This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

MARCH 1987 — The Town Council has appointed 14 citizens to serve on the Town Centennial Committee, which will coordinate the observance of Vienna's 100th anniversary as an incorporated town. The committee members appointed on March 2 are Bob Braddock, Ross Buckley, Phyllis Elkins, Bill Gratz, Paul Lyons, Ann Martin, Jim Martinelli, Martha Pruett, Sam Savia, Nancy Shields, Daphne Sloan, Mayo Stuntz, Ted Thomas and John Wooden. These individuals will work with committee chairman Bob Dix in planning for centennial activities during the next three years.

MARCH 1977 — Property owners will begin receiving 1977 real estate assessment notices about March 1. The notices will look different this year, but owners should read the fine print before they panic. Fairfax County is shifting its assessment base from 40% of fair market value, the assessment ratio for real estate since 1946, to 100% of fair market value. The change is required by state law. The shift will have little or no effect on individual tax bills, however, because the law also requires that the tax rate automatically be shifted downward at the same time.

MARCH 1967 — The "My Kind of Town" campaign for the beautification and betterment of Vienna is beginning to gain momentum. Mayor Martinelli and "Egbert the Elf," along with representatives of the Vienna Police Association, have begun visiting all of the elementary schools, emphasizing anti-litter and "What I can do to help." Many organizations have already adopted projects. The Town has prepared a supply of certificates which will be presented regularly to individuals as well as organizations who make a significant contribution to the campaign.

Spring Street Sweeping Begins This Month

Final Traffic Calming Meeting Scheduled for SE Quadrant

Citizens in the southeast quadrant of Vienna are invited to discuss traffic problems affecting their neighborhoods with E.L. Tennyson, a transportation engineer engaged by the Town to conduct a town-wide traffic calming study, on Wednesday, March 5, at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. Meetings for the northwest and northeast quadrants were held in January and for the southwest quadrant in February.

At this meeting, citizens will be able to express their views on where the worst problems occur and offer their suggestions for corrective actions. Mr. Tennyson will facilitate the discussion and provide information from other jurisdictions on their traffic calming efforts. Following these meetings with citizens from all sections of town, and after analyzing current data such as vehicle speeds and volumes, Mr. Tennyson will present his findings and recommendations to Town officials for consideration.


















Car Tags Go on Sale March 17

1997 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals go on sale Monday, March 17, and must be displayed by midnight April 15. Decals may be purchased by mail or in person in the Finance Department at Town Hall. (Military personnel must apply in person.)

Decals cost \$20 for passenger cars and trucks under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles.

Information for pre-printed application forms for 1997 decals was taken from 1996 records; therefore, if your vehicle was not registered in Vienna last year, you will not automatically receive an application in the mail. Call 255-6323 or visit the Finance Department to obtain forms.

Town of Vienna residents do not need to purchase Fairfax County vehicle decals, but they must pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. Personal property tax forms are available at Town Hall for the convenience of Vienna residents. For information about personal property tax, call the County Office of Assessments at 222-8234.

The supply of printed *Handbooks* is being distributed through County libraries, Supervisors' offices, and the Citizens Assistance Desk in the lobby of the Government Center. Citizens may pick up a copy at any of these locations while supplies last.

Talkin' Some Trash

Residents are reminded that household trash and recyclable materials must be placed at the curbside by 7 a.m. on collection day and empty trash cans removed as soon as possible after pickup.

Trash should not be placed at the curbside until the night before a scheduled pickup. Please make sure cans are tightly covered so that crows and other "critters" cannot get inside and scatter trash through the neighborhood.

Did you know? Adding ammonia to trash bags before placing them at the curbside for pickup will help control odors and discourage animals and birds from tearing into the bags.

Del. Lovelace's "Letter from Richmond"

This year's Virginia General Assembly session ended February 22. Vienna's representative in the House of Delegates has sent along the following report to his constituents:

Dear Friends and Neighbors.

Bills in support of education, public safety, local government, and the environment were top priority on my 1997 legislative agenda. I introduced a bill designed to reduce pupil-teacher ratio for grades K–3 in schools with moderate or high risk concentrations. The same bill provides for assistance in funding technology training for staff personnel, promoting parental involvement in the school, and family literacy.

My bill on defacement of structures gives local governing bodies the authority to require property owners to remove or repair the defacement of buildings, walls, fences, and other sturctures. After reasonable notice, the local government may remove the defacement if the owner fails to do so.

My bill on recycling requires local and regional solid waste planning units to maintain a 25% recycling rate. This includes all aspects of solid waste management, including waste reduction, recycling and reuse, storage, treatment, and disposal.

On February 17, I proudly introduced a bill commending the Woman's Advisory Board of George Mason University for establishing an endowment honoring Dorothy and Hugh McDiarmid. The late Dorothy McDiarmid represented Vienna in the House of Delegates for many years.

I would like to give special thanks to Mayor Robinson and the Town Council, the Town Hall staff, and members of the Vienna Police Department for their valuable suggestions during this legislative session. I am indebted to the citizens of Vienna for their support in communicating their views on proposed legislation. You may write me at P.O. Box 815, Vienna, VA 22183 or call me at 938-6146. Carbon Monoxide Detectors Protect Your Family

Your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department recommends installing at least one carbon monoxide detector per household, near the sleeping area. A second detector near the home's heat source provides extra protection. Choose an Underwriters Laboratories (UL) listed dector that sounds an audible alarm. A battery operated carbon monoxide detector continues to protect even in the event of a power outage. Hardwired AC models with battery backup are also available.

In addition to installing carbon monoxide detectors, consumers should regularly inspect and service potential problem sources of carbon monoxide. These include common home appliances such as gas or oil furnaces, clothes dryers, water heaters, fireplaces, charcoal grills, gas ranges, wood-burning stoves, and space heaters. Fumes from motor vehicles also contain carbon monoxide and can enter a home through walls or doorways if a vehicle is left running in an attached garage.

Carbon monoxide bonds with hemoglobin in the blood, displacing the oxygen. Although everyone is at risk, those with greater oxygen requirements, including the very young, the elderly, and people with respiratory or coronary problems, are at greater risk.

At low levels, carbon monoxide poisoning causes symptoms similar to the flu, such as headaches, fatigue, nausea, dizzy spells, confusion, and irritability. As levels of carbon monoxide increase, vomiting, loss of consciousness, and eventually brain damage or death can result.

If you suspect you are experiencing carbon monoxide poisoning, get fresh air immediately, get everyone out of the house as quickly as possible, and call the fire department. The fire department will confirm the presence of carbon monoxide, attempt to identify the source, and ventilate the gas from the building.

Maple Avenue Enhancement Rescheduled for Spring 1998

The Town Council has approved a revised construction schedule for the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project. Originally planned for the 1997 construction season, the project is now set to begin in March 1998.

The new schedule will give the Town staff additional time to review and refine the design specifications, benefiting from their experiences with the recent Church Street project, which should help ease the impact of the construction on Maple Avenue businesses, keep restrictions on traffic flow to a minimum, and reduce the likelihood of change orders once the project begins. In addition, Council felt it would be unwise to begin work on Maple Avenue while the reconstruction of Cottage Street is still in progress.

The Maple Avenue Enhancement Project will be similar to the Church Street project, covering the area from Lawyers Road to Park Street and including brick sidewalks and street crossings, ornamental street lamps and plantings, and undergrounding of utility service lines. As with Church Street, it is hoped the improvements will aid businesses and give Maple Avenue a more "pedestrian-friendly" feeling.

Tax Relief Applications Due April 1 for Low-income Elderly and Disabled Citizens

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for low-income homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. To qualify, the following requirements must be met:

- Total household income of \$40,000 or less. This amount excludes \$6,500 of income of relatives, other than the spouse, who reside in the household. Also excluded is \$7,500 of any income received by a homeowner who is permanently and totally disabled. Where the total combined income is between \$30,000 and \$35,000, a 50% tax relief is given, and between \$35,000 and \$40,000 a 25% tax relief.
- Total combined assets of no more than \$150,000. This amount excludes the value of the residence, up to one acre of land, and household furnishings.
 - Disabled persons applying for the first time must show evidence of disability.

In addition to real estate tax relief, Fairfax County provides grants to senior citizens and disabled citizens who rent their residences. The County also provides relief from personal property tax for one automobile per household. The assets and income limitations for these programs are different from the real estate limits. The Town of Vienna provides all relief recipients one free auto decal.

Applications for 1997 for all programs are due April 1. Both Town and County applications must be completed. First-time filers and citizens filing late due to hardship have until December 31 of the current tax year to file an application for that year. Applicants filing late due to hardship must provide detailed substantiation that a hardship existed that prevented a timely filing.

Water Mains Flushed, **Hydrants Tested in Spring**

Each spring, the Town of Vienna flushes the water mains in its distribution system in order to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. The preventive maintenance program begins in early April. Water mains are usually flushed between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Water mains are flushed by opening the fire hydrants and allowing the water to flow freely for a short period of time. The flushing cleans out sediment that normally accumulates during the summer and winter, and enables the Town to test and perform routine maintenance on the 800+ fire hydrants within its service area.

Flushing may result in some discoloration and the presence of sediment in the water reaching your home or business. These conditions are not harmful and should be of short duration. The Town appreciates your tolerance of this inconvenience. If you need more information, please call the Water & Sewer Customer Service Office at 255-6385.

Sewer Backups Can Be Costly, But Sewer Backup Insurance Is Not!

All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company.

The Town's insurance carrier rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Out of more than 25 sewer backups last year, only two claims were paid by the Town. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

To help prevent sewer backups, the Public Works Department cleans the main sewer lines whenever residents notify the department that their service laterals have been rodded by a commercial sewer cleaning service. Pressure cleaning to remove material washed into the main sewer line from the service lateral may help prevent future blockage of the main line. If you have your sewer service lateral cleaned, please call the Public Works Department at 255-6381.

Protect Yourself And Your Money

The Chief's Advisory Committee, established in 1993 to improve communication between citizens and the Police Department, offers these crime prevention tips:

✓ Destroy unwanted "starter checks" and credit card applications that come in the mail. It is easy for a criminal to put his address on the application by checking the change of address box.

✓ Destroy ATM account balance slips and dispose of them carefully. The numbers can be used to charge to your account.

✓Put a fake pin number on your ATM card. Should it fall into the wrong hands, the machine will "eat" the card after three tries and the bank will return the card to you.

Protect Young Passengers With Car Safety Seats

It has been estimated that 70% of all child traffic deaths could be prevented if parents used approved child safety seats properly. Unfortunately, surveys show that most parents do not understand the correct way to install and use safety seats, so take a few minutes to read these tips offered by the Virginia Department for Children's PLEASE BE SEATED Program:

• Don't take your child out of a safety seat simply because he or she turns four. Virginia law requires safety seat use for children under four, yet most four year olds are not large enough to use adult safety belts. If the belt rides up on the child's stomach or the shoulder strap does not fit over the shoulder, your child needs a booster seat or belt positioning booster. Seats are readily available for children from birth through 60 pounds.

- · Use the right size child safety seat.
- For infants under 20 pounds: rear facing infant or convertible safety seat.
- For toddlers 20-40 pounds: forward facing convertible seat.
- For children 40-60 pounds: belt positioning booster seat if the vehicle has lap/ shoulder belts. Booster seat with front shield if the vehicle has lap belts only.
 - Use your safety seat properly. Read directions.
 - An infant must face backwards and be reclined until he or she reaches 20 pounds.
 - Never use a rear facing safety seat in a seating position with an airbag.
- Shoulder straps should be in the lower slot for infants facing backwards; in the upper slot for forward facing seats.
- Safety belts generally go over the front of the seat for infant seats facing backwards and go through slots in the back of the seat for forward facing seats.
 - The child should be snugly secured in the safety seat.
- Take off bulky winter coats before fastening harness straps. Place the coat or a blanket over the child for warmth.
- Shoulder straps should be snug no more than one finger width between the strap and the chest.
 - Fasten the plastic harness tie, if your seat came with one, and place it at armpit level.
- The safety seat should be very tightly secured in the vehicle. If you can wiggle your safety seat, the safety belt is not tight enough. Push down hard on the safety seat with your knee or hand while pulling the safety belt tight. If your seat does not stay tight, check your vehicle and safety seat manuals. You may need a locking clip or have a safety belt that cannot be used with a child safety seat.
- Never risk putting a child on a lap or two people in one belt. A child belted in with an adult will likely be crushed in a crash. If you have more people that safety belts, make two trips or take two cars.
- Do not move the car until everyone has buckled up. If you have allowed your child to ride unprotected in the past, then start today securing him or her every time. Make no exceptions and children will soon realize you are serious about protecting them. Always wear your own safety belt.
- If you can't afford a child safety seat, there are several programs offering free and discounted safety seats. Call PLEASE BE SEATED at 1-800-732-8333 for more information. PLEASE BE SEATED can also answer questions about seat selection and proper use of safety belts.

If you observe a small child not protected by a child safety seat, please make a note of the time and place of the observation and the license number of the vehicle, and report the incident to the PLEASE BE SEATED Program. Postage-paid report forms are available at the Vienna Police Department. A friendly reminder will be sent to the vehicle owner to obey this life-saving law.
