

Special Pickup Deadline October 2

Monday, October 2, is the last day for Town of Vienna residents to call for a Special Trash Pickup this year. Because of fall leaf collection, no Special Pickups are made in November and December.

To dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording *promptly* at 255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount of debris, and type of debris.

Each residence is entitled to receive two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup. Additional pickups cost \$50 per load for all items except brush. The fee for brush is \$25 for one additional load, \$35 for the second additional load, and \$50 for each load thereafter.



Keep Plantings Trimmed for Safety

The Public Works and Planning and Zoning Departments remind residents to make sure that bushes and other plantings are trimmed so that they do not obstruct the vision of motorists or impede pedestrians and bicyclists on a sidewalk or right-of-way.

The Town Code restricts the height of plantings, fences and shrubbery to three feet above the curb level within 25 feet of an intersection. Keeping foliage trimmed makes it easier to see approaching vehicles. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of vision at intersections, please call the Planning and Zoning Department at 255-6341.

The Town Code also prohibits vegetation from encroaching on any sidewalk or rightof-way. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of sidewalks or rights-ofway, please call the Public Works Department at 255-6382.

Every resident's effort to keep plantings trimmed will help make Vienna a safer and more attractive community this fall, and all the walkers and bicyclists in your neighborhood will appreciate it!

PLEASE NOTE: Before cutting any tree, shrub or other plant near your home, first make sure it is on your property and not a neighbor's. Also, cutting trees in parks or on other public property is prohibited. If you are unsure whether a tree is on your property or in the public right-of-way (within 10 feet of the curb or edge of pavement), check with the Parks and Recreation Department at 255-6360.

Dumping Prohibited in Streams, Sewers

As a part of the Town's participation in the National Flood Insurance Program sponsored by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, residents are reminded that the stream channels and storm sewers throughout Vienna are not to be used as dump sites. Material dumped into streams and sewers can block the pipe culverts that convey storm water under many town streets and cause flooding and property damage.

Should you see anyone dumping material into a stream channel or storm drain, please call the Public Works Department at 255-6380 Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. After hours or on weekends, please call the Police Department's non-emergency number, 255-6366.

By working together, citizens can protect their property and reduce maintenance costs for the Town.

Recyclables and Trash Don't Mix At Drop-off Center

Please check your recyclables carefully before depositing them at the Vienna Community Center's recycling drop-off site to ensure that they do not include trash and unacceptable materials. When recyclables are contaminated, they may be rejected by recycling companies. Citizens are asked to help keep the program costeffective by following these three recommended steps:

1. Know What's Trash and What's Recyclable. In recycling, what's considered "trash" may surprise you! For example, glass baking dishes are a contaminant to glass recycling and often difficult to detect since they have a similar appearance to the clear glass being collected. These "look alikes" can be very damaging to the recycling process. While their outward appearance can easily mimic that of a recyclable, their physical properties are quite different. Such differences can create huge problems during the remanufacturing process, creating inferior or unusable end products. To avoid this problem, please read the posted recycling drop-off center signs carefully before you deposit your recyclables and include only materials listed as "acceptable."

2. When in Doubt, Leave It Out. Local recycling companies can accept only green, clear and brown glass bottles and jars. Drinking glasses, light bulbs, window glass, mirrors, glass cookware, dinnerware, flower vases and ceramics are contaminants and should be discarded as trash. Inclusion of contaminants has caused entire loads of recycled glass to be rejected, forcing the entire load to be handled as trash. If you think an item might not be recyclable, leave it out.

3. When Recycling, More Is Often Less. It is better to place fewer correct materials in a recycling container than a greater quantity of incorrect materials.

Rabies Clinic

A rabies vaccination clinic for dogs and cats will be held on Sunday, September 10, from 12 noon to 2 p.m. at the Fairfax County Government Center. All dogs and cats four months of age and older are required to be vaccinated.

Vaccine for animals over a year old costs \$6 and provides protection from rabies for three years. For animals under a year old, vaccine costs \$4 and protects for one year. Certificates of inoculation will be issued to pet owners at the clinic to verify each vaccination.

When pets are brought to the clinic, dogs must be restrained on a leash and cats confined to a cat carrier or other container. For more information, call the County Animal Shelter at 830-1100.

What Are Our Churches Doing?

Preparing this article was one of the most pleasurable projects I have ever undertaken. I met and talked with so many nice people.

Among the many wonderful things that we can appreciate in Vienna are our places of worship, and it occurred to me that it might be interesting to learn about some of the things they are doing. I was happy to learn that our churches are doing well indeed.

Vienna Assembly of God, 100 Ayr Hill Ave., N.E., 938-7736, is developing a Group Ministry to provide mentoring, nurturing, and leadership development. The music department is planning a big Christmas production this year.

Faith Baptist Church, 301 Center St., S., 938-9688, has a new minister, the Rev. Robert L. Lemon, and recently completed a major addition to the building. Programs include intense Bible study, children's church, vacation Bible school, junior and senior camps, youth and men's retreats, and specialized seminars.

First Baptist Church, 450 Orchard St., N.W., 938-8525, founded in 1867 by freed slaves, was the first church in Vienna. The original building still stands at 214 Lawyers Rd., N.W. Services are currently held at Louise Archer Elementary School while a major expansion of the church is underway. First Baptist is a growing church that provides many ministries for its congregation.

Vienna Baptist Church, 541 Marshall Rd., S.W., 281-4400, is a "Ministry of Christian Retreating" in addition to the usual activities of a Baptist church. Its Lost River Retreat (an old hunting lodge) in West Virginia offers summer camping, swimming, hiking, and year-round retreats for youth and adults alike.

Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church, 8601 Wolffrap Rd., 938-2828, completed construction of its beautiful building in 1973 and is currently renovating the old convent into a parish center, installing air conditioning in the grammar school, and renovating areas for additional school spaces and offices. OLGC has also just hired a new youth minister.

St. Mark's Catholic Church, 9970

Vale Rd., 281-9100, is also in the midst of renovation, with the activities center scheduled for completion October 1. The annual parish picnic will be held on September 17. St. Mark's is proud of the unusually high amount of volunteerism by its parishioners.

Church of the Holy Comforter
Episcopal Church, 543 Beulah Rd., N.E., 938-6521, celebrates its centennial this year. Prior to building the church, the congregation met at the historic Masonic (Bouton's) Hall that now houses its very successful Pennywise Thrift Shop. Among the congregation about 1895 was Rev. Johannes Adam Simon Oertel, an Episcopal priest who gained fame as an artist and wood carver. His work is in churches and cathedrals as far as England and includes his most famous painting, "Rock of Ages."

Emmanuel Lutheran Church, 2589 Chain Bridge Rd., 938-2119, is yet another church involved in extensive renovation. It has been particularly active in ministries in Estonia and Russia, and plans to open a new seminary in St. Petersburg.

Vienna Presbyterian Church, 124
Park St., N.E., 938-9050, is embarking on a very large expansion, including a new sanctuary to accommodate an ever increasing congregation. In addition to many other activities, it has started a successful new church in Centreville and is starting another in the Cascades area of Loudoun County. CHO's Food Pantry is located at Vienna Presbyterian.

Vienna Seventh-Day Adventist Church, 344 Courthouse Rd., S.W., 938-8383, is expanding its well known Vienna Junior Academy to 12 grades. As part of its community service, it now sponsors the CHO Clothes Closet. A satellite dish was recently installed to make many family enrichment programs available to folks.

Emmaus United Church of Christ, 900 Maple Ave., E., 938-1555, has undertaken sponsorship of a new Taiwanese church. In addition to the usual services for youth and adults, Sunday school is conducted in both Mandarin and Taiwanese. Emmaus recently hired a Director of Christian Education.

Church, 1014 Country Club Dr., N.E., 938-3494, has a particularly active outreach program. This year it sponsored a two-week visit to Vienna by six Russian children from industrial cities, allowing those children to clear their lungs and, it is estimated, extend their lives by two years. The church also successfully sponsored a Russian refugee family and supported over 100 children throughout the world.

Wesley United Methodist Church, 711 Spring St., S.E., 938-8700, is particularly proud of its English as a Second Language program and its mission trips to Homestead, Florida, and Madison County and Mt. Pleasant, North Carolina. Monthly sandwich making for Lazarus at the Gate, CROP Walk in the fall, and support for CHO give Wesley United a very busy schedule.

How to Handle the Trail Crossing

From a Roosevelt Court, N.E., resident:

"My comments on how to handle the problem currently existing with the bike trail and Maple Avenue are long overdue. The comments by Councilman Boudreau in the August *Newsletter* now move me to voice an opinion.

"First, I am an occasional bike rider and do enjoy using the W&OD Trail. But I have also learned many years ago to obey traffic signals and traffic warning signs. Not to do so would mean either a possible accident or a traffic ticket.

"Second, if I and others continue to ignore posted traffic signs and speed limits, could we then expect such restrictions would now be corrected to make it easier for us? I doubt it very much.

"As hard as it may seem to many, I believe that enforcement of ordinances is the way to go. If there is no ordinance against crossing Maple Avenue in the middle of the block, then there should be one. After a few fines are levied, I think that the word will get out that traffic lights are to be used for crossing.

"Along this same line, I predict that before too long a pedestrian will be seriously injured in dashing across Maple Avenue in the middle of the block. There are many close calls every day and it happens most between Lawyers and Beulah Roads.

"Let us not spend loads of money to solve a problem that can be handled with an enforceable ordinance!"

Traffic Report

Drivers Must Stop For School Buses

Your Transportation Safety Commission reminds you: The law requires motorists to stop for school buses taking on or discharging passengers and to remain stopped until the passengers are out of the street and the bus is again underway. This applies to drivers approaching from any direction. The Vienna Police Department is making an extra effort to enforce this law and will charge violators with reckless driving.

The only exception to this rule is when the motorist is physically separated from the stopped bus, for example, by a median strip on a divided highway or a service road.

Passing a stopped school bus is a serious offense that endangers the lives of Vienna's children. To report violations, call the Police Department at 255-6366. Children should be cautioned to look in all directions and make sure all vehicles are stopped before crossing the street to and from the bus.

DID YOU KNOW? In case of a serious traffic accident or other emergency, you can call 911 from any pay phone free of charge. No coin or operator assistance required!

During the month of July, the Vienna Police Department issued 343 traffic citations, 89 for speeding and 254 for other violations such as running red lights and blocking intersections.
