DECEMBER 1989 — Vienna Centennial souvenirs are now available. These items will be lasting reminders of the 100th anniversary of Vienna's incorporation as a town. Souvenir items include brass bells, watches, a historical calendar, bumper stickers, coffee mugs, lapel pins, stickers, buttons, balloons and commemorative coins, and are sold at Town Hall and the Freeman House.

DECEMBER 1979 — The Town's new aluminum can recycling center is now in operation on the BP Car Wash property on West Maple Avenue. The center was financed by a grant from the Virginia Division of Litter Control and built by students under the supervision of Mr. Joseph Dove of James Madison High School's Maintenance and Repair Shop assisted by the Town's Department of Public Works. Funds from the sale of aluminum cans will go to purchase trees, shrubs and other materials for improving the appearance of Maple Avenue and the town's business district.

DECEMBER 1969 — Continued growth in the town in 1969 is evidenced in several new office buildings, townhouses, and single family homes. Housing developments on the outskirts have proceeded at a rapid pace, bringing new business to Vienna's commercial areas. A new committee was added in 1969 with the establishment of the Highway Safety Commission to study traffic problems within the town.

Free Mulch Available To Residents

The Public Works Department will deliver ground leaf mulch and ground wood mulch to town residents free of charge beginning in mid-January. The minimum order for each type of mulch is a dump truck load. Orders will be taken from December 1 through February 29. To place your order and for more information, call the Public Works Department at 255-6382.

Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount. The mulch is stored on Town owned property off Beulah Road near Glyndon Park. Look for the sign, "Free Leaf Mulch & Wood Mulch."

By grinding leaves and brush into recyclable mulch, the Town saves thousands of dollars in landfill fees each year while providing residents with tons of free leaf and wood mulch. Using one to two inches of mulch to cover bare spots in the garden and around trees, shrubs, and landscaped areas will conserve moisture, improve soil fertility, and reduce weed growth. OCTOBER 4, 1999

- Conducted a closed session to interview candidates for appointment to Town boards and commissions.
- Appointed David DiLillo as the student member of the Community Enhancement Commission for a term to expire June 30, 2000. Reappointed Philip Abraham to the Town/Business Liaison Committee for a two-year term. Reappointed Stuart Liss as the architect member of the Board of Architectural Review for a one-year term.
- Approved the final plat and waived on-site storm water management and public street improvement requirements for the resubdivision of the property at 340 and 344 Glyndon St., N.E.
- Approved a contribution of \$9,000 toward the cost of paving the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority right-of-way on Dominion Road between Church Street and Ayrhill Avenue.
- Awarded a bid for a cab and chassis with dump body and hoist to Central Motor Company at a price of \$49,190.

- Awarded a bid for a cab and chassis with 25 cubic yard packer to Central Motor Company at a price of \$104,585.
- Waived the competitive bid process and awarded a contract in the amount of \$16,800 to Preston Signs of Falls Church for the construction of three town entrance signs and 20 reflective aluminum corporate limit signs.



Vienna!, no fire department, no Historic Vienna, no train station, no caboose, no Freeman Store, no Vienna Theatre Company, Vienna Choral Society, Vienna Community Band or other arts groups, and the list goes on.

Many of Vienna's volunteers have been here a long time and donated thousands of hours to our community. We will need additional people to step in and continue the tradition at the start of the next century. I am positive volunteers will always be the backbone of Vienna. Just in case you are wondering what you can do, please consider volunteering for:

We have the canvas, the artists and paint; now we need people to help get it done. This is a huge project. The canvas is 160' x 32'. You don't have to be an artist, just someone willing to help. - 4. Vienna Community Television, VCT (or Town of Vienna Television, TVTV). For this one you need to tune into Channel 23 (Herndon Community Television) on your cable system. By accessing Channel 23 when the bulletin board is being shown, you can use your touchtone phone to find out just about anything happening in and around the Town of Herndon. - Citizen Water Quality Monitoring.


Leaf Collection Ends

Dog Tag Reminder

1999 Town dog licenses expire on December 31, and all licenses must be renewed by January 31. Dog tags are available in the Finance Department at Town Hall or by mail. The fee is \$10 for a fertile dog and \$5 for an infertile dog. All Town Computers Y2K Compliant

As the year 2000 approaches, there is much speculation about the possibility of interrupted services and resources caused by the "Y2K computer bug." The Town of Vienna has been working for several years to upgrade its computer systems to avoid any problems on January 1, and all Town departments are now fully Y2K compliant in hardware and soft-

The Town government, of course, has no control over the delivery of electric power, natural gas and telephone service. These utility companies have also been preparing for the year 2000 and do not expect major or widespread outages. However, it is suggested that citizens prepare for any temporary service disruptions just as they would prepare for a winter storm or other emergency.

The Fairfax County government's automated Y2K telephone line, 263-2000, gives recorded announcements about actions the County is taking, what individuals and businesses can do to prepare, how to contact major utilities, and additional resources for Y2K information. A brochure published by the American Red Cross, "Y2K — What You Should Know," is available at Town Hall, and the Red Cross is also offering a free one-hour presentation on Y2K preparedness to community groups. Bright Lights Can Annoy the Neighbors

Outside lighting around your house at night is a strong deterrent to would-be burglars, but those bright lights can be very annoying when they shine into a neighbor's window. Please try to position lights so that they illuminate your property but not others'. One resident suggests lights triggered by a motion detector as the best solution for protecting your home while conserving electricity and being a considerate neighbor.





Here's How to Apply for Maple Ave. Banners in the Year 2000

Due to the large number of requests received from community organizations to display banners across Maple Avenue each year, any organization that desires to display a banner during 2000 must make a written request to the Town Manager after January 1. Requests will be reviewed on a first come-first served basis to ensure fairness. Send requests to John H. Schoeberlein, Town Manager, 127 Center St., S., Vienna, VA 22180-5799. REQUESTS POSTMARKED PRIOR TO JANUARY 1, 2000, AND HAND-DELIVERED REQUESTS WILL NOT BE CON-

Organizations are required to submit a \$150 refundable deposit when they apply to display a banner across Maple Avenue. The deposit will be returned if the applicant meets all conditions listed in the approval of the application. If the organization fails to meet any of the requirements, the deposit will be forfeited.

Each banner accepted may be displayed for no more than two weeks. The following dates in 2000 are not available and should not be requested: April 18-May 3, May 22-30, October 11-26, and the entire month of December.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries will be Saturday, December 4, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Town property yard, 247 Nutley St., N.W. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens with a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 255-6381.

Too often used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of used oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water; in this way tons of toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic are released into the environment. When recycled, cleaned of its impurities and re-refined, used oil is a valuable resource that can be remanufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia, it is illegal to dispose of automobile lead-acid (wet-cell) batteries with refuse.

Hazardous Waste Drop-off Program

Fairfax County's Household Hazardous Waste Program accepts products used in and around the home that are flammable, corrosive, reactive or toxic. These types of items should never be disposed of with regular household trash due to the danger of soil and water contamination.

Hazardous materials such as fuel tanks, paints, solvents, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes, etc. can be disposed of through the Fairfax County Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. The drop-off center for hazardous waste is the I-66 Citizens' Recycling and Disposal Facility located at 4618 West Ox Road (just beyond the Fire & Rescue training academy).
