is a minimal charge for the vaccines. To make an appointment, call the Health Department's district office at 246-7100.
