BPOL Ordinance Amended

At its January 8 meeting, the Town Council adopted revisions to the Town's business, professional and occupational license (BPOL) tax. The deadline for filing BPOL returns has been changed from March 1 to May 1. In addition, Council has established a gross receipts threshold of \$50,000, below which the tax does not apply. (This does not mean an exemption of \$50,000 for all businesses, but applies only to those businesses with annual gross receipts of \$50,000 or less, which will pay only the minimum license fee of \$30 per year.)

Councilwoman Pruett Dies; **Briglia Chosen to Fill Vacancy**

Vienna has lost one of its leading citizens with the death of Town Councilwoman Martha H. Pruett on December 23. Mrs. Pruett was first elected to the Town Council in 1988, after serving on the Vienna Planning Commission for 17 years.

During the 44 years she lived in town, Mrs. Pruett and her husband Sam raised five children, and she was involved in a wide variety of community service activities. She was a past president of the Vienna Woman's Club, co-founder of the club's "Police Officer of the Year" award, and most recently chaired a club project to donate the "coming events" sign outside the Vienna Community Center.

Over the years, Mrs. Pruett was also active in the Vienna Presbyterian Church, Southwest Vienna Citizen's Association, Historic Vienna Inc., Marshall Road Elementary PTA, Fairfax County Council of PTAs, Fairfax County elementary schools volunteer aide program, Girl Scouts and Cub Scouts, American Association of Retired Persons, Vienna Centennial Committee, Vienna Metro Task Force, and Vienna Metro Area Citizens Coali-

Steven D. Briglia has been selected to fill Mrs. Pruett's unexpired term. The Town Council made the appointment official at its January 22 meeting, with the term expiring on June 30. Councilman Briglia was previously the attorney member on Vienna's Board of Architectural Review and has also served on the Town/Business Liaison Committee.

A life-long town resident who graduated from James Madison High School in 1981, Briglia went on to receive a BA degree from the University of Virginia and a law degree from George Mason University. Currently in private practice with the firm of Briglia & Wright, he is a former Fairfax County Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney.



4-Way Stop Sign Etiquette

The following article was written several years ago by a concerned resident, and it is still an important message:

I have noticed an increase in confusion and sometimes anger displayed by drivers who think that I and others are breaking some right-of-way rules at four-way stops when we are not. I have discussed driving rules that apply to intersections with four-way stop signs with the Vienna Police Department. Here is a summary of these rules:

When two or more vehicles approach the intersection, the one coming to a stop first has the right-of-way to proceed straight through or to make a left or right turn.

When two vehicles traveling in opposite directions on the same street stop at the same time at the intersection, each may proceed without regard to the other unless one driver wants to make a left turn. In this instance the driver turning left must yield the rightof-way to the driver who desires to proceed straight through the intersection.

When two vehicles stop at the same time at the intersection on different streets, the vehicle on the right of the other has the right of way to proceed straight ahead or make a turn.

For the same situation as above, if there is also a stopped vehicle behind the first vehicle, that vehicle has not yet reached the intersection and does not have the right-of-way over the stopped vehicle on the left. Right-of-way rules do not apply to second-in-line vehicles until they have moved up to the intersection and again stopped when the vehicle in front has moved on.

When three vehicles all arrive at the intersection and stop at the same time, the vehicle on the right of the other two has the right-of-way. When this vehicle moves through the intersection, the driver on the right of the other remaining vehicle has the right-of-way to move first.


