FEBRUARY 1991 - Money and King Funeral Home, two houses in the Windover Heights Historic District, and eight Town-owned properties are the first to be approved by the Town Council for Vienna's register of historic structures and sites. Any property owner may apply to be included in the register. Applications are evaluated on the basis of age, historic significance and special features.

FEBRUARY 1981 – The preliminary report by the Vienna Metro Station Planning Task Force indicates that with proper planning the net impact of the station can be "very positive for the community as a whole." According to the Task Force report, most of the anticipated problems associated with the advent of Metro relate to the expected major increase in traffic, and there may also be efforts to rezone the land around the Metro station for high-density development. The station is scheduled to open in 1987.

FEBRUARY 1971 - The Town Council has endorsed the European tour this summer planned by the James Madison High School Madrigals at the invitation of the Institute of European Studies in Vienna, Austria. Concerts are planned in Luxembourg, Munich. Salzburg, Vienna, Innsbruck, Venice, Florence, Rome and Paris, bringing honor and prestige not only to themselves but to their town and community.

FEBRUARY 1961 - Of interest to all residents is the proposed interchange at the junction of Interstate Route 66 and State Route 828 (Nutley Road) designed to serve Vienna. This interchange is of vital importance to the large number of residents of this area who must commute to and from Washington during the peak rush hours. With the prospects of the population of the Vienna area increasing by leaps and bounds, a convenient and sufficiently wide access road to the interchange is of paramount importance to avoid dangerous congestion on our secondary roads.

Community **Enhancement** Commission

Vienna's Community Enhancement Commission was created by the Town Council to enhance volunteer efforts to improve the appearance of all areas of town.

The Commission acts as the focal point for community beautification, including presentation of awards to town residents and businesses for improvements to their property, sponsorship of an "Adopt-a-Spot" program, tree seedling giveaways, and the annual Vienna Beautification Day, when residents and organizations are invited to pitch in for a town-wide litter pickup.

Membership includes one resident from each quadrant of town; two members from the business sector; and a student from James Madison High School. Current members are Ken Plumb, Chairman; Stephen Bukont; Minda Facenda; Patricia Polychrones; John Bruno; Mary Wilkerson; and Kevin Kerwin. BPOL Tax Due March 1

Due to a change in Virginia law, effective this year in all local jurisdictions throughout the Commonwealth, the deadline for payment of the annual business. professional, and occupational license tax (BPOL) is now March 1. All businesses in the Town of Vienna, including home occupations, must renew their business licenses

The amount of the tax is based on gross receipts, and the rate varies according to the type of business. The gross receipts threshold is \$50,000, below which the tax does not apply. Those businesses with total annual gross receipts of \$50,000 or less pay only the minimum license fee of \$30 per year.

BPOL license tax forms are available in the Finance Department at Town Hall. 127 Center St., S. For more information or assistance in figuring license taxes, call 703-255-6321.

Last Chance To Order Mulch

February 28 is the last day to order a free delivery of ground leaf mulch or ground wood mulch from the Public Works Department. To place your order, call 703-255-6388 and leave your name, address, daytime phone number, type of mulch desired (wood or leaf), and the number of loads to be delivered. Please speak slowly and spell your name and street. One load is estimated to be about the size of a VW Beetle, or 2-2.5 cubic yards.

Mulch deliveries will be placed only in the driveway at the end closest to the house. Once mulch is delivered, it becomes the property of the homeowner and the Town will not remove any excess mulch ordered.

- Approved the following architect and engineering fees for construction supervision support for the Northside Property Yard project: Studio 3 in an amount not to exceed \$175,325, Tri-Tek in an amount not to exceed \$14,400, and ECS Ltd. in an amount not to exceed \$28,700, for a total of \$218,425.
- •Directed the Town Attorney and Town Manager to negotiate with Global Metro Networks for a telecommunications franchise. A public hearing will be scheduled when the document is drafted.
- Accepted the resignations of Theodore "Ted" Thomas and Gary Gillum from the Planning Commission.
- Approved a six-month extension of the lease agreement with the Northern Virginia Model Railroaders for use of the Vienna Railroad Station.

- Approved the extension through January 28, 2002, of the contract with Tri-Tek Engineering for engineering services as needed, with a 7.5% increase in hourly rates and miscellaneous fees.
- Awarded the following bids: cab and chassis with a 25-cubic yard rear loader packer to Weber's White Trucks in the amount of \$111,700; two-ton cab and chassis with dump body and hoist to Central Motor Co. in the amount of \$49,726; and one-ton cab and chassis with dump body and dual rear wheels to Highview Motors in the amount of \$29,782.
- Adopted amendments to the motor vehicle code to bring it into conformance with new State law.




