This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

DECEMBER 1986 — Groundbreaking ceremonies for the addition to the Vienna Community Center were held on Sunday afternoon, December 7. Wielding the shovels were Mayor Charles Robinson; Town Council members Mary Jane Cronin, Richard Fisher. George Lovelace and Rodger Seeman; Fairfax County Board of Supervisors Chairman John Herrity; and Supervisor Audrey Moore. Construction of the addition, which will include a multipurpose room with a stage, is expected to take about 14 months.

DECEMBER 1976 — The only two judges in the history of the Vienna Municipal Court were honored in a short ceremony at Town Hall by the Vienna Town Council and the Vienna Bar Association. Judges Philip Brophy and John Corbov served as the only two Town judges prior to the court's realignment which abolished all Town courts. The bar association commissioned artist Dinah Brisbane to paint portraits of the two judges, which are hanging in the Town Court Room where the Fairfax County District Court now meets.

DECEMBER 1966 — For a number of months the Town of Vienna has been developing a town-wide beautification program aimed at raising the general attractiveness of the business areas, main streets, and public properties up to the level being maintained in the residential areas. Some of the significant elements for which programs are being developed are: anti-litter campaigns; anti-defacement and anti-vandalism campaigns; beautification of municipal buildings and grounds; clearing and cleanup of vacant lots; flowerbox and planter installations; paintup, fixup, cleanup campaigns; underground placement of utility lines; removal of abandoned cars; planting and maintenance of open areas; and periodic cleanup programs.

The Public Works Department will deliver ground leaf mulch and ground wood mulch to town residents free of charge beginning in mid-January. The minimum order for each type of mulch is a dump truck load.


Orders will be taken from December 1 through February 28. To place your order and for more information, call the Public Works Department at 255-6382.

By grinding leaves and brush into recyclable mulch, the Town saves thousands of dollars in landfill fees each year while providing residents with tons of free leaf and wood mulch.

Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount. The mulch is stored on Town owned property off Beulah Road near Glyndon Park. Look for the sign, "Free Leaf Mulch & Wood Mulch."

- Approved incorporating the enlargement of the Court Clerk's office, required by the Virginia Supreme Court, as a change order to the Town Hall renovation contract at a cost not to exceed \$6,000.
- · Authorized a survey, hydraulic analysis and design recommendations for storm drainage problems on Nelson Drive, N.E., at a cost not to exceed \$7,000.
- · Authorized the purchase of a new Police Department radio system and additional

radio equipment for the Department of Public Works at an estimated cost of \$232,773.

- · Awarded a contract for installation of a pedestrian signal at Maple Avenue and Lawyers/Courthouse Roads to Traffic Signal, Inc., at a price of \$32,070.
- Authorized the exterior inspection and preparation of painting specifications for the Frederick Street water tank at a cost of \$7,250.
- Authorized advertising for bids for additional street asphalt overlay work next spring. The work will take place on Courthouse Road from Maple Avenue to Plum Street, Lewis Street from Windover Avenue to Knoll Street, Orchard Street from Lewis Street to Malcolm Road, and Yeonas Drive from Cottage Street to the town line.
- · Referred two proposed ordinances to the Planning Commission for public hearings and recommendations, one concerning the number of directional signs permitted for vard sales, and the other concerning the use of tents as accessory structures.

Approved another change order in the amount of \$10,941 for revised gas service piping, reconfiguration of basement restrooms, connection of gutter and downspout at the elevator shaft, waterproofing of the elevator pit, and repair of existing valve leaks. Repayment of \$7,897 will be sought from Washington Gas and \$955 from the architect.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Car Batteries December 7

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries will be Saturday, December 7, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Town property yard, 247 Nutley St., N.W. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens with a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 255-6381

Too often used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of used oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water; in this way tons of toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic are released into the environment. When recycled, cleaned of its impurities and re-refined, used oil is a valuable resource that can be remanufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia, it is illegal to dispose of automobile leadacid (wet-cell) batteries with refuse.

Rodger Seeman - A Truly Good Man


"Vienna is my home town." "It's a wonderful life in Vienna." "It's an exciting time in Vienna." Rodger Seeman liked to characterize his feelings about Vienna in his campaign literature, but he was just as likely to tell you in person how he felt about Vienna. As bad news often travels quickly, especially in such a close knit community as Vienna, many have already heard that Councilman Rodger Seeman passed away on November 6. Anyone who knew Rodger, even casually, knew that he truly loved Vienna and the quality of life that he and his family enjoyed here.

A town resident since 1968, Rodger and his wife Jane raised their family in Vienna and actively participated in youth and educational endeavors. It seems just like yesterday that Rodger was one of my VYI football coaches. I also have fond memories of running with Rodger's son Bill on the gridiron at Madison High School. Of course, Rodger was not only on the sidelines, but was also a VYI officer and an enthusiastic High School Booster. His participation was often dedicated to the timeconsuming and unrecognized aspects of organizations such as administration and fund raising. His sense of community extended to numerous other community groups. He was an active member of Vienna Presbyterian Church, the Optimist Club, the Vienna Wireless Society, Vienna Hills Civic Association, Veterans of Foreign Wars . . . and on and on.

First elected to the Vienna Town Council in 1983, Rodger had long been active in Town matters, serving on both the Planning Commission and Transportation Safety Commission. His experience as an engineer with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers brought to the Town a wealth of knowledge and insight helpful to the Council's consideration of public works projects. While on the Town Council, Rodger was nothing less than diligent in ensuring that the Town's public works and capital improvements programs were based on sound engineering principles. Rodger clearly enjoyed quizzing project engineers and architects on the sufficiency of design specifications and site plans. Meanwhile, other members of Council would sit back and wait for the English translation. Without Rodger, there is no doubt that plan and design deficiencies might have gone unnoticed.

Many residents might also have noticed that Vienna has a number of construction and road improvement projects in progress. Rodger Seeman was an avid supporter of capital improvement projects that preserved the Town's public works infrastructure and improved its appearance. The police station, renovation of Church Street and Maple Avenue, completion of Vienna's parks program, and sewer and water projects were high-priority items for Rodger. Rodger's support for Vienna's successful and costsaving recycling program marked him as a progressive and pragmatic Councilman.

As a new member of the Vienna Town Council I often look to the "veterans" on the Council to observe their different approaches to multi-faceted issues. With the passing of Rodger, there is more than an empty seat at the dais where he used to sit. there is a void that will be difficult and most likely impossible to fill. Unfortunately for myself and the other Council members, we

are no longer able to look to Rodger for his insight and unique point of view.

Although Rodger's passing is cause for sadness to the Seeman family and the Town, it does give us the opportunity to recognize the dedication and commitment of a truly good man. The next time you turn on your water, drive over a freshly paved road, walk on the new brick sidewalks, or set something out for a special pickup, pause to remember that someone thought about how those projects and services could not only be provided, but provided better. Rodger certainly did.

Police Offer Tips to Protect Your Home When You Are Away for the Holidays

Going out of town this holiday season? Your Vienna Police Department has some tips to keep your home safe from burglars while you're away:

- Let a neighbor know you are going to be away and where you can be reached.
- Ask a neighbor to pick up your mail, packages and newspapers.
- Ask a neighbor to shovel your walk if it snows.
- Ask a neighbor to use your trash cans, or set his or her trash and recyclables at the curb in front of your home on collection days.
- Invite a neighbor to park a car in your driveway to give your home a more "livedin" appearance.
 - Remember to thank your neighbor!
- Light and noise are a burglar's worst enemies. Lights and radios turned on and off by timers give the impression that someone is at home.
- Have good locks. A high-quality, one-inch deadbolt lock on every outside door is a basic requirement.

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Tax Exemption Proposed For Home Improvements

At its December 2 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed ordinance to provide a partial real estate tax exemption for the renovation, rehabilitation or replacement of single-family homes. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall, and all interested citizens are encouraged to attend and express their views.

In brief, the proposed ordinance requires the following:

- The structure must be for residential use and in compliance with all zoning ordinances.
- The structure must be at least 15 years old.
- The improvement must increase the assessed value of the structure by a minimum of 25%. (At Council's request, the Planning and Zoning Department and the Finance Department have prepared a comparison of the proposed 25% increase versus a 20% increase, which will be available prior to the public hearing.)
- A building permit must be received and a certificate of occupancy issued for the completed work.
- The exemption will run for ten years, with the first five years at 100% and the remaining five years tapering the exemption percentage down to zero.
- The exemption is non-transferable between owners.
- Only one exemption may be granted per ten-year period per property.

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

Voluntary Parking Plan Designed For More Efficient Snow Removal

The Public Works Department has developed a snow removal plan that incorporates voluntary citizen parking restrictions to improve snowplowing efficiency. Components of the plan are listed below:

- The Public Works Department will mobilize equipment and manpower at the first notification of snowfall.
- Snowplowing operations will be implemented whenever snow accumulation is two inches or more.



residents are asked to park only on the side of the street with even-numbered addresses. This parking plan is voluntary but strongly recommended to

enable snowplows to maneuver more easily and, therefore, do a more thorough job. The Street Maintenance Division will note any areas where parked cars are creating a problem so that additional alternatives can be developed to improve snow removal in those areas.

Plowing and chemical treatment will continue on the primary and secondary streets
until an accumulation of 12 inches is reached. For accumulations greater than 12 inches, the
Public Works Department will concentrate on maintaining clear roadways on the primaries
until the snow stops and then go on to open up all secondary streets.

Have a Fire Safe Holiday Season

Every year, people suffer injuries, burns and even death due to carelessness with holiday decorations. Trees, lights, ornaments, and fireplaces produce extra hazards in the home at the same time that holiday visitors and activities distract attention from fire safety. Here are some safety tips from your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department to ensure that your holidays are safe and happy:

- ✓ Make sure your natural tree is a fresh one. Fresh needles won't break when you bend them. Once you get your fresh tree home, cut off one to two inches of the trunk and place the tree in a stable holder. Keep the holder full of water and keep the tree away from sources of heat to keep it from drying out.
- ✓ Use only flameproof decorations. Make sure your electrical decorations are tested and labeled, and check the wiring before you put them up. Avoid using extension cords to run your electrical decorations.
 - ✓ Don't use real lighted candles as part of decorations.
 - ✓ Don't use your fireplace as a disposal site for wrapping paper, gift boxes or tree.
- ✓ Keep an eye on friends and family members who smoke. During hectic holiday activity ashes and cigarettes can fall into chairs, gifts and wrapping paper. Don't empty ashtrays into the trash.
- ✓ Clean and test your smoke detectors to make sure they are working properly, and
 make sure your portable fire extinguisher is pressurized and not blocked by holiday packages and decorations.




