Dispose of Household Batteries Safely at Community Center

The Fairfax County recycling facility located at the Vienna Community Center provides for collection of certain types of household batteries for environmentally safe disposal. This program targets batteries that contain cadmium, lithium, mercury, zinc and nickel. These are the small "button" batteries, lithium batteries, and rechargeable nickel-cadmium batteries often found in items such as watches, cordless phones and laptop computers.

This program does not collect the more common alkaline-type batteries used in radios, toys and flashlights. Battery manufacturers have virtually eliminated the mercury content in alkaline batteries, making these batteries safe for disposal with regular household trash.

This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

FEBRUARY 1987 — In accordance with a new ordinance requiring maintenance of landscaped areas shown on approved site plans for commercial buildings, the Department of Public Works has issued regulations that grassy areas must be kept mowed, and all landscaped areas must be fertilized, watered, and kept free of weeds and debris. Trees and shrubs must be kept pruned, and dead plants must be replaced immediately.

FEBRUARY 1977 — In a petition to Federal Aviation Administrator John L. McLucas, the Town of Vienna expressed support for the President's Council on Wage and Price Stability request to have the Dulles Access Road open to non-airport traffic. The petition states that the "present use of the road is below capacity; it will be many years before airport traffic alone will result in efficient use of the road; and that current policy of road use is therefore inflationary."

FEBRUARY 1967 — February 1 is the deadline for residents to enter a contest to name the town's beautification and community improvement campaign. First prize, donated by First National Bank of Vienna, is a man's attache case, silver serving dish, 1967 season pass to the Vienna Theater, or \$25 in cash.

Traffic Calming Meetings Continue

Citizens in the southwest and southeast quadrants of Vienna are invited to meet with E.L. Tennyson, a transportation engineer engaged by the Town to conduct a townwide traffic calming study, to discuss traffic problems affecting their neighborhoods. Meetings are scheduled in the Council Chamber at Town Hall at 8 p.m. Wednesday, February 5, for the southwest quadrant and Wednesday, March 5, for the southeast quadrant. Meetings for the northwest and northeast quadrants were held last month.

At these meetings, citizens will be able to express their views on where the worst problems occur and offer their suggestions for corrective actions. Mr. Tennyson will facilitate the discussion and provide information from other jurisdictions on their traffic calming efforts. Following these meetings, and after analyzing current data such as vehicle speeds and volumes, Mr. Tennyson will present his findings and recommendations to Town officials for consideration.


FY '98 Budget Process Underway



When It Snows This Winter

Parking Plan Will Assist Snowplows

The Public Works Department has developed a snow removal plan that incorporates voluntary citizen parking restrictions to improve snowplowing efficiency. Components of the plan are listed below:

- The Public Works Department will mobilize equipment and manpower at the first notification of snowfall.
- Snowplowing operations will be implemented whenever snow accumulation is two inches or more.
- When snowplows are at work, residents are asked not to park on any street posted as a "snow emergency route," and on non-snow emergency routes residents are asked to park only on the side of the street with even-numbered addresses. This parking plan is voluntary but strongly recommended to enable snowplows to maneuver more easily and, therefore, do a more thorough job. The Street Maintenance Division will note any areas where parked cars are creating a problem so that additional alternatives can be developed to improve snow removal in those areas.
- Plowing and chemical treatment will continue on the primary and secondary streets until an accumulation of 12 inches is reached. For accumulations greater than 12 inches, the Public Works Department will concentrate on maintaining clear roadways on the primaries until the snow stops and then go on to open up all secondary streets.

Sign Up for Snow Shoveling Jobs

The Vienna Parks and Recreation Department has established a data base of workers for hire this winter by residents who need help shoveling snow. Individuals and businesses interested in jobs clearing snow from sidewalks and driveways are encouraged to register now with the "Snow Bank" — before it snows! Search on for New Police Chief

The Town is now in the process of selecting a new Chief of Police to succeed Col. Daniel J. Kerr, who resigned effective January 23 to become Chief of Police in Winter Springs, Florida, near Orlando. Kerr was Vienna's Chief for five years, following his retirement from the Fairfax County Police Department. During his tenure, a new police station was built and the department's personnel system was reorganized. In addition, a number of community outreach programs were created or expanded, including the DARE (anti-drug) program in schools, personal safety classes for women, cops and kids fun run, youth resources program, and the Chief's Advisory Committee.



Tysons DMV Office Reopens

The Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles' Tysons Corner Customer Service Center, 1968 Gallows Rd., was reopened to the public January 30 following a month-long renovation. Improvements include an enlarged lobby, more teller stations, and the addition of three information windows.

A new "queing management system" has been designed to enhance service delivery and essentially eliminate service lines. When entering the office, customers will go directly to the information desk to receive a ticket displaying a number. The ticket number issued is based on the specific DMV service the customer needs. Once customers receive a ticket, they sit in the lobby chairs and watch the electronic message board for their ticket number and the number of the teller window where the transaction will be processed.
