DECEMBER 1988 — The Town Council has adopted an ordinance to establish a register of Vienna's historic sites. These sites will be marked with a special plaque and described in a pamphlet. Residents may apply to have their property included on the register by sending a letter to the Town Manager describing the site, its size and location, significant dates in its history, people or events of historic interest associated with it, and other pertinent information. The Town Council will act on applications after receiving recommendations from the Town Manager and the board of directors of Historic Vienna, Inc.

DECEMBER 1978 — The Vienna Police Department has recently acquired, through a grant, a composite drawing machine known as a Multiple Image Maker and Identification Compositor (MIMIC). With this equipment, police can create a facial picture from a verbal description of a criminal suspect, thus eliminating the need for an artist trained for identification work. MIMIC is basically a special projector with facial features stored on six 35mm film strips, one each for hairlines, eyes, nose, mouth, chin, ears, and accessories such as eyeglasses and beards. Thousands of combinations are possible.

DECEMBER 1968 — At its December 2 meeting, the Town Council approved semiannual billing for Town real estate taxes. The first half of the 1969 taxes are to be paid in June and the second in December, rather than the entire amount coming due in December. Councilman Richard B. Dingman said, "We are not adding a bill, we are releasing residents from a Christmas time burden."

Free Mulch **Available** To Residents

The Public Works Department will deliver ground leaf mulch and ground wood mulch to town residents free of charge beginning in mid-January. The minimum order for each type of mulch is a dump truck load. Orders will be taken from December 1 through February 27. To place your order and for more information, call the Public Works Department at 255-6382.

Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount. The mulch is stored on Town owned property off Beulah Road near Glyndon Park. Look for the sign, "Free Leaf Mulch & Wood Mulch."

By grinding leaves and brush into recyclable mulch, the Town saves thousands of dollars in landfill fees each year while providing residents with tons of free leaf and wood mulch. Using one to two inches of mulch to cover bare spots in the garden and around trees, shrubs, and landscaped areas will conserve moisture, improve soil fertility, and reduce weed growth. Real Estate Tax Due

The second installment on 1998 Town of Vienna real estate tax bills is due on December 7. Mailed payments must be postmarked on or before that date. Late payments will be assessed a penalty of 10% or \$5, whichever is greater, along with interest at 10%, which accrues until payment is made. Your canceled check is your receipt. If your Vienna taxes are paid through your mortgage company and you received the tax bill, please notify your mortgage company immediately so it can make payment by the due date. If you have sold the property and are not responsible for the tax bill you receive, please notify the real estate office immediately.

Town Council Approves Traffic Calming Measures

The Town Council has approved a number of traffic calming measures recommended by the Trasnportation Safety Commission, which were the subject of a public hearing last month. The measures approved are as follows:

NORTHEAST QUADRANT

- One speed hump in the 300 block of Ayrhill Avenue
- One speed hump in the 300 block of Church Street
- One speed hump on Broadleaf Drive, location to be determined in conjunction with residents on that street
- Town staff to determine whether construction of an intersection hump on Glyndon Street between Hilltop Road and Jean Place at Ainstree Court could cause drainage problems
- Four-way STOP sign at East Street and Creek Crossing Road
- Left-turn signals from Park Street and Center Street onto Maple Avenue
- Shorter green time by two seconds on Church Street at Beulah Road

NORTHWEST QUADRANT

- Three-way STOP sign at John Marshall Drive and Center Street
- One speed hump in the 400 block of Center Street, N.
- Four-way STOP sign at Lewis and Orchard Streets
- One speed hump on Orchard Street between Lewis and Nutley Streets
- Realignment of the crosswalk on Lawvers Road at Malcolm Road

Drive Safely In Parking Lots

When out holiday shopping, and all through the year, safe driving should not end when you enter a parking lot. The standard "rules of the road" should be followed, including yielding the right-of-way to pedestrians, following designated traffic and parking patterns, and maintaining a safe speed.

In Vienna, public parking lots designed to accommodate 50 or more vehicles are subject to police enforcement of the same traffic regulations as on town streets, and a speed of 15 mph is the maximum allowed in these parking lots.

In addition, it is illegal to cut through parking lots to avoid traffic lights or stop signs at intersections.

NO MATTER WHAT THE SEASON, REMEMBER THAT THE LAWFUL SPEED LIMIT IN TOWN IS 25 MPH UNLESS OTHERWISE POSTED.

Have a Fire Safe Holiday Season

Every year, people suffer injuries, burns and even death due to carelessness with holiday decorations. Trees, lights, ornaments, and fireplaces produce extra hazards in the home at the same time that holiday visitors and activities distract attention from fire safety. Here are some safety tips from your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department to help ensure that your holidays are safe and happy:

- ✓ Make sure your natural tree is a fresh one. Fresh needles won't break when you bend them. Once you get your fresh tree home, cut off one to two inches of the trunk and place the tree in a stable holder. Keep the holder full of water and keep the tree away from sources of heat to keep it from drying out.
- Use only flameproof decorations. Make sure your electrical decorations are tested and labeled, and check the wiring before you put them up. Avoid using extension cords to run your electrical decorations.
- ✓ Don't use real lighted candles as part of decorations.
- ✓ Don't use your fireplace as a disposal site for wrapping paper, gift boxes or
- ✓ Keep an eye on friends and family members who smoke. During hectic holiday activity ashes and cigarettes can fall into chairs, gifts and wrapping paper. Don't empty ashtrays into the trash.
- ✓ Clean and test your smoke detectors to make sure they are working properly, and make sure your portable fire extinguisher is pressurized and not blocked by holiday packages and decorations.

Comment from the Council Table

Is Our Glass Half Full or Half Empty?

As a town, where are we headed? Depends on your point of view. Similar to the proverbial half-full, half-empty glass, the view of the Town of Vienna is a matter of perspective. I have heard both very optimistic and very pessimistic predictions about Vienna's future.


As a 25-year resident and current member of the Town Council, in the brief space that follows, I will attempt to share my very biased view of what is right and what is wrong with our town. First the negatives traffic, traffic and traffic. Also, I still think we need a bridge across Maple Avenue, but ... Now, the positives — We live in a very safe community. Our children can walk or take a short ride to the highest rated public and private schools in the country. Vienna has a healthy business community, including several of the finest restaurants in Northern Virginia. The best off-road biking and hiking trail in Virginia runs through the center of town. Thousands of citizens volunteer time and energy every year to keep Vienna alive and well. We are working on calming our taffic, updating the Community Center, remodeling Maple Avenue, building a state-of-the-art public works facility, all the while maintaining the highest financial rating possible. We have continually carried less than 10% of the debt legally allowed by statute. Throughout the year, citizens can participate in any number of "small town events": Halloween parade, 4th of July festival, ViVa! Vienna!, Celebrate Vienna, band concerts, local theatrical presentations, and even BINGO.

Obviously I'm looking at a glass half full when looking at our town. I have always felt that way, and two years on the Council have only deepened my conviction that we live in a unique and wonderful place.

Our successes are many and should not be taken for granted. But those who see the glass half empty can also provide a valuable service. We need to remain constantly vigilant and make changes as needed. As a Council, we are working on upgrading our infrastructure and adding sidewalks throughout the town as well as improving traffic flow. One area that I believe has been overlooked, until recently, is providing ade-

quate space and activities for our teenagers. Several like-minded citizens have recently formed the Vienna Teen Center Foundation (VTCF). They are working with the Department of Parks and Recreation to improve the facilities available to teens at the Community Center. I'm very hopeful that within the next year Vienna teenagers will have a place of their own. In addition to the teens, one other group badly in need of a permanent facility is the Committee for Helping Others (CHO). CHO provides food, clothing, furniture and financial assistance for many needy families throughout the Vienna area. Currently, volunteers work out of several cramped locations. Each location is a temporary facility and CHO volunteers have moved tons of donated goods several times during recent years. They need a single, permanent location to call their own. SOUTHEAST QUADRANT

 Inatallation of warning lights on Park Street at the bike trail and repainting of the crosswalk in a bright color

SOUTHWEST QUADRANT

- · One speed hump on Kingsley Road between Olympian Circle and Frederick Street
- One dip (drainage swale) on Marshall Road between Mountfort Court and Lynn Street
- NO RIGHT TURN signs onto Moorefield Road from Courthouse Road prohibiting entry during morning rush hour
- NO LEFT TURN signs onto Princeton Terrace from Nutley Street prohibiting entry during afternoon rush hour

Implementation of these traffic calming measures will require a *minimum* of 30 days, depending on this winter's weather.

Sidewalk Hearing Rescheduled

The Town Council's public hearing on the construction of additional sidewalks in Vienna has been rescheduled from December 7 to February 1. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall, and all interested citizens are encouraged to attend and speak on the sidewalk projects proposed by a joint committee of the Transportation Safety Commission and the Planning Commission, or any other sidewalk improvements.

The Sidewalk Committee has established three priority groups of sidewalk projects based on the results of a citizen survey published in the May newsletter as well as a visual examination of the town by committee members and comments from civic associations. A list of these projects will be published in next month's newsletter, and they are also available for review in the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall.

NEWS FROM VIENNA PARKS & REC

Community Center Renovations Scheduled to Begin This Month

During the renovation of the Vienna Community Center, scheduled to begin in December, classes and other activities that are normally held at the Community Center will be relocated or canceled. The building will reopen in the spring. Classes held at the Bowman House Arts and Crafts Center and sports league registration will be held as usual.

The major components of the renovation project are:

- Replacement and/or upgrading of all heating/air conditioning/ventilation systems throughout the building.
- ADA modifications and improvements, including a full-service elevator serving all four floor levels, two fully accessible restrooms, a "hi-lo" water fountain, widened doorways, and "push button" automatic door openers at the front entrance.
- A two-level addition of approximately 1,200 sq. ft. on the northeast end of the building. The addition is to compensate for storage space lost to the elevator installation and handicap accessible restrooms, and relocation of the temporary storage space now in the basement Teen Center.
- General interior refinishing to include new vinyl tile floors or carpeting in many areas, new ceramic wall tiles and trim, replacement of numerous doors with new wood doors, new ceiling tiles, and paint. The gym floor will also be repaired and refinished.
- Exterior improvements will include realignment and repaving of the front entrance driveway, refurbishing of the entranceway, screening of rooftop HVAC units, reroofing of the two older sections of the building, and installation of thermal pane window panels to replace existing single pane units.

The Parks and Recreation Department appreciates your patience during the Community Center renovation project.

"CrossingGuard" Video Camera Targets Red Light Runners

The Town of Vienna will soon be using CrossingGuard®, a video-based camera system for automated enforcement of red light running violations, at three major intersections: Maple Avenue and Follin Lane, Maple Avenue and Lawyers/Courthouse Roads, and Nutley Street and Courthouse Road. System testing and initial citation processing will begin in December and January.

The CrossingGuard system detects vehicles as they approach the intersection. An overview camera provides a "bird's eye" picture as each vehicle's speed, acceleration, and deceleration are monitored to determine the probability of that vehicle stopping for the red light. If it is determined that the vehicle will *not* stop, the recording camera is triggered. Only violations are recorded.

For each red light violation, the system records a full view as well as color close-up shots of the front and rear license plates of the violating vehicle and an image of the driver. These data are transmitted, via a telephone line, from the intersection to the Police Department and reviewed by a sworn police officer responsible for making the violation/no violation decision.

Citations are issued to the registered owner of the vehicle within five days of the violation. The citation shows the vehicle at the onset of the red light signal and the vehicle driving through the red light, and gives the time, date, and location of the violation, amount of time the light was red before the violation, and the vehicle speed. The back of the citation outlines the terms and conditions of the penalty (\$50 fine) as well as the process for contesting the violation.

CrossingGuard also offers a collision avoidance feature, scheduled to be tested in February and operational in March, that can assist in preventing red light running related accidents. If the system predicts that a vehicle will *not* stop for the red light, the cross traffic red signal is extended to prevent cross traffic from entering the intersection while the vehicle runs the red light. The violation is recorded and a citation issued.

A public education program on the red light camera system has been prepared by Nestor Traffic Systems, Inc., prime contractor for the project, and is available for presentation to community organizations. If your group is interested in scheduling a presentation, please call Capt. John Cheyne at the Police Department, 255-6392.

Attention Vienna Organizations! Maple Ave. Banners Will Require Deposit

Beginning next year, community organizations will be required to submit a \$150 refundable deposit when they apply to display a banner across Maple Avenue. The deposit will be returned if the applicant meets all conditions listed in the approval of the application, including picking up the banner by a specified date. If the organization fails to meet any of the requirements, the deposit will be forfeited.

Due to the large number of requests received from community organizations to display banners across Maple Avenue each year, any organization that desires to display a banner during 1999 must make a written request to the Town Manager *after* January 1. Requests will be reviewed on a first come-first served basis to ensure fairness. Send requests to John H. Schoeberlein, Town Manager, 127 Center St., S., Vienna, VA 22180-5799. REQUESTS POSTMARKED PRIOR TO JANUARY 1, 1999, AND HAND-DELIVERED REQUESTS WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED.

Each banner accepted may be displayed for no more than two weeks. The following dates in 1999 are not available and should not be requested: April 20–May 4, May 17–31, and October 13–November 8.
