SEPTEMBER 1989 —Fairfax County's first-ever lacrosse festival will be held on September 30 at James Madison High School. The festival will feature a free youth coaching clinic followed by a scrimmage-game between the Loyola Greyhounds of Baltimore and the Navy Midshipmen of Annapolis. According to the Lacrosse Foundation, Fairfax County is one of the country's lacrosse "hotbeds," with youth teams growing by about 50% a year.

SEPTEMBER 1979 — The Town Council will hold a public hearing on September 15 to discuss the fate of the historic Moorefield property in southwest Vienna. The house has stood unoccupied for many years and is badly deteriorated. Historic Vienna is recommending that it be restored as an archaeological museum and classroom. Once a commitment is made to restore Moorefield, the Town will then be able to seek funding for the project. which could be close to a quarter million dollars.

SEPTEMBER 1969 — The framework on East Maple Avenue as you enter town has been the subject of some speculation, "Who are they hanging?" being a favorite question. This frame will be used as a base for hanging civic club signs for organizations such as Rotary, Lions, Civitan and Optimists. It is a project initiated by the Jaycees, who plan to place signs at each entrance to town

# Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries will be Saturday, September 4, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Town property yard, 247 Nutley St., N.W. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens with a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 255-6381.

Too often used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of used oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water; in this way tons of toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic are released into the environment. When recycled, cleaned of its impurities and re-refined, used oil is a valuable resource that can be remanufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia, it is illegal to dispose of automobile lead-acid (wet-cell) batteries with refuse.

### **Political Signs** Require a Permit

During this election year, candidates and their supporters should be aware of the Town's regulations pertaining to political signs:

- · Five temporary signs not exceeding 20 square feet total may be posted on residential property after receiving a permit and posting of a \$25 bond. Signs may be erected up to 30 days prior to election day and must be removed within five days after the election.
- It is unlawful to place signs on street lights, telephone poles, markers or other signs, or to place a sign without a permit within 10' of the curb or edge of

# Special Pickup Deadline October 1

Friday, October 1, is the last day for Town of Vienna residents to call for a Special Trash Pickup this year. Because of fall leaf collection, no orders for Special Pickups are taken in October, November and December.

To dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording promptly at 255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount of debris, and type of debris.

Each residence is entitled to receive two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle"). Additional pickups cost \$75 per load for all items except brush. The fee for additional loads of brush is \$25 each.

# **Leaf Collection Procedure Revised**

Fall leaf collection will begin next month, with Department of Public Works (DPW) crews using leaf vacuum machines to collect leaves that residents have raked to the curbside.

The leaf collection crews will make one pass through town each month during October, November and December. The complete schedule will be published in next month's newsletter. BEGINNING THIS YEAR, ALL LEAVES MUST BE AT THE CURBSIDE PRIOR TO THE FIRST SCHEDULED COLLECTION DAY FOR EACH PASS THROUGH TOWN. ONCE YOUR STREET HAS BEEN COVERED, CREWS WILL NOT DOUBLE BACK.

If you miss your vacuum collection dates, the DPW will still collect your leaves; however, the leaves must be bagged and placed at the curbside for pickup with your regular trash. Up to 20 bags of leaves will be picked up on any single refuse collection day throughout the year.

# Sewer Backup Insurance Available

All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company.

The Town's insurance carrier rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

To help prevent sewer backups, the Public Works Department cleans the main sewer lines whenever residents notify the department that their service laterals have been rodded by a commercial sewer cleaning service. If you have your sewer service lateral cleaned, please call the Public Works Department at 255-6381.

Remember, even at night or on weekends, help is only a phone call away for water and sewer emergencies. Public Works Department crews are prepared to respond to water line breaks and other urgent problems 24 hours a day. For assistance after hours, call the Police Department's non-emergency number, 255-6366. During regular business hours, call the Public Works Department at 255-6381.



# **Construction Boom Affects Vienna**


What's with all the contruction? Many Town residents are asking just that question. The Washington, D.C., metropolitan area is experiencing a dramatic and challenging period of growth and redevelopment. What is unusual about this phenomenon is that it is a combination of new growth and redevelopment/revitalization of developed areas. Is this a good thing? For the residents of the Town of Vienna it is a mixed blessing. Much of the Town's infrastructure, water and sewer lines, streets, and public buildings were built over 40 years ago. Accordingly, the Town has systematically begun refurbishing, and in some cases upgrading, its infrastructure and public buildings. Church Street has been reconstructed, and the Town Council recently passed an incentive zoning ordinance that encourages businesses to voluntarily revitalize Church Street in accordance with established architectural criteria. Town Hall has been refurbished and made ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant. Phase I of the Maple Avenue revitalization has been completed and the results are dramatic if you compare photos of "the old Maple Avenue" with the new streetscape. The Community Center refurbishment has just been completed and chronic problems with the heating and air conditioning system have been addressed.

The Town of Vienna is not the only entity that is engaged in construction. You might have noticed that residential and commercial properties are being redeveloped. Homeowners and developers have been constructing and reconstructing homes in Vienna. Also, many businesses are refurbishing their buildings and facades.

Is all this construction good for the Town? Although it does temporarily create a mess and interfere with our daily lives, one need only look at some other "established communities" in the area to answer that question. In some areas of Northern Virginia, the quality of life and community has deteriorated. However, Vienna is conscientiously preparing for the new millennium in its own way. Vienna has been able to foster and maintain a sense of community

that is the envy of the region. In a region where mobility and job changes are common, Vienna has established itself as a true "Town" and not just an exit on the Beltway. This has occurred at least in part because Vienna knows its history, but is willing to look to the future.

There is a negative side, however. Previously undeveloped areas now face development. This development can and does impact Vienna. Most noticeably, less green space and increased congestion on our streets are two of the most undesired consequences. While Vienna cannot control growth outside the Town limits, Vienna has been taking steps to address these issues within the Town's boundaries. In its singlefamily residential areas, the Town does not permit lot coverage that exceeds 25%. Vienna has implemented traffic calming measures, increased police enforcement against aggressive drivers, and photo red light enforcement. Town Council has authorized an additional radar "smart trailer" as well as traffic classifiers that assist the police in monitoring our streets for excessive speed and traffic volume. The traffic lights on Ma-

ple Avenue have been adjusted to provide better traffic flow, and the Town is actively exploring ways to increase the reliability of our traffic control system.

What can residents do to help address the negative side of development? Quite simply, keep yourself informed and do not be afraid to voice your concerns to your elected representatives. The Town Council consists of part-time elected officials who rely on the input of residents. Finally, Vienna has a number of volunteer boards and commissions that consist of residents who want to help preserve and improve a great community. Volunteer.

# **Vienna Police Receive State Awards**

The Vienna Police Department was recognized twice during the annual conference of the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police held last month in Roanoke.

The department received second place statewide among agencies of similar size in the Chief's Challenge contest. The award recognizes police agencies for their efforts to increase compliance with traffic laws and to improve public safety. Vienna's accomplishments included the continuance of the child safety seat program; truck safety inspections; D.U.I. sobriety checkpoints; and a high level of enforcement, particularly speeding and red light violation citations. Although this was a department-wide effort, Sgt. Tom Burtt and MPO Virginia Palmore were primarily responsible for preparing Vienna's contest entry.

The department also received third place within the 7th District of the State Police HEAT (Help Eliminate Auto Theft) Award program, which recognizes agencies for their efforts to inform the public about ways to prevent auto theft. Vienna's grant-funded display board identifying numerous ways to protect vehicles from theft has been seen by hundreds of citizens at police headquarters, Town Hall, and numerous community events. MPO Palmore was instrumental in securing the grant and in managing Vienna's HEAT program.

# **Special Pickup Deadline October 1**

# Please Follow These Special Pickup Guidelines

Friday, October 1, is the last day to call for a Special Pickup in 1999.

Residents are asked to follow the guidelines below to ensure an efficient Special Pickup:

- Building materials wood, broken concrete, building brick and block, fences, drywall and paneling will be picked up. Masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. are limited to 300 pounds per pickup (about two wheelbarrow loads). Building materials generated by contractors and/or persons employed by homeowners to renovate, repair and/or perform maintenance on their homes will not be picked up.
- Sod, small stumps, brush, trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½ inches and less than 6 inches and no more than 8 feet in length will be picked up. The Special Pickup crews do not collect any tree parts over six inches in diameter. Most logs are greater than six inches and, therefore, they are not acceptable. The reason for this regulation is that the tub grinder used by the Public Works Department to make wood mulch cannot handle tree parts over this size. Logs, stumps and other large tree parts can be disposed of at the Fairfax County Transfer Station on West Ox Road or at the County Landfill in Lorton. Leaves are not picked up by Special Pickup crews.
  - Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment will be picked up.
- Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal and small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires will be picked up. Tires must be removed from the rim. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.
- Two major appliances per residence will be picked up. These include stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces.
- Old heating oil tanks, gas tanks, and pressurized tanks such as propane, air or freon will not be picked up. Fuel tanks, paint cans, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes, and other hazardous wastes, and biohazardous waste including needles and syringes, will not be picked up. For information about hazardous waste disposal, call 324-5068.
- Please separate brush, appliances, building materials, etc. from each other. This makes it easier for pickup crews to salvage recyclable items, reducing the amount of debris taken to the landfill.
  - For the safety of Special Pickup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.
  - Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.
- Please keep Special Pickup items away from regular trash and recyclables, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences, utility poles, trees and shrubs, vehicles, etc. Place discards in an open area accessible to a crane truck.

# Please Call Promptly For Special Pickup

Residents are reminded to call the Special Pickup number, 255-5727, as soon as debris is placed at the curbside. Piles of trash that go uncollected for weeks on end because of residents' failure to call for a Special Pickup are an eyesore and a potential health and safety hazard.

When an "illegal" pile of trash is spotted by or reported to Town personnel, the resident will receive a notice to call for a Special Pickup within 48 hours. Otherwise, the debris will be collected anyway and that address charged for one of its two annual free Special Pickups, or if both pickups have already been made, it will be charged for an additional pickup.

CHO NEEDS YOUR UNWANTED FURNITURE, APPLIANCES — Instead of using a Special Pickup to dispose of unwanted furniture and appliances in good working condition, consider donating them to the Committee for Helping Others (CHO). For 30 years in the Vienna area, CHO has been assisting families and individuals in need to obtain food, shelter, clothing, fuel, transportation, furniture, financial aid, and other necessities. Beds and mattresses are especially needed, as are dining tables and chairs.
