MAY 1989 — The Vienna Arts Society is 20 years old this month. Organized by nine local artists to share their interests, enrich their experience in art, and make a creative contribution to the community, it is now one of the largest art organizations in the area with over 215 members.

MAY 1979 — Residents of Beulah Road and other interested citizens are encouraged to attend the Town Council meeting on May 21 to participate in a discussion on establishing a standard for the width of Beulah Road for future planning purposes. It should be emphasized that the Town has no intention of widening Beulah Road. Many residents have expressed a desire to retain the character of the road and avoid urbanizing it. The purpose of establishing a width standard is to eliminate confusion and uncertainty on the part of both the residents and home builders as to the future of this street.

MAY 1969 — Under Vienna's new ordinance regulating the keeping and breeding of horses and ponies, the animals may be kept on lots of two or more acres with no more than one horse or pony per acre. All such property must be fenced so as to prevent the animals from straying closer than ten feet from all property lines.

Your Transportation Safety Commission has provided the following selected information from the Vienna Police Department's 1998 traffic accident summary:

Last year 475 traffic accidents occurred within the town boundaries. Over 400 of these accidents involved two vehicles, and less than one quarter involved town residents.

The most accidents occurred in September (11.8%), the fewest in August (5.3%). The highest number of accidents occurred between 10 a.m. and 12 noon, and between 2 and 4 p.m. Almost 70% of all accidents took place during afternoon hours.

Most accidents occurred in clear weather (63.5%) and on dry pavement (69.1%).

Men accounted for 52.98% of drivers involved in accidents, women 47.02%. The average age of the drivers was 40.6. Young drivers (aged 16–20) were involved in 11.92% of accidents, and older drivers (over 66) were involved in 10.49% of accidents.

Community Center Drop-off Recycling Site to Close June 30

Now that Vienna residents can recycle their carboard and mixed paper at the curbside along with their newspaper and bagged materials, the recycling drop-off site located at the Vienna Community Center will close on June 30.

Alternate recycling sites include the Blake Lane Park, 10031 Blake Ln. in Oakton, and the National Wildlife Federation, 8925 Leesburg Pk. (just beyond the toll road). These are full-service sites and collect cardboard, mixed paper, telephone books, glass bottles and jars, plastic bottles and jugs, newspaper, button batteries, and metal food and beverage cans. TOWN COUNCIL ACTION

All votes are unanimous unless noted otherwise.

FEBRUARY 1, 1999

- Conducted an executive session to discuss appointments to Town boards and commissions.
- Conducted a public hearing on proposed sidewalk construction.
- Approved the purchase of Glock pistols for the Police Department, with funding to come from a federal grant in the amount of \$4,090 and \$455 in matching Town funds.
- Approved a change order to the Community Center renovation project in the amount of \$1,793.38 to repair the concrete floor slab in the gymnasium and to remove a tree.
- Rejected the single bid received for the Wall Street booster pump station. The project will be rebid at a later date.
- Authorized the Mayor to write a letter to the Virginia Secretary of Transportation, forwarded through the Chairman of the I-66 Policy Advisory Committee, expressing the

view of Council that prior to any additional construction on I-66 between the Beltway and Route 50, the extension of Metrorail to Centreville should be given first priority.

 Appointed Kevin McNiff to the Planning Commission and appointed Ken Plum as the northwest quadrant representative to the Community Enhancement Commission, both for two-year terms.

FEBRUARY 22, 1999

- Following a public hearing, approved the installation of a "tot lot" on Town owned right-of-way on Branch Road, S.E., at Locust Street. (Approved 5–2, McCormick and Robinson voting nay.) Plans for the park will include either a six-foot fence or evergreen screening between it and the adjacent residential property. (Approved 6–1, Boudreau voting nay.) Authorized the Town staff to proceed with the project through the regular procurement practices and zoning regulations.
- Following a public hearing, approved an ordinance that prohibits telephone and fax numbers, and e-mail and Internet addresses on commercial signs. (Approved 6–1, McCormick voting nay.) Other sec-

tions of the ordinance, approved unanimously, establish a master sign plan.

- Approved expansion of the curbside recycling program to include cardboard, mixed paper and telephone books. Awarded a bid for pickup of recyclables to FCR Virginia, Inc., at a price of \$21,012.
- Adopted a resolution requesting the Virginia Department of Transportation to schedule the next phase of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project as an Urban Highway Project.
- Adopted amendments to the community beautification ordinance, including changing the name of the Beautification Commission to the Community Enhancement Commission.
- Accepted the resignation of Patricia Wangsness from the Town/Business Liaison Committee.

MARCH 1, 1999

- Conducted an executive session to interview candidates for reappointment to Town boards and commissions.
- Waived the masonry wall requirement for Wheat's Landscape Design Center #1, 301 Mill St., N.E.
- Approved a transfer of funds to cover the cost of debris removal from the January 15 ice storm.
- Approved amendments to the sanitary sewer construction specifications and details.
- Approved the final plat for the resubdivision of the property at 218 and 220 Park St., N.E.
- Reappointed Fred Skaer to the Planning Commission and reappointed Dr.
 Jerome Covel to the Town/Business Liaison Committee, both for two-year terms.

Wildlife Abundant in Spring

Spring is upon us. This means that it's baby season among area wildlife. For those of you who might see some of our furry or feathered friends around, don't be alarmed; they may be out and about with little ones in tow. This can be a joy to watch, but please follow these basic rules to fully enjoy the wildlife among us:

- · Never approach or try to pet any wildlife.
- Do not feed any wildlife at any time.
- If young are found alone, leave them alone unless it is known that the mother is dead. If you're not sure, call Animal Control at 255-6377.
 - Report all suspected injured or nuisance wildlife to Animal Control.

If you find a baby bird or fledgling (young bird without flight), if possible place it back into its nest or someplace on the tree where the nest is located. Wear leather gloves and wash your hands afterwards. Try to keep your cats inside until the fledgling birds can fly. (Problems with human scent are just a myth.)

This is also the time of year when snakes start to come out. These animals are very beneficial for rodent and insect control and should be left alone. All but one of the snakes indigenous to this area are harmless and will not bite you or your pet cats and dogs if left alone. The only snake to worry about in this area is the copperhead. This snake is venomous. It has a light to dark copper/tan body with brown hourglass/butterfly shapes going down its back. Young copperheads look just like adults but have a green tip on the tail. These snakes just want to be left alone and will not strike unless threatened. Never approach an unknown snake; leave it alone and call Animal Control. Please, if possible don't kill any snakes; call Animal Control for help and identification.

RABIES UPDATE: Many citizens have called my office enquiring about the rise of rabies in this area. The actual numbers of positive rabies cases in Fairfax County, 91 in 1997 and 68 in 1998, reflect a decline in rabies. This drop also occurred on the statewide counts. It is undetermined how 1999 will go, but to date 17 positive rabies cases were reported throughout the county. This does not mean we should let our guard down. Awareness and vaccinating our pets are the best barriers to this disease. To protect yourself and your family please vaccinate your pets, especially your outdoor cats as they are more likely to come into contact with the rabies virus. Report all strange animal behavior (domestic or wild) to Animal Control as soon as possible.

Home Projects Require Permit

Your Planning and Zoning Department reminds you: It is no secret that home improvement projects usually take longer and cost more than anticipated. However, some contractors and even a few homeowners try to expedite the process and save money by cutting corners and taking shortcuts. To many contractors and homeowners this may be tempting, but it usually generates more problems and costs more money than if the proper procedures had been followed.

The most common example is beginning a home improvement project without obtaining the proper permits beforehand. Building codes and specifications vary from one jurisdiction to another. Although the Town of Vienna is located in Fairfax County and uses County structural plan review and inspection services, Vienna has its own code regulating home improvements. Instead of guessing whether you need a permit, or relying on a contractor to find out, simply check with the Planning and Zoning Department at Town Hall.

Unfortunately, some contractors and homeowners proceed with home improvements and avoid obtaining permits to try and save money and time, and to make changes that are not code approved. When a valid building permit is obtained for home improvements, a red card with the words "BUILDING PERMIT" on it should be displayed so that it is visible from the street. If there is no red card visible, then chances are a permit was not obtained.

If you are unsure whether the home improvements you are planning require a permit, or if you have questions regarding home improvement projects going on in your neighborhood, please call the Planning and Zoning Department at 255-6341.

In-town Water Rates Lower

The town versus county cost-of-living comparison in last month's newsletter failed to mention water rates. The rate for town residents is \$2.44 per 1,000 gallons; the rate for out-of-town customers is \$2.82. The sewer rate is \$3.16 for all customers.



Roving Vendors No Longer Allowed At Public Events

The Town Council has amended the peddlers licensing ordinance to prohibit roving vendors from any community event that is held in public streets or parks, including ViVa! Vienna!, the July 4th celebration, and the Halloween parade.

During last year's parade several vendors walked in the roadway along Maple Avenue, impeding traffic and creating a safety hazard. At least one vendor sold a material known as "silly string," which purchasers sprayed on the streets, sidewalks, bus shelters, and even parade participants and spectators. The Town received many complaints about the situation, including a letter from the Vienna Regional Chamber of Commerce, sponsor of the parade.

The ordinance amendment prohibits sales of merchandise of any kind by roving vendors at all future community events.

Vienna Crime Down, Traffic Enforcement Increased in 1998

The Vienna Police Department's annual report shows a decrease in both serious crime and less serious crime during 1998, while traffic enforcement initiatives surpassed last year's record high.

More than 10,000 traffic citations were issued, up from 9,000 in 1997. The police purchased traffic classifiers to assist in measuring traffic volume and speed in residential areas, began installation of a photo red light signal monitoring system, increased the number of child safety seat inspections and truck inspections, and conducted its first sobriety checkpoint operation in many years.

A total of 1,188 business patrols were conducted during 1998, up from 862 the previous year. In addition, the holiday campaign against shoplifting, offering a "free ride in a police car if you shoplift from this store compliments of Vienna Police Department," met with a very favorable response from Vienna businesses.

VVFD Acquires Thermal Imager

The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department (VVFD) is the first fire and rescue company in Fairfax County to be equipped with a thermal imager, a device that enables emergency workers to locate victims more quickly in a hot, smokey atmosphere.

The VVFD Ladies' Auxiliary provided funds for the thermal imager, which also has the capability to broadcast a TV signal to the Incident Commander at the scene of a fire to help in the evaluation of conditions inside the building. The thermal imager will enable rescue crews to avoid becoming entrapped in the fire themselves, and the recorded images can be used for training purposes.

In addition to locating fire victims, the thermal imager can be useful in finding lost persons at night, determining whether downed power lines are "hot," and other situations in which the ability to determine differences in temperature can be a safety factor.

VVFD will demonstrate the thermal imager for civic associations and community service organizations if requested. Call Fire Chief George Ellis at 721-6770.

Can Your House Number Be Seen?

An important message from the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department:

It's a life-threatening situation where police, fire or ambulance service is needed. You dial 911 and feel confident that help will soon be there. You hear the sirens coming and see the flashing lights reflecting off the trees. But wait, they did not stop. They went too far. Maybe they could not see your address.

One of the recurrent problems emergency personnel encounter when responding to calls is missing or hard (sometimes impossible) to read house numbers. Precious time is wasted looking for the location of an emergency because the address is not properly posted so it is visible and distinguishable from the street.

Try driving past your house during the day and again at night to see how easy your numbers are to read. Both the size and location of numbers are important. They should be large enough and placed so that they can be read from the center of the street going in both directions on the darkest night, in the worst of weather, and not obscured by shadows or hidden by foliage.

How does your house measure up to this checklist?

- ✓ Script writing may look appealing, but can you read it on a dimly lit street from a moving vehicle?
 - ✓ Are your house numbers large enough to be seen from the street?
 - ✓ Do the numbers contrast sharply with their background?
- ✓ If the house is some distance from the street or the view of the house is blocked by trees or shrubs, are your house numbers on a sign attached to a tree, fence, gate, or lawn stake near the street?
 - ✓ On a corner lot, do the house numbers face the street named in your address?
 - ✓ Are your house numbers illuminated or easily visible at night?



Underground Fiber Optic Cable To Be Installed in South Vienna

The Town Council has awarded a telecommunications franchise to e.spire Communication, Inc., to install fiber optic cable in the southeast and southwest quadrants of town. The cable will be placed completely underground, and work could begin as early as this month. The franchise agreement grants e.spire "pass-through" use of public right-of-way to provide telecommunication service to customers located outside the town.

As shown on the map, the cable system will enter the town on the south side of Maple Avenue, then turn southeast on East Street and stay on the east side of the street to Echols Street, where it will cross to the south side of the street to the Echols Street bridge. A cable attachment will be placed on the outside face of the bridge, and the system will continue across Branch Road to the west side of the road heading north to and across Locust Street. At Locust, the cable will turn west staying on the north side of the street to Park Street, where it will cross to the west side of Park and go south to Tapawingo Road. After crossing to the south side of Tapawingo, the cable will go west to Nutley Street, cross to the west side of Nutley and go south to Marshall Road, then cross back to the east side of Nutley and out of the town limits.
