SEPTEMBER 1992 – The Virginia Department of Transportation has notified the Town that the Cottage Street reconstruction project has been approved. Surveying for the project should begin soon, with construction tentatively scheduled for 1995. The Town Council requested VDOT to include Cottage Street in its urban construction program following a public hearing last February, when many citizens expressed concern about the deteriorating condition of the street.

SEPTEMBER 1982 – Mayor Charles Robinson, Fairfax County Board Chairman Jack Herrity and State Senator Charles Waddell were among the dignitaries who participated in groundbreaking ceremonies for the Vienna Metro Station on September 8. The station is scheduled to open in mid-1986 at the intersection of I-66 and Nutley Street.

SEPTEMBER 1972 – A second radar set has drastically increased the number of speeders apprehended in town. The Police Department's radar report for September lists 41 citations issued August 30 through September 7 and 71 citations September 8 through 13. This is the largest number of citations ever given for speeding. A word to the wise . . . watch that speedometer!

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries will be Saturday, September 7, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the Town property yard, 247 Nutley St., N.W. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For information, call 703-255-6381.

Too often used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of used oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, releasing tons of toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic into the environment. When recycled, cleaned of its impurities and re-refined, used oil is a valuable resource that can be remanufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia, it is illegal to dispose of automobile batteries with refuse.

Stop for School Buses

It's back-to-school time! The law requires drivers to stop for school buses taking on or discharging passengers and to remain stopped until the passengers are out of the street and the bus is again underway. This applies to drivers approaching from any direction. Children should be cautioned to look in all directions and make sure all vehicles are stopped before crossing the street to and from the bus.

Special Pickup Deadline Oct. 1

Tuesday, October 1, is the last day for Town of Vienna residents to call for a Special Trash Pickup this year. Because of fall leaf collection, no orders for Special Pickups are taken in October, November and December.

To dispose of unwanted furniture, appliances, building materials, brush and other debris not included in the regular trash collection, residents can order a Special Pickup. Place discards at the curbside, then call the Special Pickup recording *promptly* at 703-255-5727 and be prepared to leave the following information: your name, address, daytime phone number, amount of debris, and type of debris.

Each residence is entitled to receive two free Special Pickups per year, with a limit of one dump truck load per pickup (about the size of a Volkswagon "beetle"). Additional pickups cost \$75 per load for all items except brush. The fee for additional loads of brush is \$25 each.

Trash in Curbside Recycling Jeopardizes Program

The Town's curbside recycling program reduces disposal fees and saves tax dollars. Please check your recyclables carefully to make sure that they do not include unacceptable materials. When recyclables are contaminated, they may be rejected by recycling companies.

Each week, Town sanitation crews find many unacceptable materials mixed in with recyclables: mirrors; window and auto glass; light bulbs; ceramics; cooking pots and pans, including microwave trays; plastic containers other than those marked #1 or #2; plastic bags; coat hangers; paint cans; 5-gallon pails; and household items such as toasters. The following mixed materials *only* are acceptable for recycling: aluminum food and beverage cans such as soda and beer cans, pet food cans, soup and coffee cans; clear, brown or green glass bottles and jars; plastic milk, water and soda containers; and narrow-neck pigmented plastic containers marked #1 or #2 such as detergent, shampoo and bleach bottles. Remove caps from all containers.

Local recycling companies can only handle the materials listed above as acceptable. Inclusion of contaminants has caused entire loads of recyclables to be rejected, forcing them to be separated by hand. If you think an item might not be recyclable, leave it out. It is better to place fewer correct materials in a recycling container than a greater quantity of incorrect materials.

Special Pickup Guidelines

- Building materials wood, broken concrete, building brick and block, fences, drywall and paneling will be picked up. Masonry items such as concrete, brick, block, stone, rock, etc. are limited to 300 pounds per pickup (about two wheelbarrow loads). Building materials generated by contractors and/or persons employed by homeowners to renovate, repair and/or perform maintenance on their homes will not be picked up.
- Sod, small stumps, brush, trees and limbs of a diameter greater than 1½" and less than 6" and no more than 8' in length will be picked up. The Special Pickup crews do not collect any tree parts over 6" in diameter. Most logs are greater than 6" and, therefore, they are not acceptable. Logs, stumps and other large tree parts can be disposed of at the Fairfax County Transfer Station on West Ox Road or at the County Landfill in Lorton. Leaves are not picked up by Special Pickup crews.
 - Discarded furniture, swing sets and playground equipment will be picked up.
- Up to 300 pounds of scrap metal and small automobile parts such as engine blocks, transmissions and tires will be picked up. Tires must be removed from the rim. Whole automobile bodies will not be picked up.
- Two major appliances per residence will be picked up. These include stoves, refrigerators, dishwashers, washers, dryers, hot water heaters, air conditioners and furnaces
- Old heating oil tanks, gas tanks, and pressurized tanks such as propane, air or freon will not be picked up. Fuel tanks, paint cans, insecticides, fluorescent light tubes, and other hazardous wastes will not be picked up. For information about hazardous waste disposal, call 703-324-5068.
- Please separate brush, appliances, building materials, etc. from each other. This makes it easier for pickup crews to salvage recyclable items, reducing the amount of debris taken to the landfill.
- For the safety of Special Pickup crews, please separate large pieces of glass from other discards.
- Residents of corner lots are requested to place discards in front of the property, not on the side.
- Please keep Special Pickup items away from regular trash and recyclables, fire hydrants, water meters, gas valves, fences, utility poles, trees and shrubs, vehicles, etc. Place discards in an open area accessible to a crane truck.

Nottoway Park to W&OD Connector Bike Route Back on Council Agenda

At its September 9 meeting, the Town Council will consider a proposal to designate an on-road bicycle route through the Town of Vienna to connect Nottoway Park with the W&OD Trail. The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall, and all interested citizens will be given the opportunity to speak on the proposal.

The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority has proposed a signed bike route through Vienna to provide the missing link between the City of Fairfax Gateway Park near Fairfax Circle and the W&OD Trail. After much discussion and review of several route options, the Vienna Police, Parks and Recreation and Public Works Departments continue to recommend the route presented at the June 4, 2001, Council meeting.

That route would direct bikers exiting Nottoway Park onto Tapawingo Road, across Nutley Street, left onto Meadow Lane, left onto Plum Street, and right onto Battle Street. Bikers would remain on Battle until it deadends at the gravel pathway that connects to Mill Street near the Vienna Community Center, at which point they could access the trail at its intersection with Park Street.

This route is not only suitable for commuters to the Metro Station, but also recreation/family oriented to provide access to Meadow Lane Park, the Community Center, Vienna Elementary School, Patrick Henry Library, and the central business district.

If approved by Council, the Town will work with the Regional Park Authority to place bike route directional signs and warning signs to motorists at intersection crossings along the route. There are no plans to establish bike lanes or otherwise restrict vehicular traffic or residential parking along the proposed route.

Ordinance Discriminates Against Singles

A Kingsley Road resident writes: "Concerning the information in the August Newsletter about limits on rentals — while I appreciate the Town's efforts to avoid having housing that is overcrowded, it seems to me that the rules discriminate against the single homeowner who wishes to rent rooms. It is unfair and illogical to say that a single person constitutes a family and can therefore have only two renters for a total of three, whereas a group of renters can have a total of four, or more if they are all 'cousins'.

"It is reasonable to assume that a resident homeowner will keep the property in better condition and will be more selective in renting to people who will be good neighbors than an absentee landlord who is primarily concerned about making a few dollars.

"I am aware that the Zoning Department enforces these limitations on the single landlord, and I would suggest that the ordinance be revised to define a family as *two* or more persons and to state that a single homeowner can rent to three people."

Comment from an Upham Place resident: "There has been a long debate titled Cats Versus Dogs. I think it's time to move on to a new subject. How about mosquitos? We have lived in Vienna for six years and each year we have had an increasing problem with mosquitos. They have gotten so bad that we do not even use our yard in the summertime, which is not terribly convenient given that we have four active children. On our three to four-step walk from the house to the car in the carport, we are all likely to get at least one bite. With the West Nile virus here to stay, I think it's time to encourage our Town and County to spray to control mosquitos. Simply eliminating the breeding places is not working in our backyard. Spraying bug spray all over the children every day cannot be that great for their health. I'd rather see controlled spraying that actually kills the mosquitos and can stop this epidemic."

From a Lawyers Road resident: "Leashing cats is cruel and unnatural. Let's turn our attention to unleashing dogs! Some of our local canines are chained up, 24 hours a day, year after year and deserve a better life. How about requiring owners to untether their dogs at least once a week for exercise, ball throwing or a little TLC?"

Residents are reminded that the quadrant designation is a very important part of your Vienna address. Not only does it show that you live within the town's corporate limits, it helps prevent lost deliveries and other mistakes for residents of streets that extend into two different quadrants such as Glyndon Street, John Marshall Drive and Tapawingo Road.


Vienna Volunteer Fire Department Deserves Our Support

It is good to have the opportunity to share my thoughts and concerns with you, the citizens of Vienna, in this column. Most of the time this column is reserved for the Council members to update you on various town events and issues. This is a great way to keep you informed of the different Council members' views and of the general business of the Town government. However, in this article I am going to go in a different direction and share with you a concern that I have for the safety of our community.

Since my last article our country and community have had to deal with the effects of the terrorist attacks at the Pentagon on September 11, 2001, and as the one-year anniversary approaches, I think it is important to mention that members of the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department, along with other volunteer fire companies from across the region, assisted the Ar-

lington County Fire and Rescue personnel in their efforts at the Pentagon. It is about this brave group of volunteers that I am writing today. The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department is facing a serious problem and they need the help and support of the entire Vienna community. The Vienna firehouse is in great need of renovation to meet the needs not only of the volunteer firefighters but the career firefighters as well. The cost of the complete renovation is somewhere between two and three million dollars. Vienna's facility is scheduled to receive 1.25 million dollars from the Public Safety Bond referendum, which we as Fairfax County residents will vote on this November. This money will go a long way to helping with the renovation but it still leaves them far short of the needed funds for completion. It should be noted that "volunteer" fire companies receive an annual funding from Fairfax County to

support their daily operations; however, the amount does not come close to funding all of the operations and the rest of the money comes through the fund-raising efforts of the volunteers and auxiliaries themselves.

How can you help? Well, the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department has an annual fund drive, so if you have donated before then please continue and if you have not, then please consider donating this year. Also, I would ask that every civic and community service organization in Vienna consider holding one fund-raising event over the course of the next year for the specific benefit of the Fire Department. It is only through these combined efforts that we can ensure the safety of our community. I have attended the fire company's annual awards ceremony for the past six years and I have been witness to the countless hours that these volunteers put in to protect and serve. These brave men and women donate their time and talents to protect our lives, our property and, most important, our town. They need and deserve our generous support. Thank you for supporting this effort and have a happy and safe September.

Donations Sustain VVFD Programs

The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department, located at 400 Center St., S., is a non-profit 501-3.c organization funded by citizen donations and departmental fund-raising activities. All donations are tax deductible. In 2002 the department will spend over \$400,000 to purchase a new fire engine and paramedic ambulance. It has also spent over \$200,000 renovating the front facade of the fire station to enlarge the apparatus bay doors.

The department is working towards renovating the rest of the fire station and is in need of donations to assist with this effort. This renovation will bring the station up to current codes, add a sprinkler system and improve living areas for the fire fighters. The current cost estimate for this project is \$2.2 million.

Bingo has always been one of the Fire Department's main fund raisers and is held every Sunday. Doors open at 4 p.m., sales begin at 5 p.m., and games start at 7 p.m. The minimum admission price is \$10 for 23 regular games, including a \$1,000 jackpot. Refreshments prepared by the VVFD Auxiliary may be purchased during the evening. All proceeds go to building maintenance and renovations as well as purchasing new fire and rescue vehicles. Those who do not play bingo may contribute to the department by sending checks to P.O. Box 1115, Vienna, VA 22183.

Traffic Calming Guidelines Available

Do you wish there was something you could do to make your street safer from speeders and cut-through traffic? The Town's Transportation Safety Commission (TSC) has prepared "Guidelines to Traffic Calming in Vienna," available from the Public Information Office at Town Hall, 703-255-6330, and at the Town's web site, www.ci. venna.va.us. This guide outlines the criteria for requesting traffic calming measures on eligible streets. Basically, the procedure is as follows:

First, circulate a petition requesting the form of traffic calming desired, i.e., speed hump, speed dip, stop sign, etc. This petition must be signed by 75% of the households on the street involved, and all affected residences must be contacted.

Second, present the completed petition to the TSC at its regular meeting the last Tuesday of the month, or submit it to the Public Information Office for the Commission's next agenda.

Third, the TSC will review the petition, request necessary data from the Police Department, evaluate all criteria, and make a recommendation.

Fourth, the recommendation will be forwarded to the Town Manager for his review and then placed on a Town Council agenda for final action.

Seniors Eligible for Taxicab Discounts

Seniors-on-the-Go! offers subsidized taxicab rides to Fairfax County senior citizens age 65 and older with an annual gross income of \$50,000 for singles and \$60,000 for married couples.

Seniors who qualify for the program may purchase up to 16 booklets of taxicab rides within a year of their entry into the program. Each booklet has a value of \$30 but costs the senior only \$10. Over the course of a year, the total value of the coupon booklets is \$480; the actual cost to the senior for the year is \$160. Once enrolled in the program, seniors make their trip arrangements directly with any of three Fairfax County taxicab vendors. There are no restrictions on where participants may travel.

West Nile Virus Focus Shifts To Mosquito Control

The Fairfax County Health Department has suspended its collection of dead birds and is now focusing its attention on mosquito monitoring and control. A sufficient number of dead birds have been collected and tested to confirm the presence of West Nile virus in the county bird population, and thousands of storm sewer catch basins have been treated with a naturally occurring bacteria that is harmless to other insects and the environment. Personnel doing the treatments also are on the lookout for other sources of standing water and treat them when mosquito larvae are found.

Although the Health Department is no longer collecting dead birds, it is still interested in studying the effects of West Nile virus on the bird population and encourages citizens to call to report dead birds. Citizens who find a bird that appears to have died of natural causes on property that has a definite address can call the Health Department at 703-246-2300.

West Nile virus is spread to birds, humans, horses and other mammals through the bite of an infected mosquito. The risk of becoming ill from West Nile virus is extremely low and the majority of people bitten by an infected mosquito do not get sick. People who do get sick usually suffer a mild flu-like illness. People over age 50 are at greatest risk of serious illness, such as encephalitis or meningitis.

People should protect themselves from mosquito bites by making sure window and door screens are in good repair; wearing long, loose and light-colored clothing outdoors; and using insect repellent in accordance with the product instructions.

To reduce further chances of being bitten, residents should eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites in their yards. Mosquitoes can breed in as little as one teaspoonful of water and many species are poor flyers so they stay close to where they breed. Eliminate standing water by tipping containers and tossing water that has gathered in items like tires, tarps and other containers. Residents are also encouraged to change the water in birdbaths and wading pools once a week and clean roof gutters and downspout screens regularly.

The original Vienna Library, built in 1897 and now located on the Freeman House grounds, still contains hundreds of its original books and its first card catalog. It is open to visitors the first Sunday of each month.




