

Public Hearing Scheduled for June 15 On Historic District Amendments

The Town Council will hold a public hearing at its June 15 meeting on proposed amendments to the Windover Heights Historic District ordinance. The meeting begins at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

Under the proposed ordinance, the members of the Town's Board of Architectural Review would serve as the Windover Heights Board of Review. Other provisions of the proposed ordinance outline the procedures under which the new review board would function and specify instances when a

Curbside Recycling Comments Invited

Citizens are reminded that the Town Council's public hearing on a proposal for curbside recycling in Vienna is scheduled for the June 1 meeting, which begins at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

If approved, regular trash and grass would be picked up on the first collection day of the week; newspapers, brush, grass, plastic bottles, glass jars and bottles, metal food and beverage cans, and aluminum foil would be picked up on the second collection day. Cardboard would continue to be collected at the Vienna Community Center initially.

Certificate of Appropriateness would or would not be required.

Council suspended the Windover Heights Board last year after receiving petitions from about half of the historic district residents to remove their properties from the district. Since then, the historic district ordinance has been revised in an attempt to address the residents' concerns about the operation of the review board and the standards used in granting Certificates of Appropriateness.

The Windover Heights Historic District in northwest Vienna is one of the town's original residential neighborhoods, which has changed little since the turn of the century. Many of the homes there contain distinctive architectural features, were the sites of significant events in the town's history, or belonged to prominent citizens. Residents of the district must obtain a Certificate of Appropriateness prior to construction or major alteration of buildings to ensure that it is in keeping with the old and historic character of the area.

Political Signs Require a Permit

During this election year, candidates and their supporters should be aware of the Town's regulations pertaining to political signs:

- Five temporary signs not exceeding 20 square feet total may be posted on residential property after receiving a permit and posting of a \$25 bond. Signs may be erected up to 30 days prior to election day and must be removed within five days after the election.
- It is unlawful to place signs on street lights, telephone poles, markers or other signs, or to place a sign without a permit within 10 feet of the curb or edge of pavement.

A Union Soldier's View Of Vienna in 1863

June 17 is the 131st anniversary of the Civil War "Battle of Vienna," which took place near the Park Street railroad crossing where the Vienna Community Center now stands. The ambush of Union Brig. Gen. Robert Schenck's men by Confederate forces marked the first time in history a railroad was used tactically in battle.

Connie Pendleton Stuntz, co-author of *This Was Vienna*, *Virginia*, shares the following 1863 wartime description of Vienna and the Freeman House at 131 Church St., N.E., which was recently discovered in the unpublished manuscript of Charles A. Currier, a former Captain in the 40th Massachusetts Infantry Volunteers. Currier's unit was encamped at Hunter's Chapel (near the Arlington Army-Navy Club) when the call came to "move out" toward Vienna

"On the night of March 30th, the Brigade was turned out in heavy

marching order and moved over execrably bad roads, a distance of thirteen miles, to Vienna, the place made famous by the enemy in the early part of the war, who there drew Gen. Schenck's forces into an ambuscade and slaughtered a large number of them. We arrived there at four o'clock the next morning, cold, tired and wet, having forded what seemed in the darkness, to be several small rivers (the two branches of Wolf Trap?). As we emerged from the last one, the guns of a Union Battery which commanded the ford, were trained upon us, by its frightened commander, who mistook us for rebels and except for the coolness of one of our guides, would have blazed away. A severe snow storm came on soon after our arrival, which rendered our condition still more uncomfortable, as the mud and snow became half leg deep. With great difficulty, fires were started, over which the men hovered till day break, when a hunt for quarters commenced. Our company found shelter in the former principal hotel of the place (Freeman House) which after the war commenced, served the enemy as a hospital. It was filthy to the last degree, and the effects of war were apparent in everything connected with it, as was the case with all the other buildings in the town. Corps. Charles O.C. Smith was here taken violently ill. We cared for him as best we could until the 4th of April when he was removed to Mt. Pleasant Hospital, Washington, where he died 18th inst. of spotted fever. This was the first death in G Co. On the 5th inst. we drew our first shelter tents and pitched camp in the midst of a driving snow storm. The sudden change from comfortable winter quarters, to the cold wet ground sent many of the men to the surgeon, who at once ordered a liberal daily ration of whiskey for the command. After picketing this deserted village until the 10th inst. tents were struck and the command returned to Hunters Chapel, not having had the satisfaction of seeing a 'Johnny' in arms or of confiscating any property, beyond a small quantity of provisions secreted in the front vard of a house which served as a refuge to Mosby's men when in that vicinity."

Residents Reminded of Yard Sale Rules

With the summer months approaching, the Town would like to remind residents of the Town Code provisions governing yard/garage sales:

- Each residence and/or family household may conduct no more than two sales during any calendar year. No permit is required.
- Each sale must be conducted during daylight hours for no more than two consecutive days or two consecutive weekends (Saturday and Sunday).
- Two signs of not more than four square feet each are permitted on the property where the sale is being conducted.
- Two directional signs of not more than two square feet each are permitted, provided that the property

- where the sale is conducted is not on a major thoroughfare and provided permission is received from the owners of the property where the signs are to be placed.
- No sign may be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the
- Signs must be removed each day at the close of garage sale activities or at dark, whichever comes first.
- Signs are not allowed in Town right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement) or on utility poles.

These systems include standpipes for firefighters, automatic sprinklers, and heat and smoke detectors that provide early warning to evacuate in case of fire. If you can't reserve accommodations with complete safety systems, buy and use a travel smoke detector. Lowcost portable smoke detectors are available with hook-mounts that fit easily over hotel/motel doors.

When you check into your hotel or motel, identify the locations of two fire exits nearest to your room. Count the number of doors between your door and the exit and memorize which side of the hall it is on. That memory could save your life if you need to escape through dense smoke.

When the building alarm (or your

travel smoke detector) sounds, roll onto the floor and crawl to the door, grabbing your keys on the way. (You may need them if smoke drives you back into your room.) Feel the door for heat before you open it; if it is cool, open it carefully, check the hallway for smoke, and head for the nearest exit. Never use the elevator.

If you must stay in your room, block the doorjamb and heating/air conditioning outlets with moist towels. Try the telephone; if it works, call the desk or the fire department and give them your name, location and situation. Do not consider jumping from a room higher than the second floor. For visibility, place a sheet out of your window or off your balcony.

When you are familiar with your surroundings and know how to act in the event of a fire, you stand an excellent chance of surviving a fire emergency. For more information on safe traveling, call the Fire and Rescue Department's Public Affairs Section at 246-3366.
