### Public Hearing on FY 94-95 Budget

At its May 9 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed Town budget for fiscal year 1994–95. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

At the hearing, citizens will have the opportunity to comment on the proposed budget and ask any questions about the appropriation of Town funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Copies of the proposed budget are available for review in the Human Resources Office at Town Hall and at Patrick Henry Library. A "Budget in Brief" summary may be obtained free of charge at Town Hall, and the entire budget document may be purchased from the Town for \$10.

The proposed general fund budget of \$10,458,109 is based on a real estate tax rate of 32¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase of 2¢ over the current rate, or about \$30.53 more per year for the average homeowner. This increase was proposed by the Town Manager to offset an estimated decline in the overall assessed valuation of properties on the tax roll by 1.91%.

The proposed water and sewer fund budget is \$3,587,661. An increase of 5¢ in the water rate and 9¢ in the sewer rate have been proposed to offset debt service requirements for capital improvements and an increase in the cost of purchasing water. The combined water and sewer rate for town residents would increase from \$4.41 to \$4.55 per 1,000 gallons, or about \$14 more per year for the average customer.

These increases in the tax rate and water and sewer charges have been

proposed to continue Town services at existing levels, replace aging equipment and infrastructure, bring Town employee salary levels in line with other area employers, and maintain a safe, attractive and financially stable community for current and future residents and businesses.

(The Town Council held a number of budget work sessions in April, and the final proposed budget may, as a result of those meetings, be less than that proposed by the Town Manager.)

If Council considers it necessary, a final budget work session to discuss comments made at the public hearing will be held at 7:30 p.m. Monday, May 16. Adoption of the budget is scheduled for the June 6 Council meeting.

## **Keep Plantings Trimmed for Safety**

Now that the April showers have ended and the May flowers are beginning to bloom, your Transportation Safety Commission asks every resident to make sure that bushes and other plantings are trimmed so that they do not obstruct the vision of motorists or impede pedestrians and bicyclists on a sidewalk or right-of-way.

The Town restricts the height of plantings, fences and shrubbery to

three feet above the curb level within 25 feet of an intersection. Keeping foliage trimmed makes it easier to see approaching vehicles. The Town also prohibits vegetation from encroaching on any sidewalk or right-of-way.

Every resident's effort to keep plantings trimmed will help make Vienna a safer and more attractive community this spring.

### HELP WANTED

The Town of Vienna has several openings in its Public Works and Parks Maintenance Divisions for temporary summer laborers. Typical duties include mowing grass, painting fire hydrants, and removing and installing concrete curbs and gutters. ### Solicitors Must Have Town Permit

Your Vienna Police Department reminds residents that solicitors are required to obtain a license from the Town and display it on their clothing. If they cannot produce the identification, call the non-emergency police number, 255-6366.

Some neighborhoods have received a notice offering to paint house numbers on the curb. These solicitors have failed to apply for a license, which includes a criminal history check, and they have not cleared with the Town the painting of the curb, which is technically Town property. To avoid this problem in the future, the Town Manager has directed that only non-profit organizations such as schools, scouts and civic associations will be allowed to provide this service after receiving special permission from the Town.

**REMINDER:** The Town's annual water main flushing program is in progress, and waterworks staff will be opening fire hydrants in the late evening and early morning hours. This may result in a slight discoloring of the water, but it should dissipate quickly.

## Yard/Garage Sale Season Is Here

The arrival of warm weather means that the bargain season of yard sales has begun. Your Planning and Zoning Department would like to remind residents of the Town's regulations regarding yard/garage sales:

- ► Each residence and/or family household may conduct no more than two sales during any calendar year. There is no permit required.
- ▶ Each sale must be conducted during daylight hours for no more than two consecutive weekends (Saturday and Sunday).
- ▶ Two signs of not more than four square feet each are permitted at the residence where the sale is being conducted.
- ► Two additional signs of not more than two square feet each are permit-

ted, as directional signs, provided permission is received from the owners of the property where the signs are to be placed.

- ▶ No sign may be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the sale.
- ▶ Signs must be removed each day at the close of the sale or at dark, whichever comes first.
- ▶ Signs are not allowed in Town right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement) or on utility poles. All signs placed illegally will be removed by the Zoning Inspector.


