MAY 1990 — Conceptual plans for the Church Street Revitalization Project will be available for public review and comment on Tuesday, May 15 at 7:30 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. Church Street merchants and property owners and all other interested citizens are invited to this presentation by the Town's planning staff. Plans call for relocation of utility lines to the rear of the lots, installation of brick sidewalks, planting of trees and other landscaping, and possibly gas street lights.

MAY 1980 — Thanks to all residents who have brought aluminum to the Town's recycling center. Over 700 pounds of aluminum have been deposited since the center opened earlier this year. However, many steel cans are being mistakenly deposited. The only way to tell if a can is aluminum is to use a magnet. If the magnet sticks to the side of the can, it is not aluminum. Free testing magnets are available at Town Hall.

MAY 1970 — The final plans for the swimming pool at the Community Center are now being approved. However, due to delays caused by needed land acquisition, it is estimated that the pool will not be completed before late fall. A public hearing on a proposed ordinance to vacate an undeveloped portion of Mill Street adjacent to the Community Center for the pool will be held this month. The pool will be one-half Olympic size and include a kiddie pool, patio and dressing rooms.

### **Town Limits Number of People Per Dwelling Unit**

Many residential property owners rent part of their house, townhouse or condominium, or if they own more than one residence. may rent the second. Your Vienna Planning and Zoning Department reminds you that the Town limits the number of individuals who can live in any residential dwelling.

Either a "family" or "family equivalent" is permitted to occupy a single-family home, townhouse, condo or apartment. The Town Code defines these terms as follows:

- · A family is one or more persons related by blood or marriage occupying a single housekeeping unit and using common cooking facilities. In addition to the persons related by blood or marriage, not more than two boarders or lodgers are permitted.
- · A family equivalent is two or more individuals not related by blood or marriage and not exceeding four persons.

Private apartments that are separated from the main dwelling unit and "in-law suites" are prohibited by the Town Code.

Please keep these regulations in mind if you rent part of your home or a second residence. For more information, call 703-255-6341.

### **Budget Hearing May 15**

At its May 15 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed Town budget for fiscal year 2000-2001. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. Copies of the proposed budget are available for review at Town Hall and Patrick Henry Library. A "Budget in Brief" summary may be obtained free of charge at Town Hall, and the entire budget document may be purchased. Correction: In last month's newsletter the budget preview incorrectly stated the cost per day of the proposed increase in the quarterly water and sewer service charge. The correct amount is 4¢ per day.

### Is It Trash or Yard Debris?

Residents are reminded that, due to a change in the Fairfax County solid waste regulations, dark colored plastic bags may no longer be used for setting out yard debris. You may put your grass clippings, leaves, and other yard debris in transparent plastic bags or Kraft paper bags especially designed for yard debris. Regular paper grocery bags are not acceptable.

The ban on dark colored plastic bags for yard debris is to ensure that it is recycled and not disposed of as trash. For obvious safety reasons, trash collection crews do not open bags to determine the contents.

The transparent plastic bags may be purchased at Town Hall, and bags are also available at many supermarkets, hardware stores and garden centers. For more information, call the Public Works Department at 703-255-6382.

# **Running Safety Tips for Women**

Now that warm weather is here, more women are getting out on neighborhood streets and trails. The Road Runners Club of America offers these tips to "Run Smart. Run Safe," which also apply to those who walk, bike or skate.

- Don't wear headsets. Use your ears to be aware of your surroundings.
  - · Carry change for a phone call.
  - Run with a partner.
- Write down or leave word of the direction of your run. Tell friends and family of your favorite running routes.
- Run in familiar areas. Know where telephones are, or open businesses. Alter your route pattern often.
- Always stay alert. The more aware you are, the less vulnerable you are.
- Avoid unpopulated areas, deserted streets, and overgrown trails. Especially avoid unlit areas at night. Run clear of parked cars or bushes.
- Carry identification or write your name, phone number, and blood type on the inside sole of your running shoe. Include any medical information. Don't wear jewelry.
- Ignore verbal harrassment. Use discretion in acknowledging strangers. Look directly at others and be observant, but keep your distance and keep moving.
- Run against traffic so you can observe approaching vehicles.
- Wear reflective material if you must run before dawn or after dark.
- Use your intuition about a person or area and avoid if you're unsure.
- Practice memorizing license tags or identifying characteristics of strangers.
  - · Carry a noisemaker.
- Call the police *immediately* if something happens to you or someone else, or you notice anyone out of the ordinary.

IT'S THE LAW! Your Transportation Safety Commission reminds you that the driver of any vehicle must yield the right-of-way to any pedestrian crossing the street at any marked crosswalk, whether at mid-block or at the end of the block, or at any intersection.

### **Please Trim Plantings for Safety**

Citizens are reminded to keep bushes, hedges, and other plantings on their property trimmed so that they do not obstruct the vision of motorists or impede pedestrians and bicyclists. The Town Code restricts the height of plantings, fences and shrubbery to three feet above the curb level within 25 feet of an intersection. Keeping foliage trimmed makes it easier to see approaching vehicles. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of vision at intersections, please call the Planning and Zoning Department at 703-255-6341.

The Town Code also prohibits tree branches and other vegetation from encroaching on any sidewalk or right-of-way. If you have questions or complaints about obstruction of sidewalks or rights-of-way, please call the Public Works Department at 703-255-6382.

Every resident's effort to keep plantings trimmed will help make Vienna a safer and more attractive community, and all the walkers and bicyclists in your neighborhood will appreciate it!

PLEASE NOTE: Before cutting any tree, shrub or other plant near your home, first make sure it is on your property and not a neighbor's. Also, cutting trees in parks or on other public property is prohibited. If you are unsure whether a tree is on your property or in the public right-of-way (within 10 feet of the curb or edge of pavement), check with the Parks and Recreation Department at 703-255-6360.

Although not required by the Town Code, citizens are also asked to help control grass and weeds growing up through cracks in the sidewalk and between the sidewalk and street. This unwanted growth detracts from Vienna's beauty and can lead to costly concrete and asphalt repairs. The Town government recognizes the problem of upkeep in rights-of-way, but it simply does not have the personnel required to maintain these areas as it would like and must rely on citizens to help in controlling grass and weeds around their property.

### **Open Windows Springtime Hazard**

With the arrival of the pleasant days and cool nights of spring, we open our windows to let in the fresh air. Your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department reminds you that an open window can lead to a fatal fall. Many parents and caretakers of young children do not realize the potential danger of an open window or how easily a child can fall out of it. Here are some safety tips to prevent children from falling from open windows:

- Always supervise young children. Life-threatening injuries can happen in seconds to a child left unattended.
- Close and lock windows whenever young children are around. If you need ventilation, open windows that children cannot reach. For example, open double-hung windows from the top only.
- Keep beds and other furniture away from windows. Children can quickly climb onto window ledges and fall.
- Keep blinds, cords, drapes and other window treatments out of children's reach. They
  may injure themselves climbing on them or be strangled.
- Do not depend on screens to keep children from falling out of windows. They are not childproof. They are designed to keep insects out, not children in.
- Purchase guards for windows and safety gates for stairways to prevent children leaving an area undetected by a parent or caretaker.

# Sewer Backup Insurance Available

Sewer backups are costly, but sewer backup insurance is not! All insurance companies writing homeowner policies in Virginia offer special coverage for damage resulting from backups of drains and sewers, and this additional protection is available at very reasonable rates. For information on obtaining sewer backup coverage, contact your insurance company.

The Town's insurance carrier rarely approves claims resulting from sewer backups unless negligence in maintaining the system can be shown. Therefore, residents are encouraged to protect their property by obtaining sewer backup insurance.

To help prevent sewer backups, the Public Works Department cleans the main sewer lines whenever residents notify the department that their service laterals have been rodded by a commercial sewer cleaning service. If you have your sewer service lateral cleaned, please call the Public Works Department at 703-255-6381.

If you experience a problem with clogged sewer lines in your home, call the Public Works Department before you call a commercial sewer cleaning service; you may save yourself the price of a service call. A public works crew will check out the main sewer line and, if the obstruction occurs there, will clean it out at no charge to you.

### Permit Parking On Patrick St., S.E.

The Town Council has approved the establishment of a residential permit parking zone in the 100 block of Patrick Street, S.E. Restrictions take effect May 1.

Vehicles parked on the street in the restricted area between the hours of 7 p.m. and 6 a.m., seven days a week, will be required to display special decals. The decals will be issued to residents and their guests; no decals will be required for service vehicles making deliveries or performing work in the neighborhood.

### **Town Noise Ordinance Applies to Both Businesses & Residents**

Town ordinances prohibit excessively loud noise from commercial vehicles, machinery, radios, televisions, musical instruments, pets and other sources that disturbs the surrounding neighbors, especially in the late evening and early morning hours. To report noise complaints, call the Police Department at 703-255-6366.

The following activities are specifically prohibited by the Town Code:

- Loading or unloading of commercial vehicles within 300 feet of a residence between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.
- Servicing of trash dumpsters within 300 feet of a residence between 11 p.m. and
- Idling of commercial vehicle engines for more than three minutes.
- Operation of refrigeration equipment on vehicles between 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. when parked for more than 10 minutes.

In residential neighborhoods do-ityourselfers are reminded that home building projects and the operation of loud machinery such as chain saws and leaf blowers are prohibited between the hours of 8 p.m. and 7

### **Noisy Dogs Prohibited**

Dog owners are reminded that constant barking, especially late at night, drives your neighbors crazy! Please do all you can to keep your pet quiet.

The Town Code prohibits noisy dogs, which have "by loud, frequent and habitual barking, howling or crying, or other noises, caused annoyance or disturbed the peace or quiet of any person or persons in the neighborhood." The owner of a noisy dog may be summoned before the District Court and, if found guilty, required to remove the dog from the town limits.

Spring street sweeping ends this month. Residents are requested not to park on the street during the scheduled time for their section to allow the street sweeper to do a thorough job. Signs will be placed on streets as a reminder, and residents can also call 703-255-6381 for information.

## **Band Celebrates** 25th Anniversary

This year the Vienna Community Band is celebrating 25 years of service to the town. 
