Car Tag Deadline

1996 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals are available by mail and in the Finance Department at Town Hall weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Decals must be displayed by midnight Monday, April 15.

Additional hours for last-minute car tag sales have been scheduled on Friday, April 12, from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.; Saturday, April 13, from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.; and Monday, April 15, from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

The registration fee is \$20 for passenger cars and trucks weighing under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles. For more information, call 255-6323.

Attention Businesses! Business License Renewal Due

All businesses in the Town of Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business licenses annually. Beginning this year, the deadline for filing business, professional and occupational license (BPOL) returns has been changed from March 1 to May 1. Look for the license tax form in the mail this month. License tax forms are also available in the Finance Department at Town Hall.

The annual license tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. A gross receipts threshold of \$50,000 has been established by the Town Council, below which the tax does not apply. This does not mean an exemption of \$50,000 for all businesses, but applies only to those businesses with total annual gross receipts of \$50,000 or less, which will pay only the minimum license fee of \$30 per year. Sewer Backups Can Be Costly, But Sewer Backup Insurance Is Not!

All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company.

The Town's insurance carrier rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

Annual Water Main Flushing Program Begins in April

Residents are reminded that the Town's annual water main flushing program begins this month. Flushing is usually done between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m. Some discoloration and sediment in the water may be noticed, but these conditions are not harmful and should be of short du-

Each spring, the Town of Vienna flushes the water mains in its distribution system in order to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. For more information, call the Water and Sewer Customer Service Office at 255-6385.

Town Code Limits Number of People Permitted in a Residential Dwelling

Many residential property owners who are looking for extra income may rent part of their house or townhouse, or if they own more than one residence, may elect to rent their second residence. Your Vienna Department of Planning and Zoning reminds you that the Town limits the number of individuals who can live in any residential dwelling.

Either a "family" or "family equivalent" is permitted to occupy a single-family home. townhouse, condominium or apartment. The Town Code defines these terms as follows:

- A family is one or more persons related by blood or marriage occupying a single housekeeping unit and using common cooking facilities. In addition to the persons related by blood or marriage, not more than two boarders or lodgers are
- A family equivalent is two or more individuals not related by blood or marriage and not exceeding four persons.

Private apartments that are separated from the main dwelling unit and in-law suites are prohibited by the Town Code.

Please keep these regulations in mind if you are thinking about renting part of your home or a second residence in its entirety. For more information, or if you have questions regarding houses in your neighborhood, call the Department of Planning and Zoning at 255-6348.



Open Windows Springtime Hazard

With the arrival of the pleasant days and cool nights of spring, we open our windows to let in the fresh air. Your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department reminds you that an open window can lead to a fatal fall. Many parents and caretakers of young children do not realize the potential danger of an open window or how easily a child can fall out of it. Here are some safety tips to prevent children from falling from open windows:

- Always supervise young children. Life-threatening injuries can happen in seconds to a child left unattended.
- Close and lock windows whenever young children are around. If you need ventilation, open windows that children cannot reach. For example, open double-hung windows from the top only.
- Keep beds and other furniture away from windows. Children can quickly climb onto window ledges and fall.
- Keep blinds, cords, drapes and other window treatments out of children's reach. They may injure themselves climbing on them or be strangled.
- Do not depend on screens to keep children from falling out of windows. They are not childproof. They are designed to keep insects out, not children in.
- Purchase guards for windows and safety gates for stairways to prevent children leaving an area undetected by a parent or caretaker.

In short, Vienna views the future with pride and confidence. Please take time to vote on May 7th."


