MAY 1991 - Vienna's first auxiliary police officers have been sworn in. They are Dalip K. Gupta, Walter Elliott, T.R. Cook, John F. Connifey, and Robert F. Bodroghy. Auxiliary officers assist regular duty officers in patrol, traffic control, records processing, and other assignments. After completing in excess of 125 hours of intensive training in police procedures, they are required to work a minimum of 24 hours per month.

MAY 1981 - "Moorefield Day," sponsored by Historic Vienna, Inc., and the Town of Vienna, will be held on Saturday, May 2. The purpose of Moorefield Day is to acquaint citizens with the historic significance of Moorefield, the oldest house still standing in Vienna, and to encourage support for efforts to restore it. The day's activities will include displays and information about Moorefield, and about Jeremiah Moore, historic fighter for religious freedom in Virginia, who built the house around 1790.

MAY 1971 – Do you have Town water and sewer? If not, this is the time to think about getting them. Costs go up September 1. The front footage will double from \$2.50 to \$5 per running foot. In addition, after that date the Town will no longer make the connection at the street. Homeowners will be required to obtain a plumber to do this work.

MAY 1961 – The proposed general fund budget for the coming fiscal year totals \$462,000, including the largest expense, \$142,000 for police protection. Vienna's citizens are served by a 13-man force in addition to the Chief and three civilian dispatchers.

Officers Save Resident's Life

Two Town of Vienna police officers were able to revive a resident in cardiac arrest using one of the Police Department's automatic external defibrillators (AED).

Master Police Officer Jim Wickes and Officer Donna Rippley were driving down Cottage Street, S.W., on Sunday, March 25, when they saw a resident collapse in his driveway. The officers radioed for emergency rescue response, then went to the victim's aid.

With the assistance of a bystander who is a retired nurse, the officers checked for breathing and a pulse and, finding none, administered a shock to the victim with the AED, which revived him. Rescue personnel from the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department arrived on the scene and transported the victim to the hospital for further

This incident was the first time the Police Department's AED units have been used in the two years since they were acquired. All of Vienna's sworn officers have been trained in the use of the unit and two AED's are on the street 24 hours a day. The defibrillators give officers the capability to respond immediately to victims of cardiac arrest, where the chance of survival decreases by 10% with each minute that passes without treatment.

Nutley St. Water Tank Painting And Repairs Underway

The water tank at the Town's Nutley Street property yard has been covered while painting and repairs are underway. The project, which is expected to be finished in mid-June, will not affect water quality or pressure.

The project includes repair of the tank's walkway and ladder, which have deteriorated with age and exposure to the weather, and repainting all surfaces inside and outside the tank to prevent corrosion.

Dog Owners Required To Clean Up After Pets

The Town of Vienna has a "pooper scooper" ordinance that requires dog owners to clean up after their pets when out for a walk. Please be a responsible pet owner and don't allow your dog to foul the lawns of neighbors. *Tip: The plastic sleeves used on newspapers make excellent pooper scoopers!*

Also, signs are posted in several Town parks to remind pet owners that dogs are not allowed on athletic fields, tennis and basketball courts, playgrounds, and picnic areas because of the nuisance and potential health hazard to park users. The Town Animal Warden is authorized to fine pet owners found in violation of these laws.

Dog owners are reminded that it is against the law to let dogs run at large on public or private property. Dogs must be restrained by a dependable leash and controlled by a responsible person when off the property of the owner. Dogs found running at large may be picked up by the Animal Warden, and owners charged with dog-at-large violations must appear in court. Fines increase with each offense to a maximum of \$500.



Can Harm Trees

Vienna's Community Enhancement Commission reminds you:

Spring is a good time to consider promoting the health of our trees. Trees contribute so much to our lives. They provide beauty, shade and oxygen, enhance property values, and act as reservoirs of rainwater. One thing we can do for our trees is to remove any vines growing on them.

There are basically two types of vines, twining vines (grapevine, wisteria, bittersweet) and vines that attach themselves by tendrils directly to the tree (English ivy, Virginia creeper, poison ivy). Both types will harm a tree in several ways: The additional weight of the vines can cause major limbs to break. The vines smother the tree's leaves, thus reducing its photosynthetic capability to manufacture "food" needed for growth. The tendrils of the attaching vines can actually penetrate the bark and kill the tree's cambium layer, which is the tissue that governs the tree's diameter growth.

To kill vines is relatively simple. Cut the vines at the base of the tree and pull them off if you can. If the vines are too large and well established to pull off, just leave them; the vines will eventually die and fall off. For folks allergic to poison ivy, garden centers sell ready-to-use spray bottles of poison ivy killer. Please read the directions and use accordingly.

Be aware that the vines will try to grow back up the tree; therefore, it is necessary to check one or twice during the growing season and take the appropriate cutting or spraying action to keep the vines in check.



Vienna Receives Budget Award

For six consecutive years, the Town of Vienna has received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada. This award is the highest form of recognition given for governmental budgeting. In order to receive the budget award, a jurisdiction must satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how well a government's budget serves as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide, and a communications device. Budget documents must be rated "proficient" in all of these categories to receive the award.

Town Has Top Bond Rating

The Town of Vienna's general obligation bonds are rated "Aa1" by Moody's Investors Service. This high bond rating for a local government the size of Vienna is enjoyed by very few towns in the United States.

This rating enables the Town to sell bonds at more favorable interest rates compared to those of municipalities with lower bond ratings, resulting in substantial savings for Vienna taxpayers over the life of the bonds.

Moody's noted that its high rating is based on Vienna's healthy economy, sound financial condition, and rapid debt retirement.

The Town of Vienna borrows money by issuing tax-free general obligation bonds to finance major capital projects. The \$4.8 million of public improvements funded in the latest (1999) bond issue include Phase II of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project, traffic signal system upgrade, street improvements, water main cleaning and lining, water tank rehabilitation, improvements to the Nutley Street property yard, and other major public improvements.

Bond financing spreads the cost of capital projects over a period of many years, rather than charging the full cost to today's taxpayers. Also, the Town's policy of using meals and lodging tax revenues for a large portion of annual debt amortization payments limits the need for property tax increases to fund these projects.

Town of Vienna, Virginia A Look at the Proposed Budget For Fiscal Year 2001-2002



MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER

The main challenges in preparing the 2001-2002 budget were the demands to maintain our infrasturcture, insure that our employee compensation remained competitive, and remain on schedule with replacement of vehicles and equipment while addressing the issue of large increases in property assessments. We did not prepare the budget based on setting an arbitrary real estate tax rate but rather on addressing the needs of the Town. Following the review of department requests, we were able to determine what tax rate was required to accomplish our goals.

The budget as submitted includes significant increases for street resurfacing, concrete repair, and adjustments necessary to keep our compensation plan competitive with other area jurisdictions while reducing the real estate tax rate from 31¢ per \$100 of assessed valuation to 30¢. The budget includes no decrease or elimination of any existing services as well as recommending no change in our water and sewer rates or service charges.

Because of reassessments, the proposed 30¢ tax rate represents an effective tax increase of 5.56%. The effect of the increase on individual properties will vary widely due to the large disparity in reassessment percentages but, on average, a Vienna homeowner will see an increase in the Town tax bill of approximately \$46.

One of our priorities in developing the FY 2001-02 budget was to insure that our infrastructure would be maintained in proper condition. The proposed amount for our street overlay program when coupled with the expenditures in the current budget means that the Town will expend over \$1 million on resurfacing in a two-year period. Our concrete repair and replacement program is proposed to double over the current year, thus allowing us to replace twice the amount of curb, gutter and sidewalk.

We have included funds for two traffic classifiers and a laptop computer to aid us in traffic signal timing, and we are also budgeting for additional maintenance to keep our signal system in good repair as well as maintaining the optimum signal synchronization.

We have proposed the establishment of a replacement fund for computer equipment similar to that already in place for Town vehicles. Also included in the fund is the purchase of laptop computers for our police vehicles as the first step towards wireless mobile communication.

The coming year will be a challenging time given the slowdown now taking place in the national economy, but I feel our proposed budget is a sound plan that can be used to meet our service delivery and maintenance goals without creating a major negative impact on our residents.

I invite you to read the entire budget message and proposed budget. The budget is available for public review at Town Hall and Patrick Henry Library. Citizens are also encouraged to attend the public hearing on the budget, which is scheduled for the Town Council meeting on Monday, May 21, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

Budget Preparation And Adoption

The Code of the Town of Vienna requires that by July 1 of each year, the Vienna Town Council adopt by ordinance a budget establishing the tax rate for the incoming year. Estimated revenues must be equivalent to estimated expenditures. It is mandated in the Code that the fiscal year begin on July 1 and end on June 30.

At least one public hearing must be held on the budget prior to its adoption. Seven days prior to this hearing, the Town Clerk must publish a notice of Council's intention to hold such an event. The budget cannot be adopted at the same meeting at which the public hearing is held. Two notices, again at least seven days apart, must then be published in a paper of general circulation announcing Council's intention to adopt the budget. Following this advertisement, Council may then adopt the budget. After this action is taken, the Clerk publishes the final notice of adoption.

The Town of Vienna's budget process begins in January of each year when Council presents to the staff its budget priorities for the upcoming year. Citizens who have suggestions about what items should be given priority for funding are encouraged to express their views in writing to the Town Manager. In addition, non-profit Vienna organizations may apply for donations of Town funds.

The Town Manager then prepares and submits to the Town Council his proposed budget, and copies are made available to the public. This year, budget work sessions were scheduled for April 21 and 23 and, if needed, May 5. The public hearing on the proposed budget will be hald at the Town Council meeting on May 21, which begins at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. If Council considers it necessary, a final budget work session to discuss comments made at the public hearing will be held on May 30. Adoption of the budget is scheduled for the June 4 Council meeting.



PLANNING & ZONING

During 2000 the Planning and Zoning staff continued its involvement with the Church Street Vision Plan. "Vision Project Number 1" at 144

Church St., N.W., shown here under construction, is the first development in the Pedestrian Commercial Zone. which was created to enhance the pearance and economic vitality of businesses in the



historic Church Street commercial corridor between Lawyers Road and Mill Street, and to preserve the unique character of what was once Vienna's main street.

The Department spent many hours reviewing and updating Vienna's five-year Comprehensive Plan, which describes the characteristics of the town and identifies trends and events that have been considered in charting its future development in the areas of transportation, land use, and community facilities and services. The new plan was adopted by the Town Council in January.

PUBLIC WORKS

The new Public Works Department facility is now under construction at Northside Property Yard off Mill Street, N.E. When completed, it will house all of the Town's Public Works operations – vehicle and equipment maintenance, street maintenance, general maintenance, sanitation, and water and sewer – currently located at the Nutley Street Property Yard. Construction is expected to be completed in May 2002.

During the current fiscal year, Public Works crews repaired 3,400 lineal feet of curb and gutter and 7,700 square feet of sidewalk and driveway aprons along with installation of 25 handicap ramps and 1,300 square feet of concrete drainage swales. This amount is expected to be doubled during FY 2001-02 in conjunction with an increase in street resurfacing.

POLICE

The Police Department continued working toward meeting the requirements for national accreditation. The first step in the process is to demonstrate compliance with 95 "core standards" of the more than 400 standards required for accreditation, relating to life, health, safety, legal, and other critical law enforcement issues that most affect the public interest.

The Department placed second in Virginia and third nationally in its size category in the "Chief's Challenge" competition, an annual program sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police to recognize the contributions of police departments throughout the country to enhancing traffic safety.

The police began participation with Motorola in the "Donate a Phone" progam to collect used wireless telephones for victims of domestic violence to call 911 and the Virginia Domestic Violence Hotline

Robert A. Carlisle, a 20-year veteran of the Fairfax County Police Department and former Assistant Chief for the City of Falls Church, became Vienna's Chief of Police in February.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

A new Information Technology (IT) Division was created this fiscal year to coordinate the data processing operations of all departments and oversee the Town government's Internet web site.

If approved by the Town Council with the proposed budget, a replacement fund will be established for computer equipment, and the IT Coordinator will develop a detailed replacement program similar to that already in place for Town vehicles, which will keep computer hardware and software in all departments up-to-date with current technology at a steady level of funding.

The IT Division is working with other departments to upgrade the Town web site to make it more "user friendly" and to include more information and more online services.

PARKS & RECREATION

The Parks and Recreation Department expanded its programs for senior citizens and teens in 2000. "Life enhancement for the mature adult" includes activities for both the World War II generation and the Baby Boomers, such as the Lunch Bunch, pictured here on an outing to the Pineapple Tea Room in Old Town Alex-



andria, and Mindfulness Stress Reduction, designed to help participants achieve their optimum fitness levels in mind and body.

Over 2,000 high school and middle school students have attended dances, concerts and other

special events at Club Phoenix Teen Center during the past year. The Teen Center also supports outreach programs such as the local high school S.A.D.D. chapter, Thoreau after-school program, and Teen Productions theater company.

The Parks Maintenance Division moved from Northside Property Yard into temporary quarters in the parking lot next to Vienna Elementary School on Center Street, S., while the new Public Works Department complex is constructed at Northside. The Parks Maintenance operations will be relocated to the Nutley Street Property Yard once the Public Works employees move from there into their new facility.
