#### **Leaf Collection Ending**



# TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

#### **SEPTEMBER 23, 1991**

- Held an executive session to consider appointments to the Board of Zoning Appeals.
- Rejected all bids for the new police station and directed that the project be re-bid with the firing range as an alternate to the base bid. The contractor must install ventilation equipment warranted to meet federal and state air quality standards both inside and outside the building. Before the firing range is accepted, an independent testing agency will examine the equipment while the range is in use to ensure that all standards are met.
- Awarded the bid for a tub grinder for leaves and brush to Virginia Public Works Co. at a cost of \$69,184.60 on a five-year lease/purchase basis.
- Adopted amendments to the erosion and siltation control ordinance.
- Directed the Town Attorney to draft an ordinance to

expand the Board of Zoning Appeals to seven members as permitted under state law. The Planning Commission is requested to proceed with its public hearing on the matter as quickly as possible so that all appointments may be made simultaneously and the Board brought up to its full membership.

#### OCTOBER 21, 1991

- Following a public hearing on proposed sidewalk construction projects, agreed to review them at a future work session after receiving a report from the Town's consulting engineers on the projects.
- Authorized an engineering study to develop stream improvements behind Vienna Aquatic Club between Ware and Nutley Streets, at a cost not to exceed \$13,460.
- Authorized the Town Attorney to send a draft agreement for Town participation in the Section 8 federal housing grant pro-

gram to the appropriate county and federal agencies for their review and approval.

- Approved a proposal by Tri-Tek Engineering to develop plans and specifications for an underground tank leak detection system at a cost not to exceed
- Increased the contract with Newton Asphalt Co. to a maximum amount of \$180,400, with the unit prices for asphalt milling and overlay to remain as listed in the original bid.
- Awarded a bid for Bear Branch channel improvements to R.L. Rider & Co. of Warrenton at a price of \$88,670.
- Awarded a bid for leaf collection services to Delmar of Falls Church at a low hourly rate of \$90 and a total contract amount not to exceed \$29,800.
- Awarded a bid for utility locating services to Byers Engineering Co. at a contract price not to exceed \$25,000 and in accordance with the bid unit prices.

#### Public Hearing Dec. 16

At its December 16 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on proposed amendments to the subdivision ordinance as required by the Virginia Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in Town Hall. The intent of the changes is to specify the conditions under which subdivision of parcels wholly or partially located in the designated Resource Protection Area may occur.

#### Redskins/Casino Trip

#### Volleyball Leagues Forming

## **W&OD** Friends Invite Your Support

The Friends of the W&OD Trail invite Vienna residents to join in funding projects to protect and improve the trail, making it safer and more enjoyable for all users.

Use of the W&OD Trail has increased dramatically over the years, as a growing population enjoys sports, fitness and recreation activities along a 45-mile greenway free of automobiles. Yet for all of its beauty and popularity, the W&OD is under siege from encroachment by new roads, utility crossings, and residential and commercial development. One of the major projects of the Friends of the W&OD Trail is to purchase easements and land adjoining the trail to provide buffer zones against encroachment and development as well as creating or improving connections to other area trails, parks,

schools, libraries, mass transit and other community facilities.

Money raised by Friends of the W&OD Trail is directed to the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority, owner of the W&OD, earmarked solely for trail improvements. Projects are chosen based on environmental impact, benefit to trail users, and cost. The group's first project is the trail overpass at West Broad Street in Falls Church.

Individual gifts and corporate contributions are welcomed; major donors are recognized with plaques along the trail and other expressions of appreciation. Volunteer workers are also needed.

## **Pearl Harbor Remembered**

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor - December 7, 1941 - which resulted in the entry of the United States into World War II, local resident Robert J. Winklareth will host a slide presentation at the Vienna Community Center on Saturday, December 7, from 3 to 4:30 p.m. Admission is free.

This slide presentation will cover the events leading up to the attack, details of the attack itself, and the actions taken to restore many warships damaged in the raid to operational service. A wealth of photographic material is supplemented with narrative text and maps to provide a complete story of this historic and tragic event.

Robert J. Winklareth's hobbies are photography and organizing slide programs on a variety of topics. After serving in the Army during World War II, he received an engineering degree from Stevens Institute of Technology in Hoboken, N.J., and began a 33-year career as a logistics engineer in the Department of the Army. He is now employed by the Analytic Sciences Corporation and providing support for the U.S. Strategic Defense Initiative.

Certification must be provided that the animal has been vaccinated against rabies and, for a \$5.00 license, neutered by a veterinarian or is infertile. Your certificate(s) will be returned with the tag.

Vienna is your Town! Your elected representatives are committed to reflect your wishes and desires in keeping Vienna a Town we can all be proud of and a wonderful place in which to live. Our task is made easier when we hear from you - in person, by letter, phone, attendance at Council meetings, and by your active participation in Town government itself, either through the elective process or service on boards or commissions.

A key to effective Town government is the work of Vienna's boards and commissions. Dedicated citizens of the Town volunteer their time, energy and expertise to assist the Town Council, Town Manager and staff in conducting and guiding Town affairs. Membership on Vienna's boards and commissions provides citizens the opportunity to become actively involved in current Town affairs and the direction the Town will take in the future. The following is a summary of the functions of the Town's boards and commissions:

Planning Commission approves preliminary plats of subdivisions, prepares the Comprehensive Plan for the future development of the town, hears and makes recommendations to Council on rezoning requests and other planning and zoning matters. Meets the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month.

Board of Zoning Appeals - a semi-judicial body, the members of which are recommended by Council to the Fairfax County Circuit Court for appointment. The Board is authorized to hear and decide appeals of any decision made by the Director of Planning and Zoning, grant variances from the zoning code, approve conditional use permits, and interpret the

zoning map. Meets the third Wednesday of each month.


Board of Architectural
Review - examines and approves
plans for commercial buildings,
signs and landscaping to ensure
that new construction is not bizarre
or garish and is harmonious and
compatible with existing buildings.
The Board is concerned primarily
with the appearance and aesthetic
features in commercial construction, but also considers any construction in residential zones other
than single-family housing. Meets
the third Thursday of each month.

Transportation Safety
Commission - studies intersections,
traffic signs, speed limits and other
matters relating to street safety and
makes recommendations to Council. Meets the last Tuesday of each
month.

Windover Heights Board of Review - approves new construction and major exterior alterations of buildings within the Windover Heights Historic District in northwest Vienna to ensure that they are in keeping with the old and historic architectural aspect of the surroundings. Citizen members of the Board must reside within the historic district. Meets the first Tuesday of the month when there is an application before the Board.

Town/Business Liaison
Committee - makes studies and
offers recommendations to Council
on matters affecting the town's
businesses and their relationship
with other segments of the community. Both commercial and residential interests are represented on the
Committee. Meets the second
Thursday of each month.

tact an elected official or member of the Town staff. There are many talented and dedicated citizens in the Town. The numerous successful and needed volunteer organizations and activities in the Town attest to this. Please share that talent and become an active participant in maintaining and improving our Town by serving on a board or commission.

Citizens are encouraged to attend Town Council meetings, board and commission meetings, and public hearings and express their views. All these meetings are open to the public, and citizens' comments and recommendations are welcomed and encouraged.

Public hearings are held by the Town Council on proposed amendments to the Town Code, changes in land use or zoning, the annual budget and taxes, and other matters of importance. The Planning Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals also conduct public hearings on matters relating to their functions. Many public hearings are announced in the Vienna Newsletter, and all official hearings are advertised through legal notices in local newspapers.

Council and board and commission agendas are recorded on the Vienna Newsline, 255-6333, before each meeting. The Town newsletter and Town calendar, which are mailed to every household and business in Vienna, list the regular meeting dates of Council and the boards and commissions.

# Town Is Well Prepared for Snow

The Town of Vienna is famous for its efficient snow removal. Department of Public Works crews begin sanding and salting operations immediately at the onset of snow and ice. Plowing begins when snow has accumulated two inches or more, with the primary streets listed below receiving top priority:

Maple Avenue Nutley Street Park Street Center Street Kingsley Road (Park to Nutley) Courthouse Road Locust Street Lawyers Road Malcolm Road Old Courthouse Road John Marshall Drive (Glyndon to Beulah) Creek Crossing Road Cottage Street Church Street Tapawingo Road (Park to Nutley) Follin Lane

Branch Road

Beulah Road

Cherry Street Electric Avenue

Once these streets are passable, snowplows can then move into residential subdivisions following established routes. If the primaries require salting/sanding/plowing again after one pass, this will be done before going to the secondary streets.

Snow emergency routes within the town are marked by signs. No parking is allowed on these main streets during snows so that plows can do a more efficient job. Vehicles must have chains or snow tires during snow emergencies

Residents who are physically able are requested to clear snow from the sidewalks next to their property for the safety of pedestrians, especially schoolchildren. Residents who are interested in hiring a youngster to shovel can call the Department of Parks and Recreation's Odd Job Bank at 255-6360. Youngsters can sign up at the Vienna Community Center for snow shoveling and other odd jobs.

## **Employees Earn Safety Award**

The Town's Water and Sewer Division employees have received the Silver Performance Award from the American Water Works Association (AWWA) for reducing their disabling injury rate by 50% over the last three years.

The award recognizes the importance of providing a safe work environment for employees as well as the savings to taxpayers in disability claims and time lost off the job due to injuries.

The drop in injuries in the Water and Sewer Division is due largely to the Town's implementation of a formal safety program and a commitment by employees to make it work. Many of the pro-

gram's features were suggested by the employees themselves and include the creation of an employee committee to address safety concerns, regular viewing of safety training videos, and an awards program for employees who work injury-free.
