FEBRUARY 1990— Ring in Vienna's Centennial year with special activities on February 28, the date of the Town's incorporation 100 years ago. Home Businesses Require Permit

Vienna regulates the operation of inhome businesses by requiring that a home occupation permit be secured prior to startup. A home occupation is permitted in any residential zone provided that the business complies with the following regulations:

- Is operated entirely within the home.
- Employs no person other than immediate family members living in the home.
- Creates no external evidence of the home occupation, including any advertisement other than a name plate.
- Does not use more than 25% of the gross livable floor area.
- Does not use any internal combustion engine as a power source and does not use more than a total of three horsepower in electric motors.
- Will not emit any excess sounds, odors, or smoke beyond the property.
- No merchandise is sold on the premises.
- Customers or clients may call by appointment only.
- All merchandise and equipment must be stored inside the home.
- Deliveries to and from the home may be made only between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Residents are reminded that all refuse must be placed at the curb by 7 a.m. on collection day but not earlier than 6 p.m. the preceding evening. Eampty trash cans should be removed from the curb as soon as possible after trash pickup and no later than 7 p.m. the same day as collection.

Holiday Closing

Town Hall will be closed on Monday, February 21, for Washington's Birthday. Trash will be picked up as usual that day for residents on the Monday collection route.

Mulch Delivery Ending

February 29 is the last day to order a free delivery of ground leaf mulch or ground wood mulch from the Public Works Department. To place your order and for more information, call 255-6382. The minimum order for each type of mulch is a dump truck load (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle"). Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount at the Beulah Road storage facility near Glyndon Park.



New Yard Waste Disposal Rule

Due to changes in Fairfax County solid waste regulations, Vienna residents must now place yard waste in clear plastic bags or kraft paper bags for pickup by Town sanitation crews. Yard waste includes leaves, grass, small clippings, acorns, and other vegetation and is picked up on the first collection day each week, the same day as regular household trash pickup.

This new requirement will allow the sanitation crews to easily identify the contents of bags containing recyclable yard waste. When black or dark green bags are used, it can be difficult to determine what they contain.

The clear plastic bags may be purchased in the Finance Department at Town Hall during regular business hours. The cost is \$5.25, including tax, for a box of 50 bags. Bags may also be available at some local grocery stores.

FY 2001 Budget Process Underway

Preparation of Vienna's budget for fiscal year 2000-2001 has begun. Citizens who have suggestions about what items should be given priority for funding are encouraged to express their views in writing to Town Manager John H. Schoeberlein by February 4. Citizens will also have an opportunity to comment on the proposed budget at the May 15 Town Council meeting.

February 4 is also the deadline for non-profit Vienna organizations to apply for donations of Town funds in FY 2001. For information on how to apply, call the Town Manager's Office at 255-6370.

Residents of the Town of Vienna,

The Town of Vienna Police Department and the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department have united to implement an inclement weather program. In the event of severe weather, wide spread power outages, or hazardous road conditions, a "check on the welfare" telephone call list will be activated, and if needed, a temporary emergency shelter will be opened and kept in operation until either the Fairfax County Disaster Operations Center can open a shelter or until the situation resolves itself.

This program was designed in response to the severe ice storm that struck the Town during the winter of 1998/99 and is directed at citizens who have special needs such as the elderly, the physically challenged or individuals with severe medical conditions. The purpose of the program is two-fold. First, in the event of severe weather, to provide a point of contact to check on the status of each individual on the list, and second, if needed, to provide a temporary shelter location until the power has been restored, a longer term shelter is opened, or the weather and road conditions improve.

To register for this program, all that is required is that you fill out the attached form and return it to the Vienna Police Department.
