## Public Hearing May 20 On FY 96–97 Town Budget

At its May 20 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed Town budget for fiscal year 1996–97. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. At the hearing, citizens will have the opportunity to comment on the proposed budget and ask questions about the appropriation of Town funds for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Copies of the proposed budget are available for review at Town Hall and Patrick Henry Library. A "Budget in Brief" summary may be obtained free of charge at Town Hall, and the entire budget document may be purchased for \$10.

The proposed general fund budget of \$10,983,917 is based on a real estate tax rate of 31¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase of 1¢ over the current rate, or \$22.56 more per year for the average homeowner (property valued at \$216,518). The Town of Vienna has not increased the tax rate since 1992.

The proposed water and sewer fund budget is \$3,780,164. An overall increase of 15¢ in the combined water and sewer rate has been proposed. For the average customer (usage of 25,000 gallons per quarter), the rate adjustments would add about \$3.75 to the quarterly bill. The major reason for the increase is that many of the projects funded by the 1996 bond issue are water and sewer system related and, therefore, the water and sewer fund must assume a greater portion of the debt service cost. These projects, which include increasing water pressure, waterline cleaning, and installation of new waterlines, will result in improving the condition of the system infrastructure and thereby prolong its useful life.

The proposed budget was prepared by the Town Manager and his department heads under guidelines that called for continuation of Town services at existing levels, replacement of equipment that has surpassed its normal useful life, and infrastructure maintenance, all with a minimal increase in taxes and service charges.

The Town Council has held a number of budget work sessions since the proposed budget was presented last month, and as a result, the budget discussed at the public hearing may differ from that originally proposed by the Town Manager. If Council considers it necessary, a final budget work session to discuss comments made at the public hearing will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday, June 1. Adoption of the budget is scheduled for the June 3 Council meeting.

## **Planning Commission Hearing May 8** On Revised Rental Property Ordinance

At its May 8 meeting, the Town Planning Commission will hold a public hearing on a proposed ordinance regulating residential rental property. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

The original ordinance has been revised extensively to address concerns raised about various legal issues. The purpose of the ordinance remains the same, however, to reduce the number of zoning violations associated with single-family rental properties and to provide the Town with enhanced enforcement authority to deal with violations that do occur.

The ordinance would require the owner of a single-family house to acquire a certificate of occupancy before renting the property and agree to comply with all applicable zoning, maintenance and health requirements. Violations could result in the revocation of the occupancy certificate. Inspection of the property for suspected violations could be made only with the consent of the tenants or by obtaining a search warrant.

Copies of the proposed ordinance are available for review in the Planning and Zoning Department at Town Hall. For more information, call 255-6341. Following the public hearing, the Planning Commission will forward a recommendation to the Town Council, which will conduct its own hearing before voting on adoption of the ordinance.

#### Don't Let Pets Run Afoul of the Law

The Town of Vienna has a "pooper scooper" ordinance that requires dog owners to clean up after their pets when out for a walk. Please be a responsible pet owner and don't allow your dog to foul the lawns of neighbors. The mess and smell are very offensive, espe-

Also, signs are posted in several Town parks to remind pet owners that dogs are not allowed on athletic fields, tennis and basketball courts, playgrounds and picnic areas because of the nuisance and potential health hazard to park users. The Town Animal Warden is authorized to fine pet owners found in violation of these laws.

Dogs must be confined to the owner's property unless on a leash. Dogs found running at large may be picked up by the Animal Warden. Owners charged with dog-at-large violations must appear in court. Fines increase with each offense to a maximum of \$500.

## Please Follow Special Pickup Rules

To dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording *promptly* at 255-5727.

Each residence is entitled to receive two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup.

- Building materials generated by residents themselves will be picked up. Concrete and other masonry items are limited to 300 pounds per residence.
- Sod, small stumps, brush, trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches and no more than 8 feet in length will be picked up.
  - Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment will be picked up.
- Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal and small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires will be picked up. Tires must be removed from the rim.
- Two major appliances per residence will be picked up. Old heating oil tanks will not be picked up.
- Paint cans, insecticides, and other hazardous wastes will not be picked up. For information about hazardous waste disposal, call 324-5068.
- Please separate brush, appliances, building materials, etc. from each other. This makes it easier for pickup crews to salvage recyclable items, reducing the amount of debris taken to the landfill.
- For the safety of Special Pickup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.
- Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.
- Please keep Special Pickup items away from regular trash and recyclables, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

Residents are reminded to call the Special Pickup number as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard.
