MARCH 1989 — Town Clerk Carol Orndorff has recently become a Civil Marriage Celebrant and can perform weddings for town residents. Weddings may be scheduled by calling the Town Clerk's Office at 255-6303. A valid marriage license must be presented at the time of the wedding. There is a small fee for the ceremony.

MARCH 1979 — The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority has begun cleanup operations in preparation for the extension of the Washington & Old Dominion Regional Trail from Falls Church through Vienna. This section will adjoin the already developed trail in Falls Church and should open this spring, pending completion of major bridges over Routes 66 and 495. Work is now concentrated from Church Street to the Town's property yard. The first step is to clear a trail corridor through the most heavily industrialized area; later, a split-rail fence will be erected and the area landscaped to give it a more park-like setting.

MARCH 1969 — The proposed new ordinance restricting on-the-street parking in residential areas, which caused such a stir at the first public hearing, will be up for public discussion again on March 25. The ordinance would prohibit the parking of any but passenger cars on the streets of residential areas, and would allow only vehicles up to one-half ton capacity to be parked in driveways. Representatives of both state and national campers associations are expected to be present at the meeting as well as owners of trucks and boats, and other interested citizens.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries will be Saturday, March 6, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Town property yard, 247 Nutley St., N.W. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens with a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 255-6381.

Too often used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of used oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water; in this way tons of toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic are released into the environment. When recycled, cleaned of its impurities and re-refined, used oil is a valuable resource that can be remanufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia, it is illegal to dispose of automobile lead-acid (wet-cell) batteries with refuse.

Attention Businesses!

All businesses in Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business license by May 3 this year. Look for the license tax form in the mail next month. The annual license tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. For more information, call 255-6321.

Water Main Flushing

Each spring, the Town of Vienna flushes the water mains in its distribution system in order to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. The preventive maintenance program begins in early April, and water mains are usually flushed between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Water mains are flushed by opening the fire hydrants and allowing the water to flow freely for a short period of time. The flushing cleans out sediment that normally accumulates during the summer and winter, and enables the Town to test and perform routine maintenance on the 800+ fire hydrants within its service area.

Flushing may result in some discoloration and the presence of sediment in the water reaching your home or business. These conditions are not harmful and should be of short duration. The Town appreciates your tolerance of this inconvenience. If you need more information, please call the Water & Sewer Customer Service Office at 255-6385.

Car Tags Go on Sale March 15

1999 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals go on sale Monday, March 15, and must be displayed by midnight April 15. Decals may be purchased by mail or in person in the Finance Department at Town Hall. (Military personnel must apply in person.)

Decals cost \$20 for passenger cars and trucks under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles.

Information for pre-printed application forms for 1999 decals was taken from 1998 records; therefore, if your vehicle was not registered in Vienna last year, you will not automatically receive an application in the mail. Call 255-6323 or visit the Finance Department to obtain forms.

Town of Vienna residents do not need to purchase Fairfax County vehicle decals, but they must pay County personal property tax on motor vehicles. Personal property tax forms are available at Town Hall for the convenience of Vienna residents. For information about personal property tax, call the County Office of Assessments at 222-8234.

Beulah Rd. Walk-through March 27

A "walk-through" on Beulah Road, N.E., has been scheduled for Saturday, March 27, between 8 and 11 a.m. The purpose of the walk-through, which will be attended by Town of Vienna officials, is to identify right-of-way associated with the proposed improvements to the roadway and which trees may be affected by the project. Anyone wishing to participate in the walk-through is invited to assemble at Glyndon Park on Beulah Road prior to 8 a.m. Questions may be directed to the Vienna Department of Public Works (DPW) at 255-6381.

DPW and the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) held a meeting with interested residents in January to review plans for Beulah Road. VDOT has prepared two proposals, one maintaining the existing alignment of the street and the other slightly realigning the roadway in order to preserve the larger trees. DPW has recommended that the Town Council approve the second proposal. Preliminary plans are available for public inspection in the DPW offices at Town Hall.

Voter Registration Deadline April 5

Monday, April 5, is the last day to register to vote in the May 4 Town election. You may register in person at various locations around the county, or by mail. For more information, call the Fairfax County General Registrar's Office at 222-0776.

If you are already a registered voter, no additional registration is required for the Town election; however, you should check your voter registration card to be sure it lists your current address.

To be eligible to vote in the Town election, you must be a Vienna resident, at least 18 years old by election day, and a U.S. citizen.

Tax Relief Applications Due April 1 for Elderly and Disabled

Both the Town of Vienna and Fairfax County offer real estate tax relief for low-income homeowners who are 65 years old and over, or permanently and totally disabled. To qualify, the following requirements must be met:

- Total household income of \$40,000 or less. This amount excludes \$6,500 of income of relatives, other than the spouse, who reside in the household. Also excluded is \$7,500 of any income received by a homeowner who is permanently and totally disabled. Where the total combined income is between \$30,000 and \$35,000, a 50% tax relief is given, and between \$35,000 and \$40,000 a 25% tax relief.
- Total combined assets of no more than \$150,000. This amount excludes the value of the residence, up to one acre of land, and household furnishings.
- Disabled persons applying for the first time must show evidence of disability.
 Fairfax County also provides grants to senior citizens and disabled citizens who rent their residences, and relief from personal property tax for one automobile per household.

 The assets and income limitations for these programs are different from the real estate limits.
 The Town of Vienna provides all relief recipients one free auto decal.

Both Town and County applications must be filed. Applications for 1999 for all programs are due April 1. This date may be extended to December 31 of the year following the year the application was due if the applicant is applying for relief for the first time or if hardship conditions exist which through no fault of the applicant prohibit applying by April 1.

- Referred to the Planning Commission for public hearing and recommendation proposed amendments to the zoning code regarding the definition of "town house."

- Approved a change order to the contract for architectural and engineering services for the Community Center Renovation Project for additional design fees and reimbursable expenses in an amount not to exceed \$35,215.

BEAUTY TIP: DEER-RESISTANT SEEDLINGS FOR SALE

The Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District (NVSWCD) is conducting a seedling sale. Two packages are available: one designed to be deer-resistant and the other providing fruits and nuts to encourage birds and other small wildlife in the landscape. Each package contains 14 shrubs and trees and is available for \$16 (includes Virginia sales tax).

The "deer-resistant" package contains four Graystem Dogwood shrubs, four Bristly Locust shrubs, two Black Locust, two Eastern Red Cedar, and two Virginia Pine. The fruit and nuts package includes four Silky Dogwood shrubs, two Washington Hawthorne, four Hazel Alder, two Persimmon, and two Black Walnut. All of these seedlings are bareroot stock, not balled and burlapped, so an entire seedling package can be held easily in one grocery bag.

Enclose a check for the full amount made payable to NVSWCD. Purchasers will be sent a confirmation receipt and a map to the pickup site (off Braddock Road, two miles outside the Beltway, near Rolling Road). The seedlings may be picked up on Friday, April 16, from 9 a.m. to noon. The order deadline is April 1. For more information, call 324-1460.





Town Council Recommends Metrorail Extension as #1 Priority in Route 66 Corridor

At its February 1 meeting, the Town Council adopted the position that the extension of Metrorail from Vienna to Centreville should be given priority over other proposals for upgrading the I-66 transportation corridor between I-495 (Capital Beltway) and Route 50.

In a letter to Virginia Secretary of Transportation Shirley Ybarra, Mayor Charles Robinson strongly expressed the Council's recommendation that the Metrorail extension should be accomplished prior to construction of any additional vehicular travel lanes on I-66. This position supports the final report to Secretary Ybarra from the I-66 Major Investment Study Policy Advisory Committee, chaired by Fairfax City Mayor John Mason, which concluded that a Metrorail extension and associated park-and-ride and supporting transit options should be first on the list of improvements considered. "A rail extension offers capacity as soon as it is built," the report states. "Proposed I-66 highway improvements are contingent upon a set of complementary highway improvements (e.g., Beltway)."

Mayor Robinson's letter also pointed out that the right-of-way acquisition needed to accommodate additional lanes on I-66 "will effectively destroy a portion of Vienna's residential neighborhoods bordering I-66 and badly damage Vienna's Southside Park and Little League baseball park which has just undergone a \$1 million upgrade."

FY 1998 Financial Report Available

The report summarizes the Town's financial position and the results of operations of the various funds and account groups. It also includes the auditor's report for FY '98, information on internal controls for managing and safeguarding funds, and selected financial and demographic information covering the last 10 fiscal years.

Dog Owners Required To Clean Up After Pets

The Town of Vienna has a "pooper scooper" ordinance that requires dog owners to clean up after their pets when out for a walk. Please be a responsible pet owner and don't allow your dog to foul the lawns of neighbors. The mess and smell are very offensive, especially in hot weather.

Also, signs are posted in several Town parks to remind pet owners that dogs are not allowed on athletic fields, tennis and basketball courts, playgrounds and picnic areas because of the nuisance and potential health hazard to park users. The Town Animal Warden is authorized to fine pet owners found in violation of these laws.

Dog owners are reminded that it is against the law to let dogs run at large on public or private property. Dogs must be restrained by a dependable leash and controlled by a responsible person when off the property of the owner. Dogs found running at large may be picked up by the Animal Warden, and owners charged with dog-at-large violations must appear in court. Fines increase with each offense to a maximum of \$500.

YOUR TRANSPORTATION SAFETY COMMISSION REMINDS YOU: Parents are cautioned against allowing small children to go out into the street unsupervised and should impress upon them that streets are not safe places for play. Vienna is a family town that welcomes children and we don't want any of them injured!

Public Hearing Set on Proposed Parking Garage at Vienna Metro

The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA), in cooperation with the Fairfax County government, will conduct a public hearing on the proposed construction of one and possibly two additional parking garages at the Vienna Metrorail Station on Tuesday, March 9, beginning at 7:30 p.m. at Oakton High School.

WMATA is proposing a five to six level garage on the site of the current park-and-ride lot at the southwest quadrant of the station. Such a structure would increase parking capacity up to 2,300 spaces. Access to the garage is proposed at two points: the existing parking lot entrance on the eastern side of the site, and on the western side of the site at the end of the Vaden Drive bridge over I-66.

WMATA is also proposing a master plan for future parking expansion, which would include the possible later addition of a garage at the southeast quadrant of the station.
