SEPTEMBER 1988 — The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority has begun to repave, expand and improve the Washington & Old Dominion Regional Trail from Falls Church to Vienna. The \$274,250 project is scheduled to be completed by November. The paved trail will be widened from eight to ten feet to help bicyclists and pedestrians pass each other safely. Other improvements include better drainage and a three-foot wide gravel jogging/walking path adjacent to the asphalt trail.

SEPTEMBER 1978 — The Town Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed widening and improvement of Park Street on September 23 at the Community Center. Council scheduled the hearing in response to a State Highway Department memorandum concerning the project's impact on the trees along Park Street. The memo states that about 700 trees will be removed, die or decline if the street is widened. At the public hearing, Council will try to determine from citizen sentiment whether to pursue the matter further.

SEPTEMBER 1968 — All residents have no doubt noticed the new planting of trees along the median strip on the eastern end of Maple Avenue and on the town side of the street. These are the same red maples that are planted along the rest of Maple. A further planting will be made in the spring. May we all live long enough to enjoy the cool spread of their branches as we drive to and from town.

Are Rats a Problem Where You Live?

Even the nicest neighborhoods can have rodent problems. Rats and mice have no respect for economic level or status. They have adapted to live in close association with people, causing property damage and spreading disease.

A successful rodent control program consists of good sanitation, "rodent-proofing" measures, and baiting or trapping. If you see signs of rodent infestation, call the Fairfax County Health Department, 246-2300, and make an appointment for a survey of the surrounding neighborhood to determine what is attracting the rats or mice and how best to remedy the situation.

Rodent infestation is often related to the following:

- 1. Bird seed or pet food left outside for long periods of time;
- 2. Use of plastic trash bags or trash cans without tight-fitting lids;
 - 3. Food scraps in compost piles; or
- 4. Ripened fruit left under trees or vegetables left in the garden to rot.

A pamphlet is available from the Health Department that includes information on how to spot rodent infestation, rodent-proofing your home, eliminating food sources, and trapping and baiting.

Special Pickup Deadline October 1

Thursday, October 1, is the last day for Town of Vienna residents to call for a Special Trash Pickup this year. Because of fall leaf collection, no Special Pickups are made in November and December.

To dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording *promptly* at 255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount of debris, and type of debris.

Each residence is entitled to receive two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle"). Additional pickups cost \$75 per load for all items except brush. The fee for additional loads of brush is \$25 each.

Sewer Backups Are Costly! Backup Insurance Is Not!

All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company.

The Town's insurance carrier rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

To help prevent sewer backups, the Public Works Department cleans the main sewer lines whenever residents notify the department that their service laterals have been rodded by a commercial sewer cleaning service. Pressure cleaning to remove material washed into the main sewer line from the service lateral may help prevent future blockage of the main line. If you have your sewer service lateral cleaned, please call the Public Works Department at 255-6381.

Special Pickup Deadline October 1

Please Follow These Special Pickup Guidelines

Thursday, October 1, is the last day to call for a Special Pickup in 1998. Residents are asked to follow the guidelines below to ensure an efficient Special Pickup:

- Building materials wood, broken concrete, building brick and block, fences, drywall and paneling will be picked up. Masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. are limited to 300 pounds per pickup (about two wheelbarrow loads). Building materials generated by contractors and/or persons employed by homeowners to renovate, repair and/or perform maintenance on their homes will not be picked up.
- Sod, small stumps, brush, trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches and no more than 8 feet in length will be picked up. The Special Pickup crews do not collect any tree parts over six inches in diameter. Most logs are greater than six inches and, therefore, they are not acceptable. The reason for this regulation is that the tub grinder used by the Public Works Department to make wood mulch cannot handle tree parts over this size. Logs, stumps and other large tree parts can be disposed of at the Fairfax County Transfer Station on West Ox Road or at the County Landfill in Lorton. Leaves are not picked up by Special Pickup crews.
 - Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment will be picked up.
- Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal and small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires will be picked up. Tires must be removed from the rim. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.
- Two major appliances per residence will be picked up. These include stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces.
- Old heating oil tanks, gas tanks, and pressurized tanks such as propane, air or freon will not be picked up. Fuel tanks, paint cans, insecticides, and other hazardous wastes, and biohazardous waste including needles and syringes, will not be picked up. For information about hazardous waste disposal, call 324-5068.
- Please separate brush, appliances, building materials, etc. from each other. This makes it easier for pickup crews to salvage recyclable items, reducing the amount of debris taken to the landfill.
 - For the safety of Special Pickup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.
 - Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.
- Please keep Special Pickup items away from regular trash and recyclables, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences and utility poles.

Residents are reminded to call the Special Pickup number, 255-5727, as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard.

When an "illegal" pile of trash is spotted by or reported to Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a Special Pickup within 48 hours. Otherwise, the debris will be collected anyway and that address charged for one of its two annual free Special Pickups, or if both pickups have already been made, it will be charged for an additional pickup.



September 28 Public Hearings

At its September 28 meeting, the Town Council will hold public hearings on two proposed amendments to the zoning code. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

One of the amendments would establish procedures for abating the nuisance of "blighted properties," defined as "any buildings or combination thereof which, by reason of dilapidation, obsolescence, overcrowding, faulty arrangement of design, lack of ventilation, light and sanitary facilities, excessive land coverage, deleterious land use or obsolete layout, or any combination of these or other factors, are detrimental to the safety, health, morals, or welfare of the community."

The other amendment would make it illegal to park certain types of commercial vehicles in residential zones. (A companion amendment to the motor vehicle code already adopted prohibits parking such vehicles on residential streets.) The restrictions would not apply when the vehicle is picking up or discharging passengers or when temporarily parked to perform work at a particular location. Also, one resident of each single-family home may park one vehicle licensed as a taxicab or limousine wherever on-street parking is permitted.

Stop for School Buses

Fairfax County public schools reopen this month. Your Transportation Safety Commission reminds drivers that the law requires you to stop for school buses taking on or discharging passengers and to remain stopped until the passengers are out of the street and the bus is again underway. This applies to drivers approaching from any direction. Children should be cautioned to look in all directions and make sure all vehicles are stopped before crossing the street to and from the bus.

Maple Avenue Enhancement Project Moving Forward on Schedule

Barring any unforeseen delays, the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project should be substantially complete before the October 28 Halloween Parade. The project, which encompasses Maple Avenue from Lawyers Road to Park Street and the segments of Lawyers Road, Center Street and Mill Street between Maple and Church, includes new brick sidewalks on each side of these streets, new curb and gutter, brick crosswalks at all intersections, new asphalt pavement surface, increased turning radii at intersections and driveway entrances, improved street lighting with ornamental poles and fixtures, undergrounding of the power and telephone service lines, elimination of utility poles on the north side of Maple Avenue, planter areas for shrubbery and trees, trash receptacles, benches, and new bus shelters. These design elements will benefit both businesses and shoppers by improving the general appearance of the area and increasing safety.

The improvements are funded through the 1996 and 1998 bond issues for capital projects, and the entire amount of the debt service is carried by the Town's 3% meals and lodging tax. No Town of Vienna property tax revenues are used for the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project.

For those who ordered commemorative sidewalk bricks, these have been laid on the south side of Maple beginning in front of Patrick Henry Library.

Virginia Center Proposal Withdrawn

The Town Council wishes to express its appreciation to all of those who were instrumental in the developer's decision to withdraw its application to increase the commercial space allowed at Virginia Center, located just beyond the town's southwestern border near the Vienna Metro station.

Although too numerous to mention individually, the efforts of Vienna and Fairfax County officials, in-town and out-of-town organizations, and hundreds of citizens who wrote letters, signed petitions and attended meetings combined to send a convincing message about the additional traffic load that the proposed increase in development would impose on Marshall Road School and nearby residential streets as well as the appropriateness of a hotel proposed for the site.

Council continues to oppose any increase in commercial development at Virginia Center beyond the 650,000 square feet agreed to 10 years ago by the developer and currently approved by Fairfax County.

CORRECTION — In last month's "Comment from the Council Table," a portion of Councilman Al Boudreau's article was omitted concerning Fairfax County's property tax abatement ordinance. It stated, "I have testified before the Board of Supervisors and asked that they amend their ordinance to provide a realistic tax abatement incentive for homeowners, and I plan to do so again. Supervisor Dix is supportive of a tax abatement for homeowners. I believe that homeowners deserve a tax break too. Don't You?"

Parks & Recreation Dept. Receives Street Tree Inventory Grant

The Vienna Parks and Recreation Department has been awarded a grant of \$6,000 by the Virginia Department of Forestry to help fund a town-wide inventory of street trees to document the location, species, size, condition, and maintenance needs of the estimated 6,000 trees now growing on the roadsides and median strips, and to record the results on a computer software program specifically designed for tree management and care.

The primary benefit of the project will be the long-term effect on preservation of trees along the Town's 60 miles of public roadway. Until now, most of the tree work done each year has been in reaction to immediate needs and emergency responses to hazardous conditions. With the completion of the street tree inventory the Town arborist can better plan and schedule preventive maintenance work. The tree management software will provide reports and tracking of work required and work completed, as well as data for the annual tree maintenance budget and strengthening of tree protection ordinances. Department staff will be able to provide residents and Town officials more accurate information regarding specific trees within a much shorter time period than before.
