This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

JULY 1987 — The Town of Vienna will activate a new telephone system this month. This new system will offer citizens the option of dialing directly into a specific department. For those who do not know where a call should be directed, the general information number, 255-6300, should be used. The Police Department has expanded its telephone service by offering citizens the option of using a non-emergency number. Please call 255-6366 for information and other non-emergency purposes. The emergency number will not be changed; it remains 938-4900.

JULY 1977 — The Town Council, at a special meeting on July 28, decided to take no action on acquiring the Mini-Park at the intersection of Maple Avenue and Center Street. Council expressed regret at the prospect of losing this green space in the center of the town's business district but agreed that the Town could not afford the purchase price of over \$200,000. In the Council's judgment use of the Mini-Park by town citizens for any real recreation is limited by the heavy traffic on Maple Avenue. For an equivalent amount of money a much larger tract of land more suited to recreation could be purchased and would be a better investment.

JULY 1967 — The new Community Center and the improved park facilities offer a wide variety of leisure activities to all interested residents this summer. The Town Recreation Department is setting up instruction courses (on a fee basis) for golf, tennis, archery, art, guitar, baton twirling, and square dancing — primarily for children, although it is hoped that if enough interest is shown, adult classes in tennis and square dancing can be offered. The Recreation Director will be happy to receive suggestions from residents for additional classes and programs.

Safety "Rules of the Road" Are for Bicyclists of All Ages

With more residents out riding their bicycles during the summer, the following summary is offered to help cyclists of all ages refresh their memories on the laws applying to the operation of bicycles in Virginia:

Traffic Control

Obey all traffic signs, signals, lights and markings. This includes stop signs.

Where to Ride

- ② Ride with the flow of traffic on the right side of the road.
- ② Ride as close as possible to the right edge of the road, except when passing another vehicle, making a left turn, avoiding unsafe conditions, or when the lane width is too narrow to share with a motor vehicle.
- ② Do not ride between two lanes of traffic moving in the same direction, unless one lane is a separate or mandatory turn lane.
- ② Ride single file on streets. Bicyclists may ride two or more abreast on paths or other roadways designated exclusively for bike use.

Riding on the Sidewalk (Vienna ordinance)

- Children under 11 years old may ride a bike on any sidewalk.
- ② Bicyclists of any age may ride on sidewalks wherever it is hazardous to ride in the roadway.
- ② No one is permitted to ride a bike on a sidewalk in any private shopping center.
- ② Always yield the right-of-way to pedestrians on sidewalks.

Changing Directions

- Signal your intention to stop or turn with the left arm. Signals do not have to be given continuously if both hands are needed to control the bike.
- ② Bicyclists may make left turns either as motorists or pedestrians do. To make a pedestrian left turn, continue straight across the intersecting road, obey the traffic signals, turn left at the corner, and proceed as usual. Bicyclists may also dismount and walk in the crosswalks.

Equipment

- C Earphones may not be worn while riding a bike.
- Bikes ridden after dark must have a white headlight visible for at least 500 feet and a red reflector visible for 300 feet to the rear. A red light visible for 500 feet to the rear may be used in place of or in addition to the reflector.
- Bicycles ridden on roadways must have brakes that make the wheels skid on dry, level, clean pavement.

♥ Vienna residents are encouraged to register their bikes with the Police Department to help deter theft. If you would like to register your bicycle or have any questions concerning bike safety, please call the Police Department's Community Services Office at 255-6396.

This July 4th

The Fourth of July just would not be the same without those breathtaking fireworks. Your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department reminds you that those beautiful fireworks can turn your holiday into a tragedy within seconds. Many people are injured each year due to fireworks, and some are injured seriously and left with permanent damage.

Any firework that explodes, emits a flame or sparks higher than 12 feet, or acts as a projectile is prohibited by the Fairfax County Fire Prevention Code. A permit is required for the sale of all fireworks, and these permits are valid only from June 1 to July 15 of each ear.

Many fireworks are not available in Northern Virginia because they are illegal. Firecrackers, cherry bombs and skyrockets are just a few examples of fireworks that may be purchased in other areas but are illegal here. Since even the possession of unapproved fireworks is prohibited in Fairfax County, these fireworks will be confiscated and the person possessing them will be charged with a Class I misdemeanor, which carries a maximum penalty of a \$2,500 fine and/or one year in jail.

Please adhere to the following safety tips for the personal safety of yourself and your loved ones:

- ** When displaying legally purchased, approved fireworks, place them on a flat surface, clear of any combustible material and clear of all buildings.
- * Keep all bystanders at least 20 feet away from fireworks.
- * Read the directions carefully.
- * Do not permit young children to handle or light fireworks.
- * Light only one firework at a time.
- * Never throw fireworks.
- * Sparklers can be very dangerous. Pieces can break off and burn bystanders.
- * Young children should not use sparklers as these can attain a temperature as high as 1800° Fahrenheit.
- * Store fireworks in a cool, dry place.

Please have a safe Fourth of July and stay away from dangerous and illegal fireworks. Remember that there are many public displays available that offer a safe way to view fireworks. If you have any questions about fireworks, call the Fire Prevention Division at 246-4849 or the Life Safety Education Section at 246-3801 or 385-4419(TTY).

JULY 4TH PET PRECAUTIONS

The sound of fireworks exploding can be terrifying to even the most placid pet. To ensure that pets have a safe and peaceful Independence Day, your Fairfax County Animal Shelter recommends leaving pets inside, with all windows and curtains closed and the air conditioner on at a normal level. This will muffle the frightening sounds outside. Pets not ordinarily allowed inside the house should be sheltered in the basement or garage, with plenty of fresh water. If a pet is particularly nervous, speak to a veterinarian about tranquilizing the animal during the holiday. Make sure all pets wear identification tags just in case they become lost. For additional advice, call the Animal Shelter at 830-1100.

Traffic Calming Recommendations Submitted to Town Council

E.L. Tennyson, the transportation engineer engaged by the Town to conduct a town-wide traffic calming study, has submitted his report to the Town Council. Copies of the report are available for public review in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall.

Mr. Tennyson's recommendations for traffic calming include the use of residential traffic circles and speed dips, humps, or bumps; adjustments to traffic signals; no left turns at certain locations during peak traffic hours; installation or removal of stop signs; warning signs at pedestrian and bicycle crossings; construction of sidewalks; improvements in bus service; and other miscellaneous recommendations.

These recommendations are based on comments received at meetings held earlier this year with residents from all quadrants of town and with Vienna business people, as well as analyses of traffic speeds, accident numbers and rates, traffic volumes, and traffic peaking rates.

The Town Council has forwarded the traffic calming report to the Transportation Safety Commission for review and comment.



Motorists Urged to Watch for And Yield to Pedestrians

IT'S THE LAW! Your Transportation Safety Commission reminds you that the driver of any vehicle must yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian crossing the street at any marked crosswalk, whether at mid-block or at the end of the block, or at any intersection.

The Code of Virginia states, "The drivers of vehicles entering, crossing, or turning at intersections shall change their course, slow down, or stop if necessary to permit pedestrians to cross such intersections safely and expeditiously. Pedestrians crossing at intersections shall at all times have the right-of-way over vehicles making turns into the highways being crossed by the pedestrains."

Motorists are urged always to be alert to the possible presence of pedestrians, especially when turning right on red, and to yield the right-of-way with courtesy.

Pedestrians must also act responsibly and not disregard approaching traffic. The American Automobile Association offers these safe walking tips:

- · Cross only at designated crosswalks and at intersections.
- · At signalized crosswalks, cross only on the proper signal.
- · Look all ways (not just both ways) before crossing.
- · Walk facing traffic where there are no sidewalks.
- · Wear reflective material after dark.
- Always watch for cars even when you have the legal right-of-way.

Council Adopts FY 98 Budget

The Town Council has adopted Vienna's budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. The budget for all funds totals \$16,997,870, an increase of \$495,536 or about 3% over last

The general fund budget of \$11,430,901 is based on a real estate tax rate of 31¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation, an increase of 1¢ over FY 97. This is the first tax rate increase since 1992.

The water and sewer fund budget is \$3,892,930. The water rate for town residents will increase from \$2.18 to \$2.27 per 1,000 gallons, and the sewer rate will increase from \$2.55 to \$2.89. For the average customer (usage of 25,000 gallons per quarter), these rate adjustments will result in a total annual increase of about \$43.

Yard Sale Reminder

Each household in town may hold two garage/yard sales per year. Two advertising signs, no larger than four square feet each. may be displayed on the property where the sale takes place, and two directional signs, no larger than two square feet each, may be placed on other private property with the owner's permission. Signs are not permitted on public property, in the public right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement). or on utility poles. Illegally placed signs will be removed. Town Receives VDOT Funds

The Virginia Department of Transportation has announced that the Town of Vienna's application for the "Streetscape Connection Project" was accepted into the Transportation Enhancement Program and allocated \$120,000. The money will be used to reimburse the Town for the construction of brick sidewalks connecting Maple Avenue and Church Street. The Town's project was number 14 in order of allocated dollars out of the 45 projects selected to receive funds totaling \$4.5 million.

In addition, the Six-year Improvement Program approved recently by the Commonwealth Transportation Board includes the following projects for Vienna: Cottage Street from Locust Street to Moore Avenue and from Moore to Cedar Lane; Branch Road from Maple Avenue to Valley Drive; and Beulah Road from Maple Avenue to the town line. The total cost for these projects, which will run through fiscal year 2002-03. is \$13.067 million. The Town will be required to pay a 2% share of the cost, or about \$261,134.

Town Employees Honored for Outstanding Service

Eleven Town of Vienna employees and two employee groups received 1996 Outstanding Performance Awards in a ceremony held recently at the Vienna Community Center. These annual awards recognize employees not only for their exemplary job performance, but also for their extra efforts in service to the public that go beyond the scope of their normal duties. Nominations from each department are reviewed by an impartial panel of judges, who make the final selection of award winners. The contributions of this year's winners are summarized on these two pages.

Jeannette Brasek, Administrative Secretary, Department of Public Works. Jeannette's high levels of energy and efficiency were put to the test last year in two major projects. First, during the Town Hall renovation she was instrumental in coordinating the relocation of the entire administrative office to temporary quarters - and then back again to its permanent location without any disruption of the normal office routine. Second, within a two-week period last fall she coordinated the processing of over 600 Special Pickup requests. These are just two of many examples of Jeannette's outstanding dedication to the residents of Vienna and to the effective operation of her department.

Nancy Ciatti, Personnel Assistant, Administrative Services. Last year, Nancy took the lead in organizing an employee family picnic and a pot luck luncheon at Christmas time. The enthusiasm she showed for these activities grew into the formation of an Employee Morale Committee that now operates year round planning social events for employees on a very limited budget. Also in 1996, during the renovation of Town Hall, Nancy willingly took on the role of decorator and interior designer, providing professional quality service at no cost to the Town and spending countless hours of her own time searching for and selecting just the right furniture and accessories to make the Town Hall offices pleasant and functional.

Grace Davis, Personnel Assistant,
Administrative Services. Grace is always
diligent and meticulous in ensuring that no
task is forgotten or deadline missed in an
office that handles many diverse programs
and activities. This outstanding quality was
really put to the test during the renovation of
Town Hall, when Grace's supervisor was
often unavailable during the day-to-day operations of the office. Also in 1996, Grace
undertook the administration of the annual
hearing exams for the Public Works and
Parks Maintenance employees. This activity

requires the tracking of more than 70 employees through scheduling of appointments, interaction with the clinic, follow-up testing for some, and explaining test results to the employees. Despite the countless rounds of missed and rescheduled appointments, Grace was able to complete the entire project on her own and in a timely manner.

John DeLaVergne, Meter Section Supervisor, Water and Sewer Division. Since becoming Supervisor in the fall of 1995, John has shepherded the Meter Section through a period of organizational change, earning the respect of both his subordinates and superiors, and becoming thoroughly familiar with technical aspects of work to which he had not been exposed previously. John holds a Masters Certificate in plumbing, and his knowledge has proven invaluable. Because of his expertise, a major water theft was discovered at a local car wash and a subsequent bill rendered for \$8,000. An individual with less plumbing knowledge may not have noticed the plumbing changes made illegally at the business. John has now designed and is fabricating a lock for large meter bypasses, which will prevent future water thefts.


Gerry Fink, Maintenance Worker IV. Streets Maintenance Division. For the past two years, in addition to his regular duties, Gerry has accepted the responsibility of Safety Instructor for all six divisions within the Public Works Department. This position entails gathering and compiling the latest safety information and then conveying it in a way that can be understood by all employees and applied to many different job situations. The position also includes instructing and examining candidates for the Commercial Driver's License, which requires a complete working knowledge and understanding of the safety devices installed on all Town vehicles and heavy equipment. A safe worker means fewer injuries, more productivity, and lower insurance premiums. Gerry has made a difference in improving the quality of work performed by Town employees.

Gregory E. Hembree, Director of

Planning and Zoning. Greg's Outstanding Performance Award is based on his leadership of the Planning and Zoning Department. He leads by example, and imparts to all of his employees an attitude of integrity, fairness, and team work with other departments. He has assembled a staff that reflects his desire and ability to enforce the Town's zoning ordinances fully, but in an evenhanded and often creative manner that has quashed the stereotype that a Planning and Zoning Department must be "the enemy." Greg and his staff have also provided much of the analysis and insight that led to the successful completion of the Church Street renovation project and the ongoing "vision" for Vienna's commercial areas. As we enter a new century. Greg will continue to have a significant impact on the direction of development in our town.

John R. King, Maintenance Worker III, Parks Maintenance Division. In 1996, John took major steps in his professional development and is recognized for this outstanding effort and its benefits to the Town. He was an eager participant in three leadership/supervisor training courses, and as a result he has been given increased leadership responsibilities whenever the Superintendent is absent. John also attended two playground safety courses and recently took the exam to become a National Certified Playground Inspector. In addition, John has acquired the skills (learned mainly on his own) to repair the ballfield irrigation system at Waters and Caffi Fields, saving the Town approximately \$1,000 last year by avoiding the cost of parts and labor that would have been charged by an independent contractor.

Nancy E. Novak, Director of Administrative Services. Nancy has earned this Outstanding Performance Award not so much for one or two individual accomplishments but rather for the broad range of work
