Telephone books will be collected for recycling at the Maple Avenue Shopping Center (Giant Food) parking lot through March. A trailer has been provided for collection, and phone books should be stacked inside as neatly as possible. Only phone books are accepted.

Recyclable Newsletter

The Vienna Newsletter is now printed on recycled and recyclable white paper. Newsletters and other white paper may be brought to the blue bins behind Town Hall for recycling.

Vehicle Registration Begins March 15

1993 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals go on sale March 15 and must be displayed by midnight April 15. Decals may be purchased by mail or in person in the Finance Department at Town Hall. (Military personnel must apply in person only.)

Decals cost \$20 for passenger cars and trucks under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles.

Information for pre-printed application forms for 1993 decals was taken from 1992 records; therefore, if your

vehicle was not registered in Vienna last year, you will not automatically receive an application in the mail. Please call 255-6323 or visit the Finance Department to obtain forms.

Town of Vienna residents do not need to purchase Fairfax County vehicle decals, but they must pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. Personal property tax forms are available at Town Hall for the convenience of Vienna residents. For information, call the County Office of Assessments at 222-8234.

Are You Eligible to Vote on May 4?

Saturday, April 3, is the last day to register to vote in the May 4 Town election. A special voter registration for the convenience of Vienna residents will be conducted at Patrick Henry Library from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on April 3.

You may also register to vote at the following locations:

- All Fairfax County regional libraries during their regular operating hours;
- Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles at Tysons Corner, Mondays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.;
- DMV Express office at Fair Oaks Mall, Mondays and Thursdays from 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m.

To be eligible to vote in the Town election, you must be a Vienna resident, at least 18 years old by election day, and a U.S. citizen.

If you are already a registered voter, no additional registration is required for the Town election; however, you should check your voter registration card to be sure it lists your current address.

Absentee voting for the Town election will be conducted at the County General Registrar's Office, 12000 Government Center Pkwy., Suite 323, in Fairfax, April 3 and 24 and May 1 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Crabtree Honored



Mayor Charles Robinson recently presented a Resolution of Appreciation from the Town Council to Fred Crabtree on his retirement from the Fairfax County Park Authority after 24 years of service. During Crabtree's tenure, the Park Authority acquired and developed many hundreds of acres of land in Fairfax County for a wide variety of park and recreation purposes, including Oak Marr Recreation Center and Nottoway Park near Vienna, and Peterson Lane Park within the town limits. The Town Council also recognized Crabtree for his important role in the founding of Vienna Little League Baseball and his continuing contribution of time and talent to that organization.

Tax Relief for Elderly and Disabled

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for low-income homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. To qualify, the following requirements must be met:

- Total household income of \$30,000 or less. This amount excludes \$6,500 of income of relatives, other than the spouse, who reside in the household. Also excluded is \$7,500 of any income received by a homeowner who is permanently and totally disabled. Where the total combined income is between \$30,000 and \$35,000, a 50% tax relief is given, and between \$35,000 and \$40,000 a 25% tax relief.
- Total combined assets of no more than \$150,000. This amount excludes the value of the residence, up to one acre of land, and household furnishings.
- Disabled persons applying for the first time must show evidence of disability.

In addition to real estate tax relief, Fairfax County provides grants to senior citizens and disabled citizens who rent their residences in order to relieve eligible renters of the indirect burden of County taxes passed on by their landlords. The County also provides relief from personal property tax for one automobile per household. The

assets and income limitations for these programs are different from the real estate limits.

Applications for 1993 for all programs are due April 1. First-time filers and citizens filing late due to hardship have until December 31 of the current tax year to file an application for that year. Applicants filing late due to hardship must provide detailed substantiation that a hardship existed that prevented a timely filing.

Town Receives Recycling Report

The Town of Vienna has received word from the Virginia Department of Waste Management that its recycling rate for 1991 was 22 percent, well in excess of the state-mandated requirement of 10 percent.

In a letter to Town Manager John Schoeberlein, Recycling Program Specialist Nancy Williams said, "In these times of tightened budgets and difficult market conditions... It is encouraging to see the support local governments have for expanding their collection of recyclable materials beyond the minimum requirement of 10 percent."

Thanks to the support and participation of Vienna residents and businesses, the Town has already surpassed the 1993 Virginia recycling requirement of 15 percent and is well on the way to meeting the 25 percent mandated by 1995.

Vienna has been a leader in recycling since the 1970's, when it became the first area jurisdiction to implement curbside newspaper pickup. Today, the Town's recycling programs also include curbside pickup of cans, glass, plastic, yard debris and "white goods" (stoves, refrigerators, etc.), and drop-off points for cardboard, used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries.

Public Hearing

The Town Council will hold a public hearing at its March 15 meeting on a proposed ordinance to amend Vienna's townhouse zone regulations. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

The ordinance would require newly constructed streets within townhouse developments to conform with Town standards for public roadways, and would increase the minimum acreage requirement from one to three acres for new townhouse developments.

Copies of the proposed ordinance are available for review in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall.

Police Report Crime Down in 1992

The Town of Vienna Police Department has released crime statistics for 1992. Overall, crime in Vienna fell by 17.7% last year. Crime statistics reported to the FBI in the Uniform Crime Report indicate that Part I offenses, which are considered to be the more serious type of crime, dropped by 18.9% for the year.

Reported burglaries were reduced 37.8%, from 66 in 1991 to 41 in 1992. Auto thefts went down 25%, from 27 in 1991 to 20 in 1992. Another significant drop in Part I offenses was for petit larceny, which fell 25.3%, from 320 in 1991 to 239 in 1992.

"While the reduction in the property crimes is excellent, the reduction in crimes against persons such as felonious assault, which fell 8.3%, and rape, which fell 66.6%, is extremely positive when you consider the trend of violence that is occurring around the country," stated Col. Daniel J. Kerr, Chief of Police.

The only increase in Part I offenses was a 2.6% rise in grand larceny,

from 151 in 1991 to 155 in 1992. Robberies remained at the same level of 12 for both years, and homicides held steady at 0.

Juvenile crime in Vienna also appears to be on the decrease. The crime of vandalism, which is generally considered to be performed primarily by juveniles, went down 33.9%, from 221 in 1991 to 146 in 1992.

"It is always difficult to identify specific reasons for such sharp decreases," said Chief Kerr, "However, much of the credit has to be given to the strong interaction between the Vienna community and the police department. The Vienna Neighborhood Watch Program has long been known as one of the strongest watch programs in existence."

The initiation of a Directed Patrol Program may also have had some impact. More officers are in service during peak times and are directed to areas where crime patterns indicate a need for more patrol.

Meeting on Library Expansion Plans

Vienna's Patrick Henry Branch of the Fairfax County Public Library will hold a public meeting on Saturday, March 20, at 10 a.m. to discuss construction and renovation plans for the facility. The meeting is open to all library users and local residents. Registration is not required.

Plans for the branch renovation incorporate features recommended by citizens, including the maintenance of a temporary facility on the site during construction. A portion of the existing structure will house a collection of about 15,000 books and other items. Construction is expected to last for

approximately 75 weeks.

To facilitate packing and site preparation, the existing library will close in early September for approximately eight weeks. The temporary facility will open in mid-November with the same operating hours as at present. About a year later, in November 1994, the temporary facility will close for 12 weeks in preparation for the opening of the completely renovated library in February 1995.
