# **Curbside Recycling Begins This Month**

Collection Days Will Change for Some Residents

Beginning January 2, curbside collection of recyclable materials will be provided to all Vienna residents currently served by Town refuse collection. The program will be a bag based collection similar to bagged trash collection.

The FIRST COLLECTION DAY each week will be for the collection of TRASH only.

The SECOND COLLECTION DAY will be for the collection of ALL RECYCLABLE MATERIALS only.


Trash and recyclables will be collected according to the following schedule:

- Residences north of Maple Avenue Monday trash/Thursday recyclables;
- Residences south of Maple Avenue and east of Cottage Street Tuesday trash/Friday recyclables;
- Residences south of Maple Avenue and west of Cottage Street Wednesday trash/Saturday recyclables.

The following recyclable materials will be picked up on the second collection day each week:

#### MIXED MATERIALS:

GLASS bottles and jars, all colors PLASTIC bottles and jugs METAL food and beverage cans ALUMINUM foil and plates



Mixed materials should be placed TOGETHER in a transparent plastic bag. Any transparent bag may be used, including the blue recycling bags sold by Glad and Hefty, transparent or semi-transparent grocery bags distributed by food stores, and clear plastic bags of any generic make. They need only be strong enough to hold the materials and sufficiently transparent so that collection crews can ensure the bag contains recyclables and not trash.

#### NEWSPAPERS: must be separated

from the mixed materials and tied in bundles or placed in paper, not plastic, bags. YARD DEBRIS: tree trimmings and other brush with a diameter of less than 1½" inches should be bound or bagged in small bundles no longer than four feet. Leaves and grass clippings should be bagged.

Cardboard will not be picked up at curbside initially, but may be dropped off in the recycling bins at the Vienna Community Center. This recycling center, which is now funded and operated by Fairfax County, will continue to collect the full range of recyclables.

# **Town Council Action**

#### NOVEMBER 2, 1992

- Continued an executive session on potential litigation concerning unauthorized removal of trees from Town right-of-way along Windover Avenue.
- Concluded the public hearing on an application to rezone property in the 100 block of Nutley Street, S.W., from RS-16, single-family residential, to RTH, townhouses. Authorized Tri-Tek Engineering to conduct a hydrology study of the area, at a cost not to exceed \$5,570, and report back to Council on December 21 or sooner if possible.
- Concurred with the Virginia Department of Transportation's designations of Town streets in its Functional Classification Map, with the addition of the last block of Cottage Street, from Locust Street to its north terminus, as a minor arterial.
- Approved the final plat of the resubdivision of the property at 537 Beulah Rd., N.E. Waived public improvements and on-site storm water detention. Funds for public improvements are to be placed in escrow.

• Awarded a bid for janitorial supplies to Monumental Paper Company of Baltimore, Maryland, and to Single Source of Washington, D.C., for an initial period of one year.

#### **NOVEMBER 16, 1992**

- Continued an executive session on potential litigation concerning unauthorized removal of trees from Town right-of-way along Windover Avenue.
- Forwarded to the Transportation Safety Commission for study and recommendations a citizen's suggestions for traffic signs at Windover Avenue and Lewis Street, N.W.
- Conducted a public hearing on an appeal by Little Caesars East, Inc., of a decision by the Board of Architectural Review.
- Awarded a bid for removal of fuel-contaminated soil at the Nutley Street property yard to Envirotech Mid-Atlantic at a price of \$6,020.
- Authorized the purchase of a 1993 Ford Aerostar van under State

contract to replace the 1982 Ford station wagon used by the Police Department's Community Service Division at a cost of \$15,729.

• Directed the delinquent real estate tax list to be published and sent to the County Treasurer's Office to be recorded. Taxes that have been delinquent for three years will have liens recorded against them.

## Public Hearing On Bay Act Amendments

The Town Council will conduct a public hearing at its January 25 meeting on proposed amendments to the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act ordinance and area designation maps. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

These revisions would affect only the 91 properties within the 100-foot wide Resource Protection Area (RPA) along Wolf Trap Creek, and the 633 properties within the Resource Management Area (RMA) along creeks, streams and in floodplains.

The Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act will not slow growth. The development of any piece of property is still controlled by the zone in which it is situated, and the rebuilding, maintenance and repair of existing structures is permitted on residenitally zoned properties.

#### Dog Tag Deadline

1992 Town dog licenses expired on December 31, and all licenses must be renewed by January 31. The fee is \$10 for a fertile dog and \$5 for an infertile dog. Call 255-6323 for more information.

#### **Attention Businesses!**

Look for your 1993 business license tax form in the mail this month. All businesses in the Town of Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business licenses by March 1. The annual license tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. For more information, call 255-6321.

#### Christmas Tree Pickup

The Public Works Department will collect Christmas trees during the month of January. Trees should be placed at the curbside for pickup. They will be collected separately from trash and recyclables.

#### Mulch Available

The Public Works Department will deliver ground leaf mulch, ground wood mulch, or a combination of the two to town residents free of charge beginning in mid-January. The minimum order for each type of mulch is a dump truck load. To place your order and for more information, call the Public Works Department at 255-6382.

## Special Pickups to Resume January 4

The Town's special trash pickup program will resume on Monday, January 4. To dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, call the Public Works Department for a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording promptly at 255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information:

- Your name
- Your daytime phone number
- Your address
- Location of debris if different from your address
- Amount of debris
- Type of debris

Each residence is entitled to receive two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup. Additional pickups cost \$50 per load for all items except brush. The fee for brush is \$25 for one additional load, \$35 for the second additional load, and \$50 for each load thereafter.

#### SPECIAL PICKUP GUIDELINES

- Building materials wood, broken concrete, building brick and block, stones, fences, drywall and paneling will be picked up. Concrete is limited to 300 pounds per residence. Building materials generated by contractors and/or persons employed by homeowners to renovate, repair and/or perform maintenance on their homes will not be picked up.
- Sod, small stumps, brush, trees and limbs of no more than 1½ inches in diameter and 8 feet in length will be picked up. Please separate brush and branches from other discards. Leaves are not picked up by Special Pickup crews.
  - Discarded furniture, swing sets

and playground equipment will be picked up.


- Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal and small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires will be picked up. Tires must be removed from the rim. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.
- Two major appliances per residence will be picked up. These include stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces. Old heating oil tanks will not be picked up.
- Paint cans, fuel oil tanks and other hazardous wastes will not be picked up.
- Please separate brush, appliances, building materials, etc. from each other. This makes it easier for pickup crews to salvage recyclable items, reducing the amount of debris taken to the landfill.
- For the safety of Special Pickup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.
- Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.
- Please keep Special Pickup items away from regular trash and recyclables, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

# Call Promptly For Special Pickup

Residents are reminded to call the special pickup number as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a special pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard.

When an "illegal" pile of trash is spotted by Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a special pickup within 48 hours. Otherwise, the debris will be collected anyway and that address charged for one of its two annual free special pickups, or if both pickups have already been made, it will be charged \$50 for an additional pickup.

# Vienna Grows Through Town/County Boundary Adjustment



On January 1, Vienna will welcome about 300 new residents and four new businesses into town as the result of a boundary adjustment with Fairfax County. At the same time, several properties will be moved outside the town limits.

The changes affect six general areas, shown on the map. Of the 164 parcels involved, 146 that are wholly or partially in the county will come into Vienna while 18 parcels will go from town to county. Most of the property is residential.

Wolftrap Elementary School, James Madison High School and Freedom Hill Park will be located entirely in the county; Marshall Road Elementary, Peterson Lane Park and Northside Park will be entirely in town. McDonalds and Pizza Hut restaurants and Mobil and Shell stations, all located at the west end of Maple Avenue, will become Vienna businesses.

This boundary adjustment agreement was entered into by the Town Council and County Board of Supervisors last August after years of discussion between the two governments and affected citizens. Public hearings were held by each jurisdiction and a number of changes to the proposed new boundary were made in order to gather broad community support.

The selection of parcels for inclusion in Vienna was guided by several criteria, including elimination of bisected lots, better delivery of municipal services, and simplification of the boundary line.

# Town Moving Ahead with ADA Compliance Efforts

The Town is moving ahead with its program of compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The Act requires all public facilities and programs to be physically accessible to all citizens.

The Town Council recently adopted a grievance procedure to provide individuals with an avenue to resolve issues outlined in the ADA. A complaint of discrimination must be filed

within 180 days of the occurrence and must be acted on by the Town within 30 days of receipt. The procedure contains provisions for appeals to a Compliance Committee.

All public meetings and other events will now be made accessible on request to persons with disabilities. Translation services, assistance or accommodation requests should be made one working day before Town

Council meetings and three working days before other meetings and activities.

An evaluation of the Town Hall building has been completed, and recommendations for improving accessibility will be published in next month's *Vienna Newsletter*.

### Resolutions for a Fire-Safe New Year

Your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department wants everyone to make resolutions to ensure a home safe from fire this year.

- Resolve to test your smoke detector monthly using the method suggested in the manufacturer's instructions. Clean your smoke detector quarterly by gently vacuuming to remove dust and cobwebs and to allow proper air flow through the vents. Replace the battery in your smoke detector at least once a year. A good habit to form is to replace the battery in the fall when you change from daylight saving time to standard time.
- Resolve to develop a home escape plan, make sure family members and guests know the plan, and practice the plan so that everyone understands where to go and what to do in case of a fire. Your plan should include two ways out of every room and a designated meeting place outside the house, preferably in front. Another part of a good home fire safety plan is

to have and know how to use a fire extinguisher. A five-pound multipurpose dry chemical fire extinguisher that is rated for A, B and C fires is recommended.

- Resolve to have a family discussion on fire safety and to caution all family members, especially children, on the dangers fire presents. In particular, children must be taught that matches and cigarette lighters are not toys, and adults must make sure these items are kept in a safe place, out of the reach of curious hands.
- Resolve to call Fairfax County Fire and Rescue for a free home safety check to learn about the potential fire hazards in your home. These include flammable liquids, heating equipment, fireplace and wood stove ashes, electrical hazards, kitchen accidents, and smoking.
