Cottage Street Reconstruction Approved

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has notified the Town that the Cottage Street reconstruction project has been approved by the Commonwealth Transportation Board and will be included in VDOT's urban construction program. Surveying for the project should begin soon, with construction tentatively scheduled for

The State project will include the reconstruction of Cottage Street from Locust Street to Moore Avenue at its current width of 36 feet. As part of the urban construction program, 98% of the funding for the project will come from the State and 2% from the Town. VDOT estimates the total project cost at \$3,670,000, making the Town's share \$72,000.

The last two blocks of Cottage Street, from Locust Street to the back of the Vienna Shopping Center, will also be reconstructed, either with Town funds or a combination of Town and State funds.

The Town Council requested VDOT to include Cottage Street in its urban construction program following a public hearing last February, when many citizens expressed concern about

the deteriorating condition of the street. Soil tests have shown that the subsoil structure is inadequate, and that the street needs to be undercut and filled. In addition, the street has been overlaid with asphalt so many times that there is virtually no curb left to handle storm water runoff. When completed, the project should extend the life of Cottage Street for another 30 years.

Disabled Citizens Asked to Participate In Review of Government Accessibility

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) mandates the removal of any discriminatory treatment against the 43 million Americans who have physical or mental disabilities. This law will have a profound effect on the operations of the Town of Vienna and other municipal governments across the country.

The ADA requires Vienna to review its facilities, programs and publications to determine if they are readily accessible to all disabled members of our community. If they are not, action plans must be developed to overcome any obstacles. In order to accomplish this, the Town is requesting disabled citizens to make their needs known and to participate in all steps of the review process. - Development of a policy statement, including accommodation request, complaint and grievance procedures, for adoption by the Town Council. Proposed completion date: November 1, 1992.
- Physical accessibility of Town facilities. Proposed completion dates: January 26, 1993, identification of improvements to be submitted for next fiscal year's budget; January 26, 1995, all structural changes made.
- Program accessibility for parks and recreation activities and other Town-sponsored events. Completion date: January 26, 1993.
- Communications, including provision of interpretive services on request, telecommunications adaptations, publications and meeting agendas. Completion date: As soon as possible.

The Town has already amended its hiring policy to comply with the ADA.



Recycle Unwanted Vehicles and Get A Tax Deduction

Vienna residents can recycle unwanted vehicles by donating them to the National Kidney Foundation. Call (202) 337-6600 to request a postagepaid envelope. Return the envelope with a signed vehicle title and completed odometer statement plus evidence of payment if any liens are listed on the title. Within two weeks a towing company will contact the donor and arrange to pick up the vehicle free of charge.

After the Kidney Foundation receives the title, it will mail the donor a contribution acknowledgement receipt, which entitles the donor to take a charitable deduction on income tax returns based on the vehicle's current fair market value.

Donated vehicles are auctioned and proceeds are used for medical research, organ donor programs, public education and patient services.

Council Adopts Trash Regulations

The Town Council has adopted several revisions to the trash collection regulations. The new provisions:

- 1. Set definite times when residents <u>cannot</u> place their refuse at the curb;
- 2. Give definite directions for the placement of special pickup items at the curb; and
- 3. Outline the time frame in which residents are to call for a special pickup and the procedure that will be followed in the event a resident does not call within the allotted time.

According to the new regulations, trash must be placed at the curbline by 7 a.m. on pickup day but not earlier than 6 p.m. the preceding evening. All trash cans must be removed from the curbline as soon as possible after trash pickup and by 7 p.m. the same evening as collection.

Items set out for a special pickup must be placed at the edge of the pavement on the front of the property. Discards must not be placed so that they block the sidewalk or street, and must not be placed around trees, poles, signs, fences, or other obstructions.

Residents must call for a special pickup within seven calendar days after placing discards at the curb. Otherwise, they will be notified that they have 48 hours in which to call for a special pickup. If a resident does not call within 48 hours after receiving the notice, the debris will be collected within 10 working days and the resident charged for the appropriate number of special pickups.
