# No Tax Rate Increase Budget Adoption Scheduled June 6

Adoption of Vienna's budget for fiscal year 1994-95 is scheduled for the June 6 Town Council meeting, which will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

The Town real estate tax rate will remain unchanged at 30¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, in spite of a decline in the overall assessed valuation of properties on the tax roll. During three budget work sessions, Council succeeded in reducing expenditures to a level that made a proposed 2¢ tax increase unnecessary. The savings were accomplished primarily by delaying the purchase of several heavy equipment items. The level of service provided to Vienna residents by Town depart-

ments will not be reduced.

Prior to adopting the budget, Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed water and sewer rates for FY 95. An increase of 5¢ per 1,000 gallons in the water rate and an increase of 9¢ per 1,000 gallons in the sewer rate have been proposed to offset debt service requirements for capital improvements and an increase in the cost of purchasing water. The combined water and sewer rate for town residents would increase from \$4.41 to \$4.55 per 1,000 gallons, or about \$14 more per year for the average customer.

The adopted budget will take effect July 1.

#### Yard Sale Reminder

Please keep in mind as you plan your yard/garage sale this summer that the Town Code prohibits attaching advertisements to utility poles and street signs or placing them in the public right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of the pavement). Signs may be placed only on the property where the sale takes place and on other private property with the owner's permission. Illegally placed signs will be removed.

## Permit Required to Erect a Fence

The Town of Vienna requires homeowners to obtain a permit before erecting a fence on their property. The fence permit application must be accompanied by a plat of the property showing the location of the proposed fence and a \$5 fee.

On interior lots, a fence may be erected to a maximum height of four feet in front of the house and six feet beside and behind the house.

On corner lots, the following exceptions to the height limits must be observed:

- A fence built within 25 feet of the property line abutting the side street may be no more than four feet high.
- That part of the fence built within 25 feet of the corner may be no more than three feet high.
- If the house behind yours faces the side street, your back fence may be no more than four feet high from the front of your neighbor's house to your property line at the street. (If the two houses are back to back, then your back fence may be six feet high along the entire rear property line.)

All fences must be constructed within the property lines. The posts and supports must face inward toward your house, and the finished side must face outward toward the street or

# Where Does Vienna's Water Come From?

During last December's "boil water" alert, some residents were surprised to learn that the majority of Town water customers no longer get their water from wells. These days, most of Vienna's water supply comes from the Potomac River via the Dalecarlia treatment facility.

The water alert also made people more aware of some of the safety issues faced by the water industry. Fortunately, further testing showed the water coming from Dalecarlia to meet established safety standards.

Like all water suppliers, the Town of Vienna conducts an ongoing testing program to protect the public health, and the Customer Service Office is available to respond to citizen concerns. If you have any questions about your water, please call 255-6385.

# A Better Way to Build

The general law of Virginia (Public Procurement Act) requires all units of local government, like Vienna, to award major construction contracts to the "lowest responsive and responsible bidder." Until recently, this mandate has worked well for Vienna and for other communities across the Commonwealth.

During the past few years, however, some contractors, squeezed by a depressed economy, have been bidding on jobs beyond their organizational capability and bidding at prices on which they can earn a profit or break even only through subsequent change orders which increase project cost. This is known as "low ball" bidding, and when the owner refuses to approve change orders the contractor is in trouble. Some of these contractors go bankrupt. Others stop work on the job, fail to pay subcontractors, or otherwise leave the owner with an unfinished project. In some cases, having left one or more jobs unfinished, such contractors simply form a new corporation and begin anew.

#### Town Had Bad Experience With Two Contractors

Vienna has endured two unfortunate experiences. The contractor chosen to build the most recent Community Center addition failed to complete the job as did the firm chosen for construction of the new police station. Each of these jobs was fully bonded, and each was finished by a replacement contractor hired by the insurance company. No money was lost, but the time delay, added staff work, public inconvenience and disappointment create real problems. Our police station is over a year late, and some few elements are still not finished.

Vienna's unfortunate experience with "lowest responsive and responsible" construction contracts is widely shared by other Virginia jurisdictions. We are discovering that the "lowest responsive and responsible" bid is not always the least costly or best way to build. In talking around the state and flyspecking the statute books, we learned that some state agencies and a few counties and cities had been granted special powers by the General Assembly to construct specific named projects on a "design-build" basis, which does not require acceptance of the lowest bid. Design-build allows the local government to select two or more architects and/or contractors from among those submitting proposals, and to then choose the one organization whose price is reasonable, and which is fully qualified and is best suited and experienced and has the financial capability to do the job. Price is a major consideration in the design-build process, but not necessarily the controlling factor.

#### Design-build Supported By Fisher and Howell

Design-build authority is routinely opposed by lobbyists for the professional engineering and architect organizations, because some jurisdictions have used it to build "cookie cutter" projects without benefit of professional assistance. So, the General Assembly has granted such authority in only a few cases. Notwithstanding, the Vienna Town Council agreed last fall that it was worth a try, and a bill granting such authority to Vienna for certain planned capital improvement projects was jointly sponsored in the 1994 General Assembly session by Delegate Richard L. (Dick) Fisher and Senator Janet Howell with other so-sponsors. Our bill (H.B. 588) was indeed opposed on the House side by the lobbyist for the engineers and architects, and Maud and I spent a lot of days driving to and from hearings in Richmond (one at 7:30 a.m.) testifying in support of our need for help. We assured folks that we always retain architects and engineers for all major

projects, and this seemed to at least mitigate some of the opposition. H.B. 588 passed the House 90-9.

When our bill arrived in the Senate, it passed without a dissenting vote, but several jurisdictions offered amendments to tack on their own projects. However, through the outstanding efforts and prestige of Delegate Fisher and Senator Howell, we achieved a "clean" bill which has now been signed by Governor Allen and gives the Town of Vienna design-build authority on reconstruction of our Northside Property Yard, redevelopment of the Maple Avenue business corridor, and reconstruction of Town Hall to meet ADA standards. Ours was the only design-build bill to pass this year.

## Town Council Approves Contractor Prequalification

In a yet further effort to improve our construction contracting, the Town Council recently approved a very detailed contractor prequalification policy which will require contractors, at the Town's option, to submit written evidence of their financial strength, experience, and qualification, and be "prequalified" by the Town Council before being permitted to bid.

Your Mayor and Council are doing their level best to assure Vienna's residents and business people that, in the future, major construction projects will be completed efficiently, at minimum cost, and on schedule by fully qualified contractors.

## Citizen Comment **Summer Heat Dangerous for Kids**

Thanks to a Yeonas Drive resident for sharing her views on a timely topic:

"At this time of year we all should take care to avoid leaving small children in automobiles in the heat. Recently, I saw a car parked at Safeway containing three very young children, the oldest of whom could not have been four years old, and only the driver's window was carcked open two inches. The air was steamy after the sun came out. Small children can dehydrate rapidly to a dangerous state of illness when they overheat.

"Last year at the Vienna Farmers' Market a women left two babies in a car, windows closed, on a 98° day at noon just to run out and buy a cantaloupe. She was irate and defensive when I spoke. She had been out of the car long enough to cause the little girls a good deal of discomfort.

"When I see this behavior on the part of parents who treat their children this way I feel ill and shocked.

"What can we do when we see this

happen?

"If pet owners are so careful to avoid leaving dogs in automobiles in summer, can parents of humans ever
