APRIL 1992 – During its first six months of use, Vienna's tub grinder machine has saved the Town over \$12,000 in landfill fees while providing residents with tons of free leaf and wood mulch.

APRIL 1982 – The Vienna Bikeway Plan is being updated as part of a review of the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The bikeway map is under revision to place primary emphasis on recreational, rather than commuter, bicycling. Using the W&OD Trail as the spine of the system, the proposed map will blend bike paths (in stream valleys and parks) and bike routes (on streets) into an integrated town-wide system.

APRIL 1972 – The Vienna Policemen's Association will sponsor a one-day circus on April 19 on the playing fields between Vienna Elementary School and the Community Center. The Royal Wild West Circus will feature elephants and other wild animals.

APRIL 1962 – The Town has signed an agreement for an additional supply of water with the City of Falls Church, which receives its water from the Dalecarlia plant in the District of Columbia. Under the agreement, Falls Church is to supply Vienna with up to two million gallons of water a day and will give Vienna a surplus of water for many years to come. This supplements our present supply of well water.

Car Tag Deadline

2002 Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals must be displayed by midnight April 15. Decals are available by mail and in the Finance Department at Town Hall weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The registration fee is \$20 for passenger cars and trucks weighing under 4,000 pounds, \$25 for cars and trucks 4,000 pounds and over, and \$10.50 for motorcycles. Dog Park Hearing April 1

At its April 1 meeting, the Town Council will hold a public hearing on a proposed off-leash dog exercise area at Moorefield Park. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

Moorefield Park is an undeveloped Town park located on Courthouse Road, S.W., just off Nutley Street and adjacent to Fairfax County's Nottoway Park. The dog exercise area would be 13,500 square feet (90x150 feet) enclosed by a chain link fence five feet high. The site would include benches, "doggie bag" dispensers and waste receptacles, and a source of water for the dogs.

Creating space for the fenced enclosure would require clearing of some underbrush and small trees in the northeast portion of Moorefield Park just beyond the existing parking area. The larger trees would remain in order to minimize site disturbance and to provide shade for park users. A wood mulch ground cover is proposed for inside the fenced area.

The Vienna Parks and Recreation staff is recommending the dog park be open daily from 7 a.m. until dark and its use controlled by the same type of rules and regulations imposed at Fairfax County's Blake Lane dog park in Oakton, which include requirements that handlers must be at least 16 years old, maximum of two dogs per handler, handlers must "scoop the poop" and fill in any holes dug by their dogs, and no food (except doggie treats).


Maple Avenue Construction Scheduled to Begin in May

Barring unforeseen delays, Phase II of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project should be underway the first week of May.

The project area, from Park Street to East Street, will include brick sidewalks on each side of Maple Avenue, new curb and gutter, brick crosswalks at all intersections, new asphalt pavement surface, increased turning radii at intersections and driveway entrances, improved street lighting with ornamental poles and fixtures, elimination of utility poles on the north side of Maple Avenue, planter areas for shrubbery and trees, trash receptacles, benches, and new bus shelters.

These design elements will benefit both businesses and shoppers by improving

the general appearance of the area and increasing safety. There will be no major changes to the width, capacity, speed, or other transportation characteristics of Maple Avenue.

Construction will begin on the north side of Maple Avenue at Park Street, proceed up that side of the street to East Street, then come down the south side of Maple back to Park.

Traffic Management During Construction

Obviously, this project will cause some disruption to traffic, but this disruption will be held to a minimum by requiring the construction contractor to adhere to a traffic plan as part of the contract and to do much of the work at night when traffic volume is lightest. The contractor will be required to maintain two lanes of traffic on Maple Avenue in each direction at all times, for a total of four lanes, and provide electronic message boards and lane arrows to direct drivers to the appropriate lane. To maintain the four open lanes, the center left-turn lane will be eliminated in the construction zone.

The contractor will construct crosswalks across Maple Avenue in five segments, allowing four lanes to remain open while one lane is constructed. The lane closest to the curb will be closed in conjunction with the adjacent side street crosswalk construction, then each of the three center lanes, then the lane on the opposite curb side of the street and the adjacent side street. Utility crossings will be accomplished in the same manner. The side streets will be temporarily closed to through traffic for short periods and traffic detoured to other routes to facilitate construction of crosswalks on those streets.

The Maple Avenue Enhancement Project will affect all Vienna businesses, but especially those located within the construction area. Town residents are urged to continue to patronize their favorite shops, restaurants and other businesses and to be patient with any inconvenience in reaching them.

Construction is scheduled to be completed this fall (in time for the Halloween Parade!). "Walk of History" Bricks for Sale

As part of Phase II of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project, the Vienna Brick Committee (VBC) is selling commemorative sidewalk bricks to be installed along the project corridor in the area of the Wolftrap Creek bridge near Beulah Road.

Many local non-profit organizations are once again joining together to raise funds for their community activities through sales or the "Walk of History" commemorative bricks. During Phase I of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project in 1998, the VBC sold over 700 bricks to Vienna residents and businesses, and distributed approximately \$30,000.

Individuals, families, companies, and organizations may order 4"x8" paver bricks engraved with up to three lines of text, which will become a permanent part of downtown Vienna. County Assesses Town Real Estate

Last month most Vienna residents received notice of a change in their 2002 real estate assessments. The Fairfax County Department of Tax Administration (DTA) sent notices to all county property owners whose assessments have been changed, representing approximately 95% of the taxable parcels in the county.

According to DTA, the majority of residential properties increased in value, reflecting the strong price appreciation and solid sales volume in the 2001 real estate market. About two-thirds of the properties increased by 20% or less; slightly more than 4% had assessment increases greater than 30%. Countywide, the average increase was 16.27%; within the Vienna zip code the average was 17.67%. The typical household in fiscal year 2003 will pay \$3,357 in County real estate tax, an increase of \$470 over last year.

Property owners can file an appeal with DTA if they believe their assessment is not equitable in comparison with similar properties or if they believe their assessment exceeds fair market value. For an appeal application and more information, call DTA at 703-222-8234 or visit DTA's homepage at www.fairfaxcounty.gov/dta. Appeals should be filed by April 5 to ensure a timely response prior to the Board of Equalization (BOE) filing deadline of June 3.

Appeals can also be filed directly with BOE, a panel of nine taxpayers appointed by the County Board of Supervisors that conducts formal hearings and takes sworn testimony. All appeals to BOE must be filed by June 3. BOE appeal forms are also available at DTA's homepage or by calling BOE at 703-324-4891.

Town Council Requests Lower County Tax Rate

In response to the increase in Fairfax County real estate assessments, the Vienna Town Council adopted a resolution at its March 4 meeting requesting the Board of Supervisors to reduce the County real estate tax rate. County Executive Anthony H. Griffin's proposed budget for fiscal year 2003 contains no change in the tax rate.

Real Estate Assessment Info Available Online

Fairfax County real estate assessments are available on the Internet at www.fairfax county.gov/dta. The assessment information includes property descriptions, sale prices, and assessed values for most properties in the county, including the Town of Vienna. No confidential information is accessible and visitors to the web site cannot change the information.

Assessment information is also available to the public at the Real Estate Public Information Counter in Room 333 of the Fairfax County Government Center. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, with extended hours on Thursday to 6:30 p.m. Citizens with a touchtone phone can also access a voice response system at 703-222-6740 between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. Monday through Saturday to hear their choice of information from County real estate records.

Mulch Helps Your Yard Withstand Drought

A "Beauty Spot" tip from Your Community Enhancement Commission

During this time of drought conditions in the Mid-Atlantic, it is especially important to aid your plants and improve your yard appeal with proper mulching. Mulch helps minimize weeds, conserve moisture, moderate soil temperature and give added dimension to your yard.

Clear all the weeds and grass from the area you intend to cover to prevent them from growing up through the mulch. Cover the cleared area with two to four inches of mulch, away from the trunk or stems of the plant. Make a neat outer edge by leaving a small gap between the mulch and the surrounding lawn.

THERE IS STILL PLENTY OF MULCH AVAILABLE! Residents may pick up mulch themselves in any amount. The mulch is stored on Town-owned property off Beulah Road near Glyndon Park. Look for the sign "Free Leaf Mulch & Wood Mulch."

<u>Citizen Comment</u> No Leashes for Cats

A Moorefield Creek Road, S.W., resident writes: "Cats are solitary and curious seekers who rid our neighborhoods of the mice and rats that would otherwise invade our homes in winter. They are neither threatening nor dangerous.

"Neither Vienna nor Northern Virginia is overrun by cats. It is NOT a problem! The proposal for a cat leash law is both unnecessary and ridiculous. Hector L. Allen

Hector L. Allen, who served as Vienna's Director of Public Works from 1962 to 1982, died on February 16. He also served as Interim Town Manager in 1984 and oversaw the construction of the addition to the Vienna Community Center in 1988.

A town resident, Mr. Allen was president of the Village Square Townhouse Association for 14 years and was a Trustee of the Vienna Assembly of God.

Before coming to Vienna, Mr. Allen had a long and distinguished career in the U.S. Army. An officer in the Corps of Engineers, he served with Gen. George Patton's 3rd Army in Europe during World War II and with Gen. Douglas MacArthur in Korea.

Water Mains Flushed in Spring

In the spring of each year, the Town of Vienna flushes the water mains in its distribution system in order to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. The preventive maintenance program begins in early April, and flushing usually occurs between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Water mains are flushed by opening the fire hydrants and allowing the water to flow freely for a short period of time. The flushing cleans out sediment that normally accumulates during the summer and winter, and enables the Town to test and perform routine maintenance on the 800+ fire hydrants within its service area.

Flushing may result in some discoloration and the presence of sediment in the water reaching your home or business. These conditions are not harmful and should be of short duration. The Town appreciates your tolerance of this inconvenience. If you need more information, please call the Water and Sewer Customer Service Office at 703-255-6385.

"As Mayor, I pledge that I will work hard to preserve the uniqueness and the quality of life we all enjoy."





He is currently on the board of the Vienna Baseball Foundation. A former prosecutor in the Fairfax County Commonwealth's Attorney's Office, he is currently in private practice.

"I have always valued the 'home town' feeling people associate with Vienna. It has a reputation as a safe, friendly and well-run town. I have worked to ensure that the level of police protection, parks, recreation programs and public works services continue to meet the needs of the citizens. I have also worked to renovate the town's aging infrastructure.
