NOVEMBER 1987 — Historic Vienna, Inc. will sponsor a formal dedication of the Broadwater Cemetery as a historic site at 1 p.m. Sunday, November 8. The cemetery is located at the corner of Tapawingo Road and Frederick Street, S.W., the former site of "Springfield," home of Col. Charles Broadwater, who served with George Washington in the French and Indian War. The cemetery contains memorial markers to Col. Broadwater; his son, Lt. Charles L. Broadwater, who served in the American Revolution; and his grandson, Lt. Charles Guy Broadwater, a veteran of the War of 1812.

NOVEMBER 1977 — Moorefield, the oldest house still standing in Vienna, has been placed on the Virginia Landmarks Register and nominated to the National Register of Historic Places. The house is located at 900 Moorefield Hill Ct., S.W., in the center of the Townes of Moorefield subdivision. It was built around 1790 and was for many years the home of Baptist minister Jeremiah Moore and his family. It is believed that Moore influenced Thomas Jefferson, George Mason, and other leaders of the American Revolution through his speeches and writings for the causes of religious freedom and separation of church and state.

NOVEMBER 1967 — Vienna Community Center ID cards for children will be issued beginning November 4. Those moving to another school level will be required to obtain a new ID card. Any students new in town may also register at this time. The fall recreation program for youngsters at the Community Center includes roller skating for children and teenagers, teen dances, and a teen employment agency.

## Real Estate Tax Due Next Month

The second installment on 1997 Town of Vienna real estate tax bills is due on December 5. Mailed payments must be postmarked on or before that date. Late payments will be assessed a penalty of 10% or \$5, whichever is greater, along with interest at 10%, which accrues until payment is made.

If you pay your real estate taxes directly to the Town rather than through a mort-gage company and you have not received your bill by November 15, please call the real estate office in the Finance Department at Town Hall, 255-6325, and make arrangements to pay your bill by December 5 to avoid penalty and interest charges.

If your Vienna taxes are paid through your mortgage company and you receive the tax bill, please notify your mortgage company immediately so it can make payment by the due date.

If you have sold the property and are not responsible for the tax bill you receive, please notify the real estate office immediately.

## **Meeting Scheduled** On Expansion Of Virginia Center

The Southwest Vienna Citizens Association will hold a meeting on Tuesday, November 11, to discuss the impact on town residents of a proposal to increase the commercial space at Virginia Center from 650,000 to 850,000 square feet. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the Vienna Elementary School cafeteria.

Virginia Center is located just outside the southwest town limit near the Vienna Metro Station. The Town Council has expressed to Fairfax County officials its strong opposition to the proposed expansion, which the County staff has estimated would increase daily traffic in the area by 25%.

The Southwest Vienna Citizens Association supports the Town Council's position on the matter and urges all interested citizens to attend the November 11 meeting to learn more about this proposal's potential impact on Vienna residents.

## **Update on Town Projects**


I hope you have had the opportunity to take a stroll down Church Street to enjoy the new streetscape and flowers. If you haven't yet done so, stop by the Freeman Store some nice weekend, pick up a free copy of the walking tour guide of historic Church Street, and take a stroll. The Church Street Vision Subcommittee of the Town/Business Liaison Committee (TBLC), which includes TBLC members, an architect, and several prominent business people, is developing a novel "incentive zoning" concept to encourage restoration and redevelopment along Church Street that is reminiscent of the architecture of small-town America at the turn of the century. This voluntary concept involves the merger of several land use and zoning laws and regulations, and will soon be ready for presentation to the public and appropriate Town committees for review. The Northern Virginia Planning District Commission-Community Appearance Alliance recently presented the Town with an award for the Church Street project.

Construction of a similar streetscape on Maple Avenue is scheduled to begin in late spring/early summer. Because of all the traffic on Maple Avenue and the nature of some businesses there, some people have questioned the wisdom of this project. It is important, however, to remember three basic facts: First, nothing stays the same, towns included. Towns either continue to improve or they decline. (This is especially true for Vienna, which is surrounded by a sea of high density commercial and retail development.) Second, people like to see, visit and shop in pretty places. And third, some of the business establishments along Maple Avenue have improved their appearance and some nice new buildings have been added The Town should do its part to encourage these efforts because a vibrant business community means a dynamic town. Because of all the traffic, this will be a difficult project and will require good planning to minimize the impact on the business community and patience by all of us during the construction process. As much work as possible will be done at night when traffic is the lightest and most businesses are closed. The TBLC is considering formation of another

subcommittee to keep the business community and public informed of work schedules on a timely basis. Additionally, the Town is cooperating with local service organizations to permit the sale of personalized bricks to be installed in the Maple Avenue sidewalks.

To encourage the renovation of homes and businesses, the Town Council will soon be reconsidering a tax abatement for home improvements. As you may recall, some time ago Council considered granting tax relief to persons renovating their property. The matter was deferred to let Fairfax County establish its tax abatement program first and then make our program coincide with the County's. That would achieve the best overall result. The County has now passed its tax abatement ordinance, under which a person who puts an addition on his home or renovates it and thereby increases its assessed value by at least 25% will not pay increased taxes on the difference in value for a period of ten years. The increased taxes will then phase in over a fiveyear period. Unfortunately, the County ordinance restricts the size of the addition/renovation to less than 30% of the square footage of the building. This effectively precludes adding a second story on rambler style homes, and severely restricts the size of additions. I believe the limitation was supposed to be 30% of lot coverage to prevent overbuilding on a lot and the elimination of open space. I have discussed this with most of the County Supervisors and suspect it will be reconsidered. The Town's abatement program will consider this situation and others in a slightly different manner than the County ordinance, and public hear-

ings should take place this winter. I still get a number of complaints from residents about neighboring properties that are literally a mess. Most of these are rental properties, and neither the renter nor owner cares about maintaining the property. Complaints include derelict untagged cars, cars parked everywhere, multiple families renting one home, operating unapproved businesses in a home, weeds and debris on the property, etc. Some of these conditions violate Town ordinances, and all have a detrimental effect by lowering property values



and destroying neighborhoods. The Town staff pursues these complaints, but the regulatory process is lengthy and is complicated by efforts to locate and communicate with absentee landlords. As many of you know, I have trying for some time to have an ordinance enacted, similar to those in other jurisdictions, that requires persons renting residential property to obtain a "rental permit" or "occupancy permit." Such a permit would require the property owner to be responsible for maintenance of the property in keeping with Town regulations. My efforts to date have been unsuccessful due to some quirks in Virginia state law and the vocal objections of a few landlords and real estate agents. (Why they object I don't understand as it is in their best interests as well.) The Town staff has increased its processing of these sorts of complaints, but if you have a continuing problem in your neighborhood, please call the Town Planning and Zoning Department at 255-6342, or call me or any of my colleagues on the Town Council, and we will keep trying.

We will soon start addressing the recommendations concerning traffic calming. The report is currently being reviewed by the Transportation Safety Commission. Also, we will soon be considering the need for an additional bond issue to continue capital improvements throughout the town. Included in the list of desired projects are additional sidewalks, road repairs, and continued sewer and water upgrades. Please let me know of other projects you consider worthy of inclusion. ## Robert M. Curry

The Town of Vienna has lost a dedicated public servant and community activist with the death of Robert M. Curry on September 26. Mr. Curry was a Town employee for 30 years, originally hired in 1958 as superintendent of Vienna's sewage treatment plants. When the plants were closed in 1963, he became Zoning Administrator and upon his retirement in 1987 began part-time work as Town Printer. He was appointed to the Board of Zoning Ap-

Mr. Curry was an active member of the Vienna (Host) Lions Club, probably best known for his efforts each year at the Lions' Christmas tree lot and July 4th bratwurst booth. He also served on the Board of Directors of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department, where he was a team leader for fund-raising activities.

## **Joint Work Session On Traffic Calming** Recommendations

The Town Council has scheduled a joint work session with the Transportation Safety Commission to discuss the recommendations of E.L. Tennyson, the transportation engineer engaged by the Town to conduct a town-wide traffic calming study earlier this year. The work session will be held on Monday, November 10, at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. No public testimony is heard at work sessions, but citizens are welcome to attend.

Mr. Tennyson's recommendations for traffic calming include the use of residential traffic circles and speed dips, humps, or bumps; adjustments to traffic signals; no left turns at certain locations during peak traffic hours; installation or removal of stop signs; warning signs at pedestrian and bicycle crossings; construction of sidewalks; improvements in bus service; and other miscellaneous recommendations.

These recommendations are based on comments received at meetings with residents from all quadrants of town and with Vienna business people, as well as analyses of traffic speeds, accident numbers and rates, traffic volumes, and traffic peaking rates. Copies of the report are available for public review in the Town Clerk's Office at Town


## Sidewalk Etiquette






