APRIL 1988 — "This Was Vienna, Virginia," a new book by local historians Mayo and Connie Stuntz, will be on sale after April 30. From the early times of Indians, land grants, and the 1742 Fairfax County Court House near Tysons Corner, the book chronicles the evolution of 14 Vienna area 18th and 19th century plantations/farms and notes the origins of early roads and mills. The book also contains chapters on Vienna from 1840 to 1869, the Civil War and post-war years, some of the early black families in Vienna, roads and maps after the Civil War to 1879, schools, churches and more.

APRIL 1978 — Vienna police issued over 200 speeding tickets throughout town in April. This is a substantial increase over the number of citations normally issued during a one-month period. The Town Council recently called for stepped-up radar operations to control speeding on residential streets. From March 29 through April 30, radar was operated 65 times and 223 tickets were issued. In comparison, 56 drivers were ticketed in January and 87 in February.

APRIL 1968 — Celebration of the 4th of July and entertaining of foreign visitors is a long-standing tradition in Vienna. As part of our pride in country and community, Vienna residents have opened their homes on July 4th to foreign visitors who are in this country to let them enjoy a little bit of our hospitality and heritage. Temporary Signs Usually Illegal

Temporary signs advertising garage sales, real estate sales, lost pets, and all sorts of business services such as yard work and home improvements pop up on telephone poles, stop signs, street signs, in yards, and along public rights-of-way.

The Planning and Zoning Department reminds citizens that this clutter of signs is an eyesore and, in most instances, against the Town Code. The next time a yard sale or other activity prompts you to post a sign, please keep the following regulations in mind:

- It is unlawful to place signs on street lights, telephone poles, or permanent signs, or to place a sign without a permit within 10 feet of the curb or edge of pavement.
- A maximum of two real estate directional signs may be displayed on Saturdays and Sundays only.
- •The following yard/garage sale signs are permitted: two signs of four square feet on the property where the sale will take place; and four directional signs of two square feet.



Briefing on Virginia Center Project Set for April 6 Council Meeting

At its April 6 meeting, the Town Council will hear from representatives of Hazel-Peterson on the status of that company's proposal for Virginia Center. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall, and all interested citizens are encouraged to attend.

Virginia Center is located on Vienna's southwest border near the Vienna Metro station. The Town Council expressed strong opposition to Hazel-Peterson's original proposed amendment to the Fairfax County Comprehensive Plan, which would have increased the commercial space allowance at Virginia Center from 650,000 to 850,000 square feet. According to a County staff report, this expansion of Virginia Center for office use would increase overall daily traffic by 25% and peak hour traffic by 21%. The impact would be felt on Nutley Street, Marshall Road, Kingsley Road, Tapawingo Road, Courthouse Road, and throughout Vienna's southwest quadrant.

Hazel-Peterson is now offering a compromise proposal, a mix of hotel and office space that would increase the total space allowance to a maximum of 800,000 square feet and generate less traffic than offices only, especially during peak hours.

Police Dept. Reports Big Increase In Enforcement of Traffic Laws

During 1997, in response to community concerns about cut-through commuter traffic on residential streets and the aggressive driving violations associated with it, such as speeding and running red lights and stop signs, the Vienna Police Department recorded a 34% overall increase in traffic law enforcement. Over 9,000 traffic citations were issued last year compared to 6,693 in 1996.

The department's annual report, which is available for public review at police headquarters, also describes progress toward other 1997 goals and objectives: implementation of computer generated crime summaries in the "incident based reporting" format; completion of the state accreditation process; and conversion to a computer aided dispatch system that will reduce duplication of data, provide timelier and more accurate records of reported crimes and calls for service, and enhance officer safety through the encoding of information about hazards and prior calls for service.

Among the department's goals for 1998 is the establishment of a pilot "photo red light" program at three intersections to monitor red light violations. While the number of citations for this offense nearly doubled in 1977, the average number of violations still averages two to four per hour. If the Town Council grants final approval for the program, equipment could be in place by late summer.

Sen. Howell's Richmond Wrap-up

Dear Friends:

As I write this, the hours wind down on the 1998 session of the General Assembly, and I am thinking about how best to describe the session to you. I came here 60 days ago intent on working on tax relief and school construction funding. At this very moment I don't know if we will finish our business by the March 14 deadline because we do not have a budget. The Senate Republicans, at the request of Gov. Gilmore, killed the compromise car tax and school construction legislation which had the support of all 100 Delegates and 18 Senators. We are still hoping the art of compromise will be demonstrated.

For the last few years I have concentrated on some long-term legislative studies, and some of these bills came to culmination this year. The most noteworthy is Senate Bill 369, Megan's Law, which will give the community access to information on convicted sex offenders who live in their neighborhoods. My Genetic Privacy Act will now be permanently in the code. This legislation ensures that health insurers cannot discriminate against policy holders because of their genetic profile and cannot disclose private genetic information to anyone without the patient's consent. From the Commission on Family Violence Prevention, which I have chaired for the last three years, we finished the legislation identified over the life of the commission to help families, law enforcement and the court system in identifying causes of and responses to family violence.

Closer to home, I was the chief patron of two bills important to your Mayor and Town Council. Both passed. One had to do with appointments to the Board of Zoning Appeals, and the other allows Vienna to prohibit parking certain commercial vehicles in residentially zoned areas.

I look forward to seeing you in Vienna at Town meetings, civic gatherings and all the festivals. Solving problems through the legislative process is so exciting. I love serving the residents of the 32nd Senate District and appreciate your allowing me to serve you.

- Conducted an executive session to discuss an appointment to fill a vacancy on the Transportation Safety Commission.
- Following a public hearing, authorized the issuance of general obligation bonds in the maximum amount of \$4.9 million. The bonds will be used to fund various public improvement projects, including supplemental funds for the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project and the Northside Public Works Facility Project, improvements to the Vienna Community Center, reconstruction of DeSale Street and Branch Road, sidewalk construction projects, traffic signal improvements, storm drainage projects, Wolf Trap Creek drainage design, and water and sewer system improvements.

Appointed Mary Ellen Larkins to the Transportation Safety Commission for a two-year term.

BEAUTY TIP: If you maintain trees, do yourself a favor and don't top them ever. Topping trees can cause rotting, sunburn, and decreased wind resistance. Topped trees require more maintenance, increase liability, and are aesthetically offensive. Topped trees are appraised at lower values than properly maintained trees. If a tree overgrows its place, it is safer and more economical to remove the tree and plant a smaller variety that will not outgrow the space.

Tax Exemption Approved For Home Improvements

The Town Council has adopted an ordinance to provide a partial real estate tax exemption for the renovation, rehabilitation or replacement of certain residential and commercial

For single-family homes, the following requirements must be met in order to qualify for the exemption:

- The structure must be at least 25 years old.
- The improvement must increase the assessed value of the structure by a minimum
- The improved structure may not exceed the total square footage of the footprint of the original structure by more than 30% and may not cause lot coverage of the site
- A building permit must be obtained before any construction begins and a certificate of occupancy issued for the completed work. Property owners will apply for the tax exemption at the same time they apply for the building permit.
- Applications for tax exemptions must by made before September 2002.

The exemption will run for ten years at 100%, with the exemption percentage tapering down to zero over the next four years. The exemption is non-transferable between owners.

The ordinance also addresses tax exemptions for improvements to multifamily and commercial buildings. Copies of the ordinance are available for review in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall.




