JULY 1993 – In rsponse to a request from the Town, the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has installed a "No Turn on Red When Pedestrians Are Present" sign on southbound Nutley Street at Virginia Center Boulevard to improve pedestrian safety near the Vienna Metro Station. VDOT also studied the timing of the pedestrian signal at that intersection and concluded that sufficient crossing time exists.

JULY 1983 – A Gamefield Fitness Course, featuring 15 exercise stations, is now open behind the Community Center along the W&OD Trail. The facility is designed for use by senior citizens, but persons of all ages and levels of fitness can benefit from the exercises. Each station has a descriptive sign to guide participants through the exercise.

JULY 1973 – Among the special events scheduled for this year's July 4th celebration at the Community Center are entertainment by Paul Puckett and The Country Folk with special guest star Charlie Waddell, the singing State Senator, and the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department will conduct a flying watermelon contest with a fire hose.

Peddlers, Solicitors **Must Have Permit**

A solicitor is defined as anyone who goes from door to door taking orders for merchandise such as magazines, or services such as home improvements, to be delivered at some future date, or requesting donations for a charitable purpose. Solicitors are required to obtain a license from the Town and to show it on request. They are also required to wear a badge containing the words "Licensed Solicitor."

A peddler is defined as anyone who carries goods such as candy or firewood from door to door for sale and immediate delivery. Peddlers are required to pay a license tax to the Town and must display the license on their vehicles.

The Town Manager may grant exemptions from licensing requirements to nonprofit groups such as schools, churches and service organizations. If an exemption has been granted, it will be on file at Town Hall.

Residents who suspect that a solicitor or peddler is operating under fraudulent pretenses or that he may be "casing" the neighborhood for burglary targets should call the Police Department's non-emergency number, 703-255-6366.

Vienna Names in the News



Play It Safe This July 4th

The Fourth of July just would not be the same without those breathtaking fireworks. However, those beautiful fireworks can turn your holiday into a tragedy within seconds. Many people are injured each year due to fireworks accidents. Some are injured seriously and left with permanent damage.

Any firework that explodes, emits a flame or sparks higher than 12 feet, or performs as a projectile is prohibited by the Fire Prevention Code. A permit is required for the sale of all fireworks, and these permits are only valid from June 1 to July 15 of each year.

Many fireworks are not available in Northern Virginia because they are illegal. Firecrackers, cherry bombs and skyrockets are just a few examples of fireworks that may be purchased in other areas, but are illegal here. Since even the possession of unapproved fireworks is prohibited, such fireworks will be confiscated and the person possessing them can be charged with a Class 1 misdemeanor. This carries a maximum penalty of a \$2,500 fine and/or one year in jail.

Please adhere to the following safety tips:

- * When displaying legally purchased, approved fireworks, place them on a flat surface, clear of any combustible material and clear of all buildings.
- ★ Keep all bystanders at least 25 feet away from fireworks.
- ★ Read the directions.
- ★ Do not permit young children to handle or light fireworks.
- * Light only one firework at a time.
- * Never throw fireworks.
- ★ Sparklers can be very dangerous and account for the majority of injuries. Pieces can break off and burn bystanders.
- ★ Young children should not use sparklers as these can attain a temperature as high as 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit.
- * Store fireworks in a cool, dry place.

Please have a safe Fourth of July and stay away from dangerous and illegal fireworks. Remember that the public displays in Vienna and elsewhere offer a safe way to view fireworks. JULY 4TH PET PRECAUTIONS

The sound of fireworks exploding can be terrifying to even the most placid pet. To ensure that pets have a safe and peaceful Independence Day, your Fairfax County Animal Shelter recommends leaving pets inside, with all windows and curtains closed and the air conditioner on at a normal level. This will muffle the frightening sounds outside. Pets not ordinarily allowed inside the house should be sheltered in the basement or garage, with plenty of fresh water. If a pet is particularly nervous, speak to a veterinarian about tranquilizing the animal during the holiday. Make sure all pets wear identification tags just in case they become lost. FY 03-04 Street Paving Schedule

The Town Council has approved the following streets for milling and resurfacing during fiscal 2003-2004:

Glyndon Street, N.E. – from Jean Place to the northern town line Ross Drive, S.W. – from Cottage Street to George Street Park Street, S.E. – from Moore Avenue the the southerly town line Niblick Drive, S.E. – from Echols Street to Wolftrap Road Witness Court, N.W. – from Counsellor Drive to the end Sharon Lane, N.W. – from Lawyers Road to the end Sioux Court, S.E. – from Tapawingo Road to the end Talahi Road, S.E. – from Glyndon Street to Park Street Nutley Street, N.W. – from Malcolm Road to Windover Avenue Johnson Street, S.W. – from Glen Avenue to the end Colin Lane, N.W. – from Lawyers Road to the end

Work should begin in late summer or early fall. The contractor will mill streets for approximately two weeks, paving approximately four or five days after the milling operation on each street is completed. Inclement weather could cause delays in the schedule. Streets will be posted prior to the milling and paving operations. Annual Financial Report Wins Award

Yard Sale Reminder

Each household in town may hold two yard sales per year. No permit is required. Two advertising signs, no larger than four square feet each, may be displayed on the property where the sale takes place, and four directional signs, no larger than two square feet each, may be placed on other private property with the owner's permission. Signs may not be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the sale. Signs are not permitted on public property, in the public right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement), or on utility poles. Illegally placed signs will be removed. MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER

This is the Town of Vienna's fifth annual report to inform you about your drinking water quality. As a part of the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1996, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is requiring all water utilities across the nation to mail their customers a Water Quality Report by July 1, 2003. Our goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water, and we want you to understand the efforts we make to protect your water supply.

The quality of your drinking water must meet state and federal requirements administered by the Virginia Department of Health. We constantly monitor for various contaminants in the water supply to meet all regulatory requirements. The tables in this report list only those contaminants that had some level of detection. Many other contaminants have been analyzed but were either not present or were below the detection limits of the laboratory equipment. Much of our water quality data are from testing done in 2002. However, the Commonwealth allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once a year because the concentration of these contaminants does not change frequently. Even though some of our data may be more than one year old, it is accurate.

Is your water safe to drink? Absolutely! The Town of Vienna water system did not have any violations during the year. We're proud to share our water quality test results with you. Also, a "source water assessment" of our system has been conducted by the Virginia Department of Health. Wells #1 & #9 were determined to be of high susceptibility to contamination using the criteria developed by the state in its approved Source Water Assessment Program. This report consists of maps showing the assessment area, land use activities, and records of any contamination within the last five years. OPPORTUNITIES FOR PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

Decisions concerning Vienna's water are made by the Town Council. Regular meetings are normally held the first and third Mondays of the month (except July and August) at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

GENERAL INFORMATION

As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Substances (referred to as contaminants) in source water may come from septic systems, discharges from domestic or industrial wastewater treatment facilities, agricultural and farming activities, urban storm water runoff, residential uses, and many other types of activities. Water from surface sources is treated to make it drinkable while groundwater may or may not have any treatment.

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. Environmental Protection Agency/Center for Disease Control guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline.

WATER SOURCES

The Town of Vienna is supplied with surface water by the Washington Aqueduct Delcarlia and McMillan Plants from the Potomac River through the City of Falls Church; and by the Fairfax County Water Authority James J. Corbalis, Jr., Plant from the Potomac River and Occoquan and Lorton Plants from the Occoquan Reservoir; and with groundwater from two wells in the Town of Vienna. These sources are blended in the Town's delivery system.

HOW DO I READ THIS CHART?

Our water is tested to assure that it is safe and healthy. Contaminants in the drinking water are routinely monitored according to Federal and State regulations. The table beginning on the next page shows the most recent results of our monitoring. Typical sources of contamination show where this substance usually originates. The following definitions are provided to help you better understand terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with:

- New for this year is Total Organic Carbon Removal. Total Organic Carbon has no health effects; however, it provides a medium for the formation of disinfection byproducts. Compliance with the treatment technique reduces these byproducts. In this case the level is a "removal ratio" that must be greater than 1.0.
- Non-detects (ND) laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present.
- Parts per million (ppm) one part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.
- Parts per billion (ppb) one part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years or a single penny in \$10,000,000.
- Parts per trillion (ppt) one part per trillion corresponds to one minute in 2,000,000 years or a single penny in \$10,000,000,000.
- Picocuries per liter (pCi/L) picocuries per liter is a measure of the radioactivity in water.
- Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) nephelometric turbidity unit is a measure of the clarity, or cloudiness, of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person. Turbidity is monitored because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of the filtration system.
- Action Level (AL) the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
- Treatment Technique (TT) a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCL's are set at very stringent levels by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. In developing the standards EPA assumes that the average adult drinks two liters of water each day throughout a 70-year life span. EPA generally sets MCL's at levels that will result in no adverse health effects for some contaminants or a one-in-ten-thousand to one-in-one million chance of having the described health effect for other contaminants.
- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known
 or expected risk to health. MCLG's allow for a margin of safety. MCL's are set as close to the MCLG's as feasible using the
 best available treatment technology.
