Start a life-saving habit by replacing the battery in your smoke detector each fall when you reset your clock back from Daylight Savings Time. "Change your clock, change your battery" on October 27.



This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

OCTOBER 1986 — The Town Council has approved new green and white street signs to replace the black and white signs now in use. The new signs will be installed along Maple Avenue as soon as possible and on the other streets in town as old signs need replacing. The Department of Public Works is making the old signs available to town residents for \$5 each.

OCTOBER 1976 — At its October 4 meeting, the Town Council appropriated \$23,025 to complete the restoration of Vienna's historic Freeman House. One of the oldest remaining houses in town, and one of the most significant in the life of the community, the Freeman House is being restored as part of Vienna's celebration of the U.S. Bicentennial.

OCTOBER 1966 — The Courthouse Road widening project, which will extend from Maple Avenue to Glen on the right and to Cherry Street on the left, is scheduled for completion about mid-December. This project also includes the opening of Locust Street from Courthouse Road through to Center.

Are You Registered to Vote in November?

October 7 is the last day to register to vote in next month's general election. Comment from the Council Table What About the Future?

"Life in Vienna! An oasis in the middle of an asphalt jungle!" How many times have we heard this? "A quality lifestyle!" "A small town atmosphere!" These statements describe our town today, but what about the future? What gives our community this identity? How can we be assured that Vienna will continue to be such a desirable place in which to live? How long will it last?

When we think of the 21st century, what do we see for our town? How can we help our community to maintain this vision for the next 10, 20 or 30 years? I have a few ideas, but I decided to take these issues to the public and I talked to some of Vienna's residents.

Everyone seemed to agree that the influence of the techincal world is gradually changing the way we live. The telephone, for instance, will probably be largely supplemented by the computer and fax machine. Much of the work force will work out of their homes as a result of the changing technology. Some people were concerned that the lack of personal contact will cause a trend of isolationism.

People also talked about what buildings would still be in Vienna and which ones would be gone. They were encouraged by the work being done on Church Street and the plans for the future of Maple Avenue. They believe this work favors the small businesses that seem to make our hurried life a little more friendly. Some mentioned, "We are creating our own charm."

One of the more interesting observations was a concern that in the next 25 years, the cutting back of social services by the federal government would put a strain not only on local jurisdictions but also on our local service organizations. We have to ask ourselves, can our local organizations pick up the slack? Most of the service groups I contacted admitted to a decline in membership. In fact, some of the active groups from the past 20 years have disbanded and turned over their activities to other entities. An example is the Committee for Helping Others (CHO), which recently took over some of the responsibilities of the Church Women United and the DOVE

Council. These groups had been very active in the dispersement of food and clothing to the needy, and their duties are now on CHO's list of activities.

Other organizations that will probably suffer in the next 20 to 30 years are our garden clubs, service clubs (Lions, Optimists, Rotary, etc.) and charitable organizations such as CHO. These groups rely on the work of their members to provide the community with numerous services. The community, in turn, depends on their work. Whether it is vision/hearing screening, blood pressure testing, "meals on wheels," beautification of our town, or any number of other good works, there is a definite need. Can we be assured these needs will continue to be met? I guess the answer is left up to you. Ironically, the churches seem to be increasing their membership, and the athletic programs pretty much take care of themselves. This trend will probably continue.

In order to maintain the quality of life in Vienna, we need these organizations as well

as the services of our local government. One resident suggested, "Bring in a new member the same age you were when you joined your club." This is easier said than done. In our busy schedules, we all find a shortage of time, and volunteer work is often sacrificed. We need to consider seriously the old saving "Take time to smell the roses." If this catches us off guard, we may realize that we must first plant the garden for there ever to be a rose.

Police Recruiting Auxiliaries

Congratulations to Jerry Lee Shadle, the Town's newest auxiliary police officer (APO), having graduated from training in July. Shadle, who lives in northwest Vienna with his wife Janet and daughters Nicole and Heather, joins eight other APO's currently working with the Vienna Police Department in patrol operations, dispatching, and records.

The Police Department is always looking for a few good men and women living in town to serve as volunteer auxiliary police officers. Recruits are trained at the Fairfax County Criminal Justice Academy and assist sworn officers with a variety of assignments in either the administrative or patrol divisions. In many instances, APO's also bring their own special training and skills to aid the department such as photography, computer operations, clerical, medical, communications, etc.

APO's must devote a minimum of 24 hours per month to their duties. Individual schedules are tailored to accommodate each volunteer. Requirements include U.S. citizenship, age between 21 and 62 for patrol assignments and between 21 and 75 for administrative assignments, and not be employed as a police officer or by a commercial detective or security agency.

"Aerosol Outlaws" Responsible For Dozens of Spray-paintings

At a news conference in August (shown above), Vienna Chief of Police Daniel J. Kerr announced the arrest of eight members of the "Aerosol Outlaws" (AOL). Two adults and six juveniles were charged in connection with over 50 incidents of spray-painting the group's name and other graffiti on businesses, traffic signs, bridges and park facilities in Vienna, costing taxpayers ten's of thousands of dollars to clean up. Surrounding areas of Fairfax County were vandalized as well.

One of the adult AOL members was sentenced last month to a year in jail (all but 36 days suspended) and to make restitution for some of the damage done.

The first break in the investigation of these offenses came when the Town's Superintendent of Parks Maintenance, Alan Garlock, spotted several juveniles spray-painting in one of the parks. He called police and assisted in capturing two of the juveniles. Douglas Comfort, Peter A. Elias, and Trent Nelson were the police officers who worked to bring the case to its successful conclusion.

Chief Kerr wishes to thank those citizens who called with information and the business victims who worked with the police to solve these costly crimes.




