## Council Seeks Citizen Comment On Revised Beulah Rd. Project

The Town Council is seeking input from residents of Beulah Road area neighborhoods and from other interested citizens regarding a revised suggestion for reconstruction of Beulah Road. The revised project would be similar to the reconstruction of Park Street, S.E., with a narrower width than previously proposed by VDOT for Beulah.

When Council last considered the Beulah Road project in 1991, many residents expressed opposition and, therefore, the plan was rejected. Since then, however, some residents have expressed support for a Park Street type reconstruction of Beulah Road in order to improve safety for both pedestrians and drivers.

The project now being considered would include reconstruction of Beulah Road at a two lane 30-foot maximum curb to curb width from Maple Avenue to the Town's corporate limit except for some probable turn lane widening in the first two blocks. The work would also include installation of either asphalt or concrete continuous sidewalks on one or both sides

of the street. If necessary, a meandering sidewalk could be installed to save the maximum number of trees. In addition, the drainage ditches would be removed and replaced with curb and gutter to divert stormwater into a storm drainage system, thereby controlling any drainage problems.

Sight distance problems along Beulah Road would also be addressed as part of the reconstruction project. All intersections would be evaluated and corrective action taken where needed.

The cost of the project is estimated at \$4.1 million, of which the Virginia Department of Transportation would pay 98% and the Town the remaining 2%, or about \$82,000.

The Town Council intends to schedule a public hearing on the project for this summer. In the meantime, written comments may be offered to John W. Stockton, Director of Public Works, 127 Center St., S., Vienna, VA 22180, or fax comment to 255-5722. If it is decided to proceed, VDOT would hold at least one additional hearing prior to any actual work.

# Public Hearing May 22 on FY 95-96 Town Budget

At its May 22 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed Town budget for fiscal year 1995–96. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. At the hearing, citizens will have the opportunity to comment on the proposed budget and ask any questions about the appropriation of Town funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Copies of the proposed budget are

available for review in the Administrative Services Office at Town Hall and at the Vienna Community Center. A "Budget in Brief" summary may be obtained free of charge at Town Hall, and the entire budget document may be purchased for \$10.

The proposed general fund budget of \$10,666,175 is based on a real estate tax rate of 31¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase of 1¢ over the current rate, or about \$13.60 more per year for the average

homeowner. This increase was proposed by the Town Manager to offset an estimated 1.19% decline in the overall assessed valuation of properties on the tax roll as of January 1, 1994.

The proposed water and sewer fund budget is \$3,672,562. An overall increase of 5¢ in the combined water and sewer rate has been proposed to offset increased

To help keep costs down, try using "recycled" water. With a little extra effort, you can re-use kitchen and bath water outdoors. Heavy outdoor water users might want to consider installing a "sub-meter," which separates for billing purposes water used only outdoors. costs, and a 75¢ increase in the quarterly account service charge is also recommended. For the average customer, these rate adjustments would add up to about \$8 per year.

These increases have been proposed to continue Town services at existing levels, replace aging equipment and infrastructure, bring Town employee salary levels in line with other area employers, and maintain a safe, attractive and financially stable community for current and future residents and businesses. "While no one desires to recommend an increase in property taxes or utility rates," wrote Town Manager John H. Schoeberlein in his budget message to the Town Council, "it is our perception that the vast majority of Vienna residents value the services they receive and do not want reductions or a curtailment of these services."

The Town Council has held a number of budget work sessions since the proposed budget was presented last month, and, as a result, the budget discussed at the public hearing may differ from that proposed by the Town Manager. If Council

considers it necessary, a final budget work session to discuss comments made at the public hearing will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday, June 3. Adoption of the budget is scheduled for the June 5 Council meeting.

## **Budget Receives Award**

The Town of Vienna has received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada for its fiscal year 1994–95 budget. This award is the highest form of recognition of governmental budgeting.

In order to receive the budget award, a jurisdiction must satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how well a government's budget serves as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide, and a communications device. Budget documents must be rated "proficient" in all of these categories to receive the award.

## Having a Yard/Garage Sale? Be Aware of the Rules

Yard sales are a great way to recycle all the things you no longer need. The arrival of warm weather means that the bargain season of yard sales has begun, and your Planning and Zoning Department would like to remind residents of the Town's regulations regarding yard/garage sales:

- ▶ Each residence and/or family household may conduct no more than two sales during any calendar year. There is no permit required.
- ▶ Each sale must be conducted during daylight hours for no more than two consecutive weekends (Saturday and Sunday).
- ▶ To advertise your sale, two signs of not more than four square feet each are permitted at the residence where the sale is being conducted.

- ▶ Two additional signs of not more than two square feet each are permitted, as directional signs, provided permission is received from the owners of the property where the signs are to be placed.
- No sign may be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the sale.
- Signs are not allowed in Town rightof-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement) or on utility poles. All signs placed illegally will be removed.

## Make Sure Your Dog Is a Good Neighbor

Please be a responsible pet owner and don't allow your dog to foul the lawns of neighbors. The mess and smell are very offensive, especially in hot weather. Also, signs are posted in several Town parks to remind pet owners that dogs are not allowed on athletic fields, tennis and basketball courts, playgrounds and picnic areas. The Town Animal Warden is author-

ized to fine pet owners found in violation of these laws.

Dogs must be confined to the owner's property unless on a leash. Dogs found running at large may be picked up by the Animal Warden. Owners charged with dog-at-large violations must appear in court. Fines increase with each offense to a maximum of \$500.


