With warm weather on the wav. Vienna residents are thinking about filling their pools. The Town has received requests regarding water and sewer cost adjustments for this project.

Swimming pools must be filled by using the garden hose. It is not possible to use fire hydrants or to make arrangements with the fire department.

When you have filled your pool, notify the Finance Denartment at Town Hall. The amount of water going into the pool will be obtained by taking the difference in the consumntion for the billing period in which the nool was filled and the prior period. You will be billed for the entire amount of water, but not for a sewer service fee on the water used for filling the pool.

READING EFFICIENCY COURSE

The Community Center is snonsoring a reading efficiency course for adults which will include young people in the 10th grade or above. The course is designed to increase comprehension and reading rate and to make one a more flexible reader. One hour a day home practice will be required.

Techniques taught will be skimming, scanning, speed reading, study and critical reading.
