It's Time for Fall Leaf Collection

Fall leaf collection will begin on October 16 in north Vienna and October 21 on the south side of town. Department of Public Works crews using leaf vacuum machines will make three passes through town collecting leaves residents have raked to the curbside.

(Leaves and other "yard waste" put in plastic bags are picked up along with regular household trash on the first collection day each week.)

Please rake leaves just to the curbside, not into the street. Cars parked on leaf piles may catch on fire, and children playing in the leaves may be struck by a passing vehicle. In addition, leaves may prevent rainwater from reaching storm water inlets.

Town Code Limits Number of People Permitted in a Residential Dwelling

Many residential property owners rent part of their house, townhouse or condominium, or if they own more than one residence, may rent the second. Your Vienna Planning and Zoning Department reminds you that the Town limits the number of individuals who can live in any residential dwelling.

Either a "family" or "family equivalent" is permitted to occupy a single-family home, townhouse, condo or apartment. The Town Code defines these terms as follows:

 A family is one or more persons related by blood or marriage occupying a single housekeeping unit and using common cooking facilities. In addition to the persons related by blood or marriage, not more than two boarders or lodgers are permitted.

 A family equivalent is two or more individuals <u>not</u> related by blood or marriage and not exceeding four persons.

Private apartments that are separated from the main dwelling unit and in-law suites are prohibited by the Town Code.

Please keep these regulations in mind if you rent part of your home or a second residence. For more information, call the Planning and Zoning Department at 255-6341.



Look for Recycled Products

For recycling to succeed, recyclable materials must be processed into new products, and these products must be purchased and used. Many paper, glass, metal and plastic products contain recovered materials.

How can you recognize a recycled product? Look for the recycling symbol of three *solid* chasing arrows.

Let store managers know that you want to buy products made from recycled materials and encourage them to stock these products.

In addition to recycled products, look for items with less packaging, and purchase durable rather than disposable products whenever possible.

Reducing waste is one of Northern Virginia's most important challenges. There is no such thing as "free" trash disposal. In the last decade local governments have spent over half a billion dollars on waste management and recycling facilities. Please do all you can to prevent and reduce solid waste.
