Open Forum on Cottage St. Project

The Virginia Department of Transportation will hold an "Open Forum" on the Cottage Street reconstruction project on Monday, March 27, from 5 to 8 p.m. at the Vienna Community Center. At the forum, citizens may review plans for the project and ask questions of VDOT representatives. Residents in the construction area and all other interested persons are encouraged to attend.

The project includes the reconstruction of the surface and subsurface pavement on Cottage Street, S.W., at its existing width, between Moore Avenue

and the rear of the Vienna Shopping Center (Magruders); replacement of curbs, gutters, and sidewalk; removal of valley gutters; addition of storm sewers; and replacement of water and sanitary sewer lines. The total estimated cost of the project is \$2.1 million, of which VDOT will pay 98% and the Town the remaining 2%.

VDOT currently plans to advertise the project in April 1996, with construction commencing shortly thereafter. Traffic in the construction area will be limited to one direction, as was the case during the Park Street reconstruction project.

Vehicle Registration Begins March 15

1995 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals go on sale March 15 and must be displayed by midnight April 15. Decals may be purchased by mail or in person in the Finance Department at Town Hall. (Military personnel must apply in person only.)

Decals cost \$20 for passenger cars and trucks under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles.

Information for pre-printed application forms for 1995 decals was taken from 1994 records; therefore, if your vehicle was not registered in Vienna last year, you will not automatically receive an application in the mail. Call 255-6323 or visit the Finance Department to obtain forms.

Town of Vienna residents do not need to purchase Fairfax County vehicle decals, but they must pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. Personal property tax forms are available at Town Hall for the convenience of Vienna residents. For information, call the County Office of Assessments at 222-8234.

Sewer Replacement Completed

The Public Works Department recently replaced the sanitary sewer from Hickory Circle, S.W., to Maple Avenue through the parking lot of the Vienna Shopping Center (Magruders).

The project was the result of a study commissioned by the Town to investigate the cause of inordinate amounts of storm water in the sanitary sewer system in the Cottage Street area between Moore and Maple Avenues. The study showed that a segment of the sewer line was undersized, and its replacement with a larger pipe was approved by the Town Council as part of Vienna's capital improvements program.

In developing plans for the project, the

Public Works Department found that the existing pipe was very close to that portion of the shopping center occupied by Charlotte's Florist, making conventional methods of excavating and replacement difficult. Instead, it was decided to use a trenchless pipe replacement method known as the Xpandit system, by which the existing pipe is broken in place and at the same time a larger-diameter pipe is inserted.

Because of the trenchless pipe replacement technology, the Public Works Department was able to complete the project within two weeks without damage to any buildings and without disrupting the dayto-day business of the shopping center.

Traffic Report **Right on Red Requires Caution**

Although "right on red" makes driving more convenient, motorists should always exercise extra caution at intersections where right turns on red lights are allowed.

The law states, "Both the approach for a right turn and a right turn shall be made as close as practicable to the right curb or edge of the roadway," in other words, a right turn should be made into the right lane. This is especially important at locations such as Maple Avenue and Nutley Street, where vehicles across the intersection may be turning left on a green arrow.

A message from your Transportation Safety Commission — Watch out for pedestrians and bicyclists when making a right on red.

During the month of January, the Vienna Police Department issued 316 traffic citations, 87 for speeding and 229 for other violations such as running red lights and stop signs.

Rabies Vaccination Clinic Scheduled

A low-cost rabies vaccination clinic for dogs and cats will be held on Sunday, March 12, from 12 noon to 2 p.m. at the Fairfax County Government Center, 12000 Government Center Pkwy. in Fairfax. All dogs and cats four months of age or older are required to be vaccinated.

Vaccine for animals over a year old costs \$6 and provides protection from rabies for three years. For animals under a year old, vaccine costs \$4 and protects for one year. Puppies and kittens should be at least three months old in order to receive vaccine. Certificates of inoculation will be issued to pet owners at the clinic to verify each vaccination.

When pets are brought to the clinic, dogs must be restrained on a leash and cats confined to a cat carrier or other container.

This clinic is sponsored by the Northern Virginia Veterinary Medical Association and the Fairfax County Department of Animal Control. For more information, call the County Animal Shelter at 830-1100.

Rabies is a fatal viral disease transmitted through a bite or scratch or by getting saliva in a wound or in the eye or mouth. According to the Fairfax County Health Department, rabies is spreading throughout Virginia. Most animal rabies in the state is spread by raccoons; however, human exposure is usually through dogs and cats. Tax Relief Deadline

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for lowincome homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. To qualify, the following requirements must be met:

- Total household income of \$30,000 or less. This amount excludes \$6,500 of income of relatives, other than the spouse, who reside in the household. Also excluded is \$7,500 of any income received by a homeowner who is permanently and totally disabled. Where the total combined income is between \$30,000 and \$35,000, a 50% tax relief is given, and between \$35,000 and \$40,000 a 25% tax relief.
- Total combined assets of no more than \$150,000. This amount excludes the value of the residence, up to one acre of land, and household furnishings.
- Disabled persons applying for the first time must show evidence of disability.

In addition to real estate tax relief,
Fairfax County provides grants to senior
citizens and disabled citizens who rent
their residences in order to relieve eligible
renters of the indirect burden of County
taxes passed on by their landlords. The
County also provides relief from personal
property tax for one automobile per household. The assets and income limitations for
these programs are different from the real
estate limits.

Applications for 1995 for all programs are due April 1. First-time filers and citizens filing late due to hardship have until December 31 of the current tax year to file an application for that year. Applicants filing late due to hardship must provide detailed substantiation that a hardship existed that prevented a timely filing.
