This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

JUNE 1987 — At its June 1 meeting, the Town Council adopted an ordinance empowering the Town to remove inoperative motor vehicles from residential or commercial property if the property owner fails to comply with notice to do so. Junk and abandoned vehicles are a continuing problem for suburban jurisdictions. The cost to remove illegal vehicles by Town forces may be charged to the vehicle owner, or to the owner of the property from which the vehicle is removed and will constitute a lien against the property until paid.

JUNE 1977 — An ordinance designed to control the number of adult book stores allowed in Vienna was adopted by the Town Council at its June 6 meeting. Under the provisions of the ordinance any adult book store or theater would have to be a conditional use in the C-2 commercial zone. Establishments could not be within 1,000 feet of a school or church. Vienna's ordinance would make it nearly impossible for an adult book store or adult theater to locate here.

JUNE 1967 — A joint effort of Town forces, the garden clubs, and the merchants is now underway to provide attractive planters throughout the shopping centers and business district. The Town's Public Works Department is building the planter boxes of redwoodstained cedar, and the garden clubs are planting the shrubs furnished by the local merchants. Burfordi hollies and threespine barberries are the main planting material being used.

Having a Yard Sale This Summer? Here Are the Rules

Yard sales are a great way to recycle all the things you no longer need. The arrival of warm weather means that the bargain season of yard sales has begun, and your Planning and Zoning Department would like to remind residents of the Town's regulations regarding vard/ garage sales:

- · Each residence and/or family household may conduct no more than two sales during any calendar year. There is no permit required.
- · Each sale must be conducted during daylight hours for no more than two consecutive weekends (Saturday and Sunday).
- To advertise your sale, two signs of not more than four square feet each are permitted at the residence where the sale is being conducted.
- · Two additional signs of not more than two square feet each are permitted, as directional signs, provided permission is received from the owners of the property where the signs are to be placed.
- » No sign may be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the sale.
- · Signs are not allowed in Town right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement) or on utility poles. All signs placed illegally will be removed.

Police Step Up Enforcement Of Serious Traffic Violations

Aggressive drivers beware!! In response to concerns expressed by citizens during several recent "traffic calming" meetings, the Town of Vienna has intensified its enforcement against serious traffic violations, in particular speeding, red light, and stop sign violations.

Chief of Police Dan Boring has implemented this program of traffic calming through enforcement as a means to curb the multitude of aggressive driving violations that occur daily as a traffic volume many times in excess of Vienna's population flows through both the business and residential sections of town.

With more traffic tickets being issued, the Fairfax County General District Court has given the Vienna police permission to increase the number of citations placed on the traffic court docket. The Police Department will be receiving several "mini-grants" to provide additional funds for its enforcement efforts, and it is also considering the reallocation of an existing police officer position to the traffic enforcement staff.

Real Estate Tax Due Next Month

The first installment on 1997 Town of Vienna real estate taxes is due on July 28. A penalty of 10% or \$5, whichever is greater, and interest at the annual rate of 10% on the tax and penalty will be assessed for late payment as required by state law. If you have not received your bill by July 15, please call the Town's real estate office, 255-6325.

If your Vienna taxes are paid through your mortgage company and you receive the tax bill, please notify your mortgage company immediately so it can make payment by the due date. If you have sold the property and are not responsible for the tax bill you receive, please notify the real estate office immediately.

Town of Vienna property owners must also pay Fairfax County real estate tax, which is also due on July 28. For information on County tax payments, call 222-8234.

Talkin' Some Trash

Residents are reminded that there is a weight limit on household trash and yard waste of 40 pounds per bag or can. This limit has been established to prevent injuries to members of the sanitation crews. Bags and cans that are too heavy will be left at the curb unemptied.

All refuse must be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on collection day but not earlier than 6 p.m. the preceding evening. Please make sure cans are tightly covered so that crows and other "critters" cannot get inside and scatter trash through the neighborhood. (Did you know? Adding ammonia to trash bags before placing them at the curbside for pickup will help control odors and discourage animals and birds from tearing into the bags.)

All trash cans should be removed from the curb as soon as possible after trash pickup and no later than 7 p.m. the same evening as collection.

Hazardous materials such as fuel tanks, oil-based paints, solvents, insecticides, florescent light tubes, etc. can be disposed of through the Fairfax County Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. The drop-off center for hazardous waste is the I-66 Citizens' Recycling and Disposal Facility located at 4618 West Ox Rd. Call 324-5068 for further information.

Latex paint is not considered a hazardous waste and should not be brought to the house-hold hazardous waste program site. Cans containing leftover latex paint should be opened up and allowed to dry out before disposing of them. Residents are asked not to place cans containing liquid latex paint in the trash because they burst in the packer trucks and create a mess in the streets.

1997 marks the Vienna Police Department's 50th anniversary of service to the community. Golden anniversary commemorative items are now on sale at police head-quarters, 215 Center St., S.

Trim Plantings and Grass

This summer, please make sure that bushes and other plantings are trimmed so that they do not obstruct the vision of motorists or impede pedestrians and bicyclists.

The Town Code restricts the height of plantings, fences and shrubbery to three feet above the curb level within 25 feet of an intersection. Keeping foliage trimmed makes it easier to see approaching vehicles. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of vision at intersections, please call the Planning and Zoning Department, 255-6341.

The Town Code also prohibits vegetation from encroaching on any sidewalk or right-of-way. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of sidewalks or rights-of-way, please call the Public Works Department at 255-6382.

Although not required by the Town Code, citizens are asked to help control grass and weeds growing up through cracks in the sidewalk and between the sidewalk and street. This unwanted growth detracts from Vienna's beauty and can lead to costly concrete and asphalt repairs. The Town government recognizes the problem of upkeep in rights-of-way, but it simply does not have the personnel required to maintain these areas as it would like and must rely on citizens to help in controlling grass and weeds around their property.

More Traffic Tickets Being Written



During the recently concluded series of five town wide meetings on traffic problems, several speakers expressed the view that our enforcement of traffic laws has been inadequate or, in some neighborhoods, "totally lacking."

In response to these concerns, the Vienna Police Department has been intensifying and will continue to prioritize traffic enforcement, including the assignment of additional officers to the Traffic Detail. The Department has just received three Highway Safety mini-grants which will provide some additional funding, although limited, for our speed enforcement, red light/stop sign enforcement, and occupant safety enforcement programs. These funds will permit us to provide additional on-street manpower during high traffic periods by utilizing officers

on an overtime basis. We want Vienna's streets to be as safe as possible, and, judging from phone calls to my office, and the large crowd in Town Hall for Monday morning Court Day, tickets are being issued in very substantial numbers.

Historically, Vienna has been known as a community where law enforcement is for real. And, our renewed emphasis on motor vehicle violations means that more tickets will be written. For example, through March 31 of 1997, our officers issued 1,569 citations for moving violations compared with 1,270 during the same period of 1996. Similarly, during that same period of 1997 we issued 488 citations for non-moving violations compared with 322 in 1996. During the month of March 1997, 549 persons were cited for moving violations compared

with 460 for March 1996. Actually, non-moving violations during March of this year were less than for March 1996, 134 versus 188.

The Town Council has indicated to our new Chief of Police, Colonel Dan Boring, our sense that we need a full court press on traffic enforcement, particularly against moving violations which endanger other motorists and pedestrians. And, in addition to the efforts of our own Police Officers, the Vienna Police Department is a full partner in the area wide cooperative effort of all law enforcement agencies to apprehend and appropriately deal with the aggressive drivers who frequently demonstrate a total lack of courtesy and a total disregard for the safety of other highway users.

So, be respectfully advised that the tickets are being written, and those observed violating the rules will likely enjoy an interview with one of our officers.

Running Safety Tips for Women

Now that warm weather is here, more women are getting out on neighborhood streets and trails. The Road Runners Club of America offers these tips to "Run Smart. Run Safe," which also apply to those who walk, bike or skate.

- Don't wear headsets. Use your ears to be aware of your surroundings.
- Carry a quarter for a phone call.
- Run with a partner.
- Write down or leave word of the direction of your run. Tell friends and family of your favorite running routes.
- Run in familiar areas. Know where telephones are, or open businesses. Alter your route pattern often.
- Always stay alert. The more aware you are, the less vulnerable you are.
- Avoid unpopulated areas, deserted streets, and overgrown trails. Especially avoid unlit areas at night. Run clear of parked cars or bushes.
- Carry identification or write your name, phone number, and blood type on the inside sole of your running shoe. Include any medical information. Don't wear jewelry.
- Ignore verbal harrassment. Use discretion in acknowledging strangers. Look directly at others and be observant, but keep your distance and keep moving.
- Run against traffic so you can observe approaching vehicles.
- Wear reflective material if you must run before dawn or after dark.
- Use your intuition about a person or area and avoid if you're unsure.
- Practice memorizing license tags or identifying characteristics of strangers.
- Carry a noisemaker.
- Call the police *immediately* if something happens to you or someone else, or you notice anyone out of the ordinary.

Peddlers and Solicitors Must Have Town Permit

A peddler is defined as anyone who carries goods such as candy or firewood from door to door for sale and immediate delivery. Peddlers are required to pay a license tax to the Town and must display the license on their vehicles. Call 255-6321 for more information on peddlers.

A solicitor or canvasser is defined as anyone who goes from door to door taking orders for merchandise such as magazines or services such as home improvements to be delivered at some future date, or requesting donations for a charitable purpose. Canvassers and solicitors are required to obtain a permit and a license from the Town and to show the license on request. They are also required to wear a badge issued and signed by the Director of Finance containing the words "Licensed Solicitor." Call 255-6320 for more information on solicitors and canvassers.

Selling merchandise from a vehicle parked on a street or in a parking lot is prohibited. The Town Manager may grant exemptions from licensing requirements to non-profit groups such as schools, churches and service organizations. If an exemption has been grant-

ed, it will be on file at Town Hall.

Residents who suspect that a solicitor or peddler is operating under fraudulent pretenses or that he may be "casing" the neighborhood for burglary targets should call the police, 255-6366.
