OCTOBER 1992 – The Town Council has adopted an ordinance requiring dog owners to clean up after their pets. First-time offenders of the new "pooper scooper" law will be given a warning; subsequent violations may result in a fine of up to \$250.

OCTOBER 1982 – The original Vienna library, built in 1897 and now located on the grounds of the Freeman House, will be formally reopened October 3. The one-room library was originally located on Library Lane, a now-abandoned street in southwest Vienna, and was moved to the corner of Maple Avenue and Center Street around 1913. It was relocated, with its original stock of books, to the Freeman House on Church Street prior to the construction of Patrick Henry Library in 1971.

OCTOBER 1972 – A recycling questionnaire in last month's newsletter elicited more replies than any other questionnaire we have distributed. The vast majority were enthusiastically in favor of all kinds of recycling. At present, the Town is working out the logistics of the program, and we will report as soon as it can proceed.

To make sure that adequate blood donor center personnel and supplies (and refreshments!) are on hand, and to reduce waiting time, citizens are requested to call Inova at 703-698-3885 to schedule a donation time.

Remember, only disposable, singleuse, sterile supplies are used to collect blood. You cannot get AIDS, West Nile virus or any other disease by giving blood.

The general requirements for blood donor eligibility are minimum age of 17 (no upper age limit), good general health with no minor illness symptoms for three days, and minimum weight of 110 pounds. Leaf Pickup Begins This Month

Fall leaf collection will begin on October 30 in north Vienna and November 4 on the south side of town. The complete schedule is given below.

ALL LEAVES MUST BE AT THE CURBSIDE PRIOR TO THE FIRST SCHEDULED COLLECTION DAY FOR EACH PASS THROUGH YOUR AREA. ONCE YOUR STREET HAS BEEN COVERED, CREWS WILL NOT DOUBLE BACK.

Department of Public Works crews using leaf vacuum machines will collect leaves that residents have raked to the curbside. If you miss your vacuum collection dates, the Public Works Department will still collect your leaves; however, the leaves must be bagged and placed at the curbside for pickup with your regular trash. Up to 20 bags of leaves will be picked up on any single refuse collection day throughout the year.

Please rake leaves just to the curbside, not into the street. Cars parked on leaf piles may catch on fire, and children playing in the leaves may be struck by a passing vehicle. Also, leaves may prevent rain water from reaching storm water inlets. Residents may wish to move vehicles off the street to avoid dust from the leaf vacuums when the weather is dry; the Town cannot be responsible for washing cars.

JULY 1, 2002

- Conducted a closed executive session to interview candidates for appointment to Town boards and commissions, and to discuss appointment of Council members to various local committees for the new fiscal year.
- Reappointed Laine Hyde to the Board of Architectural Review for a twoyear term, and recommended Gregory Haight to the Fairfax County Circuit Court for appointment to the Town's Board of Zoning Appeals to fill the unexpired term of Joanne Bitner.
- Rejected the bid received for concrete repair and installation, and directed that the item be re-bid.
- Approved an extension of the contract with AAA/Rainbow Recycling and Trash Removal Service for trash collection at Park Terrace, Vienna Villager and Church Street Condominiums at an estimated annual cost of \$15,023,64.

- Approved a contract with Double H Locates of Marshall, VA, for underground utility marking at an estimated annual cost of \$59,150.
- Directed that a purchase price not to exceed \$15,000 be negotiated with Thomas Brady and Associates for up to 55 holiday wreath decorations, pending Council approval of a final design.
- Approved a contract with Quality Communications to provide a data cabling network infrastructure for Town Hall in an amount not to exceed \$23,974.30.
- Approved the Newspaper Vending Machines Voluntary Agreement.
- Adopted a resolution in recognition of the 100th anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Clifton.
- Made the following appointments for fiscal year 2002-03: Councilman Boudreau, Mayor Pro Tempore and representative to the Northern Virginia Re-

Drought Watch Continues in Fairfax

Fairfax County residents are encouraged to continue to practice wise water use, although the county is not included in the restrictions issued by Governor Mark Warner for other parts of the state.

High summer temperatures and lack of adequate rainfall have caused dry conditions in this region, and Fairfax County remains under the drought "watch" issued last February by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments. The watch level is the first notification stage of the region's water supply and drought plan, triggered by at least moderate drought conditions in the Potomac River basin.

Even though water supplies in the Potomac River system are expected to remain adequate to meet normal water demands, regional officials are reminding citizens of the importance of practicing wise water use year-round in and around the house.

Good water conservation habits include repairing leaking toilets and faucets, installing low-flush toilets and low-flow shower heads, teaching children to turn off the water while they brush their teeth, and running dishwashers and clothes washers only with full loads.

Fall Planting Tips for Gardeners

From your Community Enhancement Commission – As we enter that wonderful time of year known as Autumn, we would like to offer a few tips for fall planting:

- Be sure to clean up from around your perennial flowers, such as rose and peony. If left on the ground, leaves and stems can harbor diseases and provide convenient places for pests to spend the winter.
- Add mulch to your perennial border. A 1-inch layer of weed-free straw or chopped leaves will help conserve soil moisture, protect the root system, and reduce plant loss by soil heaving during the winter.
- As you clean out the flowerbeds, mark the spots where late starting perennials will come up next spring to avoid damaging them while working in the beds.
- Now is the time to start thinking about planting those bulbs for spring blooms. Tulips and Dutch iris need to be planted in cold soil so they do not send up shoots before roots are established. If tulips are planted deeply, they will produce large, uniform flowers for many years. Deep planting also makes the bulbs less susceptible to mouse and squirrel damage.

Just a reminder, it may not yet be cold enough to kill off the mosquito population. Please make sure that you rid your lawns and those areas surrounding your home of standing water. Let's not give those mosquitoes a chance to increase their population.

Residents Must Control Weeds And Debris

To protect health and safety and to maintain an attractive community, the Town Code requires that residents keep their property free of refuse. Residents are also required to cut grass, weeds and other growth so that it does not exceed 6 inches in height within 100 feet of any street or property line. Tree branches, shrubs, vines and hedges must be kept trimmed so that they do not overhang sidewalks or obstruct the view of motorists.

outlets at the top of streetlight poles in the Phase I portion of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project at a monthly charge of \$193.14 plus 6.125¢ per kilowatt used.

- Approved a change order to the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project in the amount of \$3,448 to relocate a manhole to miss an existing utility duct bank

Town Residents Pay County Personal Property Tax, But Don't Need County Decal

Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals are renewed every year on April 15. Fairfax County personal property tax is due every year on October 5, and Fairfax County motor vehicle decals are also renewed at that time. If you live within the town limits you only need a Vienna decal, NOT a Fairfax County decal. So, if you have a valid 2002 Vienna decal, it is good until April 15, 2003.

If you have recently moved to Vienna and need to register your vehicles, or if you have new vehicles to register, please note that Vienna vehicle decals are reduced to half price on October 1 each year, and further reduced to one-third price on January 15. The charges are:

The balance was paid for from Fairfax County and Virginia State Fire Program funds.

Change Smoke Detector Batteries

Battery-powered smoke detectors need to have the batteries replaced annually or when the battery alarm activates. Start a life-saving habit by replacing your battery in the fall when you change your clock. On October 27, when you change your clocks back from Daylight Savings Time, also change your smoke detector batteries.

Over the years, smoke detectors have become a standard feature in nearly every home. Like other household appliances, they are often taken for granted. Little attention is paid to smoke detectors until tragedy strikes. But tragedy can be averted and lives saved with the help of properly installed and maintained smoke detectors.

Fairfax County law mandates that all dwellings must have smoke detectors installed outside the sleeping areas and in basements. However, it is recommended that residents install smoke detectors on all levels of the home.

Having a smoke detector in the house is not enough. Proper placement and maintenance are also important. Clean and test detectors monthly according to the manufacturer's instructions. And don't forget to change those batteries!

Asset Cap Raised For Tax Relief

The Town Council has approved an increase to the asset cap for tax relief for elderly and disabled residents. For 2002 the asset cap has been increased from \$150,000 to \$160,000. Council also extended the 2002 filing deadline from April 1 to December 31 for all tax relief applicants.

Both the Town and Fairfax County provide real estate tax relief to citizens who are 65 years old or older, and to citizens who are permanently and totally disabled.

Income qualifications must also be met: For a total household income of \$40,000 or less, 100% tax relief is provided; for income of \$40,001 to \$46,000, 50% relief; and for income of \$46,001 to \$52,000, 25% relief.


