MARCH 1988 — An air quality control monitor will be installed soon at Marshall Road Elementary School, located at Nutley Street and Marshall Road in southwest Vienna, to monitor the quality of air in the vicinity of the Vienna Metro station and the Virginia Center development. The monitor was obtained through the efforts of the Southwest Vienna Citizens Association, Fairfax County Supervisor Martha Pennino, and the Town. It will be a continuous air pollution monitoring system with a wind sensor on the roof of the building.

MARCH 1978 — Location of the K Route Metrorail terminal station will be on the Town Council's agenda for March 20. All interested citizens are invited to attend this meeting and express their preference for either a Vienna or a Tysons Corner location. For more than 15 years, Council has tried to prevent high-density development in the vicinity of the proposed Vienna station and to have the station relocated to a site farther west. The Town is not an official participant in the selection but has input through Fairfax County.

MARCH 1968 — Citizens are now enjoying the new two-story addition to the Vienna Community Center, which opened last month. The addition includes a music room, storage room and a lounge on the lower level, and restrooms and meeting rooms on the upper floor. "The financing of a major portion of this building through public subscription was a unique venture in itself, almost unheard of in our modern era," wrote Mayor Jim Martinelli. "Our Community Center is a gift of the citizens of Vienna to ourselves and to our children, as our investment and faith in the future of our town."

Town Limits Number of People Per Dwelling Unit

Many residential property owners rent part of their house, townhouse or condominium, or if they own more than one residence, may rent the second. Your Vienna Planning and Zoning Department reminds you that the Town limits the number of individuals who can live in any residential dwelling.

Either a "family" or "family equivalent" is permitted to occupy a single-family home, townhouse, condo or apartment. The Town Code defines these terms as follows:

- A family is one or more persons related by blood or marriage occupying a single housekeeping unit and using common cooking facilities. In addition to the persons related by blood or marriage, not more than two boarders or lodgers are permitted.
- A family equivalent is two or more individuals *not* related by blood or marriage and not exceeding four persons.

Private apartments that are separated from the main dwelling unit and "in-law suites" are prohibited by the Town Code.

Please keep these regulations in mind if you rent part of your home or a second residence. For more information, call the Planning and Zoning Department at 255-6341.

Attention Businesses!

All businesses in Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business license by May 1 each year. Look for the license tax form in the mail next month. The annual license tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. For more information, call 255-6321.

Water Main Flushing

Each spring, the Town of Vienna flushes the water mains in its distribution system in order to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. The preventive maintenance program begins in early April, and water mains are usually flushed between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Water mains are flushed by opening the fire hydrants and allowing the water to flow freely for a short period of time. The flushing cleans out sediment that normally accumulates during the summer and winter, and enables the Town to test and perform routine maintenance on the 800+ fire hydrants within its service area.

Flushing may result in some discoloration and the presence of sediment in the water reaching your home or business. These conditions are not harmful and should be of short duration. The Town appreciates your tolerance of this inconvenience. If you need more information, please call the Water & Sewer Customer Service Office at 255-6385.

Car Tags Go on Sale March 16

1998 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals go on sale Monday, March 16, and must be displayed by midnight April 15. Decals may be purchased by mail or in person in the Finance Department at Town Hall. (Military personnel must apply in person.)

Decals cost \$20 for passenger cars and trucks under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles.

Information for pre-printed application forms for 1998 decals was taken from 1997 records; therefore, if your vehicle was not registered in Vienna last year, you will not automatically receive an application in the mail. Call 255-6323 or visit the Finance Department to obtain forms.

Town of Vienna residents do not need to purchase Fairfax County vehicle decals, but they must pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. Personal property tax forms are available at Town Hall for the convenience of Vienna residents. For information about personal property tax, call the County Office of Assessments at 222-8234.

TOWN RECEIVES BUDGET AWARD — For the fourth consecutive year, the Town of Vienna has received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada. This award, for the fiscal year 1997–98 budget, is the highest form of recognition given for governmental budgeting. In order to receive the budget award, a jurisdiction must satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how well a government's budget serves as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide, and a communications device. Budget documents must be rated "proficient" in all of these categories to receive the award.

Nancy E. Novak, Vienna's Director of Administrative Services, received a Certificate of Recognition for Budget Presentation as the individual primarily responsible for achieving the award.

Copies of the budget are available for public review at Town Hall.

DECEMBER 15, 1997

- Following a public hearing, adopted a resolution applying for a federal grant to help fund the construction of nine bus shelters and the purchase of nine trash receptacles along Maple Avenue.
- Adopted an ordinance vacating the Avr Hill Avenue right-of-way between Park and Mill Streets, N.E. Proceeds from the sale of the three parcels are to be used for sidewalk construction throughout the town.
- Approved a request by Green Hedges School, 415 Windover Ave., N.W., for a site plan modification to increase lot coverage to 34.5%. The modification is granted with the understanding that the school has no plans to increase enrollment or construct additional facilities beyond those cited in the application.

Waived the public street improvement requirements and instead will require construction of a storm drainage system along Windover Avenue to an existing system near Nutley Street. Required \$7,148.20 be placed in escrow, which may be used by the Town to construct a meandering asphalt

sidewalk from the school to Nutley Street. Input from abutting property owners and the Malcolm-Windover Heights Civic Association will be considered in deciding whether to install the sidewalk.

Supported the Planning Commission's recommendation to the Board of Zoning Appeals to permit the Kilmer house, located on the school property, to be used as a residence while Mrs. Kilmer lives there and then to limit the house to administrative

Council Considering Guidelines for Location of Telecommunication Facilities in Vienna

The Town Council is considering adopting interim guidelines for the location of telecommunications facilities, antennas, etc. within the town limits. The guidelines and encouraged locations as identified on the map are necessitated by the 1996 Federal Communication Act, which has controversial implications for local governments' abilityto regulate the location of towers and other telecommunication facilities.

To help guard against the uncontrolled placement of these facilities, the Town Council is considering guidelines to minimize their impact on surrounding neighborhoods and properties. The proposal recommends that these facilities be limited to the commercial and industrial areas of town and Town-owned properties except for parkland. The guidelines also continue to require that a conditional use permit be approved by the Town and spell out several buffering and screening measures. They also discourage the use of monopoles and encourage shared facilities by multiple providers.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries will be Saturday, March 7, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Town property yard, 247 Nutley St., N.W. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens with a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 255-6381.

Too often used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of used oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water; in this way tons of toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic are released into the environment. When recycled, cleaned of its impurities and re-refined, used oil is a valuable resource that can be remanufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia, it is illegal to dispose of automobile leadacid (wet-cell) batteries with refuse.

Tax Relief Applications Due April 1 for Low-income Elderly and Disabled Citizens

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for low-income homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. To qualify, the following requirements must be met:

- Total household income of \$40,000 or less. This amount excludes \$6,500 of income of relatives, other than the spouse, who reside in the household. Also excluded is \$7,500 of any income received by a homeowner who is permanently and totally disabled. Where the total combined income is between \$30,000 and \$35,000, a 50% tax relief is given, and between \$35,000 and \$40,000 a 25% tax relief.
- Total combined assets of no more than \$150,000. This amount excludes the value of the residence, up to one acre of land, and household furnishings.
 - Disabled persons applying for the first time must show evidence of disability.

In addition to real estate tax relief, Fairfax County provides grants to senior citizens and disabled citizens who rent their residences. The County also provides relief from personal property tax for one automobile per household. The assets and income limitations for these programs are different from the real estate limits. The Town of Vienna provides all relief recipients one free auto decal.

Both Town and County applications must be filed. Applications for 1998 for all programs are due April 1. This date may be extended to December 31 of the year following the year the application was due if the applicant is applying for relief for the first time or if hardship conditions exist which through no fault of the applicant prohibit applying by April 1.





As I write this in mid-February, I am in Richmond experiencing "crossover" for the first time. We are working into the wee hours most nights this week in order to deal with all of our House bills, so that we can send them over to the Senate. This is another record year for bills, as almost 3,000 were introduced this session.

I am pleased to be able to report that two of the three bills that I am sponsoring for the Town of Vienna have already passed through the House and are in the Senate. One will allow the Town to prohibit certain commercial vehicles from being parked on residential streets. The second bill will help expedite appointments to the Board of Zoning Appeals in the 19th Circuit Court District, which includes all of Fairfax County and the cities and towns within. I want to thank Town Councilman Steve Briglia for coming down to Richmond early one morning to speak on behalf of this bill.

The third bill, which deals with blighted properties, has made it through committee and will be voted on by the full House this week. This legislation, which will help the Town tremendously, is controversial and has been a little tougher to get through. Thanks to Mayor Charlie Robinson, Councilman Al Boudreau, and Town Attorney John Gionfriddo for taking the time to come to Richmond to lend a hand.
