Real Estate Taxes Due Next Month

The second installment of 1995 Vienna real estate taxes is due by December 5. A penalty of 10% or \$5, whichever is greater, and interest at the annual rate of 10% on the tax and penalty will be assessed for late payment as required by state law.

If you pay your real estate tax bill directly to the Town rather than through a mortgage company and you have not received your bill by November 15, please contact the Town's real estate office in the Finance Department at Town Hall, 255-6325, and make arrangements to pay your bill by December 5 to avoid penalty and interest charges.

If your Vienna taxes are paid through your mortgage company and you receive the tax bill, please notify your mortgage company immediately so it can make payment by the due date.

If you have sold the property and are not responsible for the tax bill you receive, please notify the real estate office immediately.

Public Hearing November 6 On Model BPOL Ordinance

At its November 6 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed model ordinance concerning the business, professional and occupational license (BPOL) tax. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

The model ordinance was developed by the Virginia Municipal League (VML) and the Virginia Association of Counties (VACO) based on legislation introduced during the 1995 General Assembly session. Its purpose is to address various problems relating to the lack of uniformity in the administration of the BPOL tax, which has long been criticized by the business community.

Repeal of the BPOL tax was a major issue in the General Assembly this year and most likely will be proposed again in 1996. In Vienna, this tax represents 12% of general fund revenues and the Town's second largest source of taxes. To compensate for its loss would require approximately a 30% increase in the real estate tax rate.

Each local jurisdiction is being encouraged by VML and VACO to adopt the model ordinance in order to make the BPOL tax more uniform across the state and lessen its impact on small new businesses, thereby reducing the justification for repeal. If adopted as written, the fiscal impact of the ordinance in Vienna would be less than \$6,000 in lost

Planning an Accessory Structure?

The most commonly found structure in any residential zone with the exception of the residence itself is an accessory structure. Accessory structures include detached garages, detached gazebos, sheds, or any other secondary building erected on residential property.

If your planned accessory structure has an area greater than 150 square feet and/or the wall height is more than 8½ feet, a building permit is required. Three sets of building plans and three plats of your property showing the location of the accessory structure must be submitted along with a building permit application first to the Town of Vienna and then to Fairfax County for review and approval.

If your planned accessory structure has an area of 150 square feet or less and the wall height is not more than 8½ feet, a building permit is not required and you may proceed with construction adhering to the following regulations:

- → <u>All</u> accessory structures must be located in the rear yard. On a corner lot, it must be located beyond the building line of any adjoining lot.
- → On an interior lot, it shall not be less than one foot from any side or rear lot line. On a corner lot, it shall not be less than five feet from any side lot line.
- → Where any portion is located directly behind the rear of the principal building, it shall not be less than 10 feet away.
- → Where no portion is located behind the rear of the principal building, it shall not be less than 15 feet away and also no less than 10 feet away from the extension of the rear wall line of the principal building on the adjacent lot.
- → Not more than 25% of the property can be covered by your house, garage, carport, driveway, patio, and accessory structure.

This information is only a summary of the regulations regarding the construction of accessory structures. Residents are urged to consult the Town's Planning and Zoning Department before erecting any structure and, if you wish, schedule a courtesy visit to your property to discuss suitable locations. 
Contributors may choose to donate the entire cost of a sign or to underwrite one side of a decoration. Donations of any amount are welcome, and all contributors will be recognized.
