AUGUST 1990 — For some two years now, the Town's Public Works Department has been working with the Virginia Department of Transportation to develop plans for the reconstruction of Park Street, S.E., from Maple Avenue to Fardale Street. On August 27 a public hearing will be held at the Vienna Community Center for the purpose of receiving public opinion on the constructions plans. Among other improvements, storm drainage pipes will be put underground, thus eliminating the deep ditches along Park Street.

AUGUST 1980 — All town residents are invited to celebrate the inauguration of the Vienna-Oakton-Tysons Corner Jitneybus System. Opening ceremonies and festivities will be held on August 2 at the Minipark, corner of Maple Avenue and Center Street. The two 17-passenger Jitneybuses will run on Route 123 between Tysons Corner and Oakton, and within the town will carry passengers to the Community Center, library, Post Office, Town Hall, the commercial areas on Maple Avenue and Church Street, and many parks and schools.

AUGUST 1970 — Trails have been constructed at Northside Park for the use of minibikes and riding will be allowed there as a result of action taken at the last meeting of the Town Council. Mini-bikes are illegal on public roads and sidewalks. Owners of the bikes will be required to have a permission slip signed by parents allowing them to ride on the designated paths.

Are Rats a Problem Where You Live?

Even the nicest neighborhoods can have rodent problems. Rats and mice have no respect for economic level or status. They have adapted to live in close association with people, causing property damage and spreading disease.

A successful rodent control program consists of good sanitation, "rodent-proofing" measures, and baiting or trapping. If you see signs of rodent infestation, call the Fairfax County Health Department, 703-246-2201, and make an appointment for a survey of the surrounding neighborhood to determine what is attracting the rats or mice and how best to remedy the situation.

Rodent infestation is often related to the following:

- 1. Bird seed or pet food left outside for long periods of time;
- 2. Use of plastic trash bags or trash cans without tight-fitting lids;
 - 3. Food scraps in compost piles; or
- 4. Ripened fruit left under trees or vegetables left in the garden to rot.

A pamphlet is available from the Health Department that includes information on how to spot rodent infestation, rodent-proofing your home, eliminating food sources, and trapping and baiting.

Yard Sale Reminder

Each household in town may hold two garage/yard sales per year. No permit is required. Two advertising signs, no larger than four square feet each, may be displayed on the property where the sale takes place, and four directional signs, no larger than two square feet each, may be placed on other private property with the owner's permission. Signs may not be displayed more than two days prior to the start of the sale. Signs are not permitted on public property, in the public right-ofway (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement), or on utility poles. Illegally placed signs will be removed. Vienna Celebrates Quarter Century of Recycling

As the Town of Vienna completes the first year of its expanded curbside recycling program, it is also celebrating 25 years of progress and leadership in its recycling efforts

Vienna's curbside newspaper pickup program was the first of its kind in Northern Virginia, beginning in 1975. The Town's aluminum recycling drop-off center opened in 1979, which received an environmental quality award from the Virginia Municipal League in 1980 as "innovative, practical, cost effective, used frequently by citizens and developed with their input."

In 1987 Vienna began recycling "white goods" — stoves, refrigerators and other major appliances — and also started collecting used motor oil from town residents, the only local jurisdiction in the area to offer this service. The program was later expanded to include antifreeze and car batteries as well as oil.

In 1990 the Town established a drop-off recycling facility for plastic, metal and cardboard at the Vienna Community Center and installed bins behind Town Hall where residents and businesses could deposit white office paper to be recycled. The following year, the first telephone book collection facility in the Washington, D.C., area was located at the Maple Avenue Shopping Center.

By 1992 Vienna had the highest recycling rate in Fairfax County, and that rate has exceeded 40% since 1996. (Virginia had encouraged local jurisdictions to reach a 25% recycling rate by 1995, and the Environmental Protection Agency recommends a goal of 35% nationwide by 2005.)

Curbside collection of glass, plastic and metal began in 1993 and was expanded in 1999 to include cardboard and mixed paper (magazines, phone books, junk mail, etc.). It is estimated that last year the Town's recycling programs saved approximately \$110,000 in land disposal fees.

With 75% to 80% of residents participating in one or more of the Town's recycling programs, and with its long history of leadership and innovation, Vienna plans to remain at the forefront of new recycling programs as they emerge in the 21st century.

"WHEREAS, the Character Counts Coalition was formed in 1992 to encourage high moral and ethical values among all people; and


"WHEREAS, these fundamental moral and ethical values transcend cultural, religious, and socio-economic differences; and

Vienna Police Recruiting Auxiliaries

The Vienna Police Department is always looking for a few good men and women to serve as volunteer auxiliary police officers. Recruits are trained at the Fairfax County Criminal Justice Academy and must adhere to the same standards as paid police officers.

Auxiliaries assist sworn officers with a variety of assignments in either the administrative or patrol divisions. In many instances, they also bring their own special training and skills to aid the department such as photography, computer operations, clerical, medical, communications, etc.

Auxiliary officers must devote a minimum of 24 hours per month to their duties. Other requirements include U.S. citizenship, age between 21 and 75, and not be employed by any law enforcement or corrections agency or by a commercial detective or security agency.

Select a Contractor Carefully

Bad experiences with home improvement contractors head the list of most frequent consumer complaints to Fairfax County's Department of Telecommunications and Consumer Services. The homeowner's best protection is careful selection of a contractor. Here are some important tips:

- Ask for a copy of the contractor's current licenses and insurance certificates. Home improvement contractors and their sales staffs must be licensed by the Licensing Section of the Office of Building Code Services, 703-324-1540.
- Check the contractor's compliance record with the Department of Telecommunications and Consumer Services at 703-793-8435. If the work was in other jurisdictions, call their consumer offices.
- Ask for customer references, particularly from those who have had projects similar to yours. If possible, inspect the work performed by the contractor.
- Make sure the contractor has insurance to cover damage to your home or injury to employees working on your property. Obtain the name of the insurance carrier and the agent and contact them to verify that the appropriate policies are in effect.
- Get written estimates from several firms. Be sure to specify the work you want done and the materials to be used so that the estimates will be easy to compare.
- Insist on a written contract, as required by the County Home Improvement Code and state regulations, and make sure that it includes all agreements regarding the work to be done and materials to be used. Also, be sure the contract specifies that you will be furnished with a signed mechanic's lien waiver or release from suppliers of materials or subcontractors.

Lightning *CAN*Strike Twice

Your Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department reminds you: These are the dog days of summer, those hazy, hot and humid days when there is always the chance of an afternoon thunderstorm. And thunderstorms bring lightning. Several people have been struck, and some have been killed, by lightning in our area during the last several years. Please be aware of approaching thunderstorms and take precautions to avoid becoming a victim of a lightning strike.

There are some locations that are extremely dangerous and should be avoided during thunderstorms. These include open fields; athletic fields; golf courses; swimming pools and other bodies of water; and areas around wire fences, clothes lines, overhead wires, railroad tracks and isolated trees. Also, you should not talk on the telephone or take a shower during a thunderstorm.

If you notice a thunderstorm approaching, take refuge in a location that offers protection from lightning. The best places to be during a thunderstorm include inside a home, large metal frame building, automobile with metal top (not convertible) and city streets shielded by nearby buildings.

Your Transportation Safety Commission Reminds You . . .

Virginia state law requires motorists to switch on their headlights when weather conditions warrant the use of windshield wipers. Volation of this law carries a fine of up to \$25. The requirement does not apply to intermittent use of windshield wipers.

Headlights in use on a vehicle not only improve the driver's vision, but also help alert pedestrians and other vehicles to its approach.

Your Transportation Safety Commission


The Vienna Trasnportation Safety Commission was established in 1968 to promote traffic safety and to study transportation issues within the town.
