## **Leaf Pickup Begins This Month**

Fall leaf collection will begin on October 20 in south Vienna and October 27 on the north side of town. The complete schedule is given below.

ALL LEAVES MUST BE AT THE CURBSIDE PRIOR TO THE FIRST SCHEDULED COLLECTION DAY FOR EACH PASS THROUGH YOUR AREA. ONCE YOUR STREET HAS BEEN COVERED, CREWS WILL NOT DOUBLE BACK.

Department of Public Works crews using leaf vacuum machines will collect leaves that residents have raked to the curbside. If you miss your vacuum collection dates, the Public Works Department will still collect your leaves; however, the leaves must be bagged and placed at the curbside for pickup with your regular trash. Up to 20 bags of leaves will be picked up on any single refuse collection day throughout the year.

Please rake leaves just to the curbside, not into the street. Cars parked on leaf piles may catch on fire, and children playing in the leaves may be struck by a passing vehicle. Also, leaves may prevent rain water from reaching storm water inlets. Residents may wish to move vehicles off the street to avoid dust from the leaf vacuums when the weather is dry; the Town cannot be responsible for washing cars.

# Rapid Notification System New Tool in Serving Public Safety

As we begin the month of October this year, we are bracketed by two terrible anniversaries of events that shook our nation's and our community's sense of safety. This September 11 marked two years since the terrorist attacks on the Pentagon and World Trade Center. Vienna's American Legion Post 180 held a moving commemoration ceremony on the Freeman House lawn, as it did last year. October brings the reminder that one year ago our community was living under the shadow of the sniper shootings. Concerns for public safety caused the Vienna Halloween Parade to be canceled for the first - and we hope only — time in its history. Plans for this year's parade are on track and we look forward to a great event from the Vienna-Tysons Regional Chamber of Commerce and its partners and volunteers.

In its role as a guardian of public safety, the Town must also look forward and prepare to respond to the next challenge, whatever it may be. As part of that effort, in August the Council approved purchase of a "high-speed notification system" to enhance the Town's public safety services. This computer-based system can rapidly call residents to alert them to public safety emergencies. Funding for the purchase and installation of the system comes from a federal grant to help local governments with emergency preparedness.

Vienna Police Chief Col. Robert Carlisle brought the grant opportunity and emergency notification project to the Council last year. "After 9/11, I had several citizens call and ask how they would be notified of emergency information," Chief Carlisle says. "They wanted to know if there was a system in place to provide emergency alerts to them in a timely fashion. I realized that, in light of the world we live in today, we had a gap that technology could fill. The Council requested that we explore this technology."

The new system won't replace television or radio for area-wide emergency notices. For news about a tornado warning,

for example, residents should rely on Emergency Alert System announcements on radio and TV, or on the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) broadcast service (available on specialized radio receivers). But for emergency information specific to the Town, or even a particular neighborhood, the new notification system can reach our residents quickly and directly.

Chief Carlisle cites several "less catastrophic" situations where the system will also serve public safety. If a neighborhood is experiencing a pattern of burglaries, or if scam operators are reported in Town, the Police Department can use it to disseminate information and warnings. In the past, a hazardous material spill sent the police door-to-door passing out information in the affected neighborhood. The new system would transmit that information directly by telephone. Other jurisdictions have used the technology to notify residents about missing children and Alzheimer patients. The Town will also be able to use the system to call in off-duty employees as necessary in emergency situations.

Residents do not have to sign up to be on the "call list" for the high-speed notification system. There will be a means to opt out if you do not want to be called.

Businesses will have the option of signing up to receive fax notices, which would give them printed wanted posters, lookout notices and scam alerts.

Chief Carlisle anticipates the system will be operational by the end of this year, following a period of training and testing.

We all hope and pray that this system will never need to be used for a catastrophic emergency. But the essence of preparedness is to be ready, just in case. For the sake of residents' safety, I think this is a worthy investment for the Town.

## At-risk Residents Eligible for Special Notification During Emergencies

The Vienna Police Department and the Vienna Volunteer Fire Department sponsor an "inclement weather program" for the elderly, disabled and those with severe medical conditions. In the event of inclement weather, widespread power outages, or hazardous road conditions, a "check on the welfare" telephone call list is activated and, if needed, a temporary emergency shelter will be opened.

The Vienna Police Department also maintains an emergency notification registry to facilitate prompt and proper contact with next-of-kin or other designated person in the event of an emergency.

Registration forms for both of these programs are available at police headquarters and can also be downloaded from the Town's Web site, www.ci.vienna.va.us. For more information or to receive a registration form by mail, call the Police Department at 703-255-6366.

These services are provided free-of-charge and are strictly voluntary. The information provided by residents will be used only in emergency situations.

## Town Residents Pay County Personal Property Tax, But Don't Need Decal

Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals are renewed every year on April 15. Fairfax County personal property tax is due every year on October 5, and Fairfax County motor vehicle decals are also renewed at that time. If you live within the town limits you only need a Vienna decal, NOT a Fairfax County decal. So, if you have a valid 2003 Vienna decal, it is good until April 15, 2004.

This year, most Fairfax County residents received their decals in the mail along with their bills. Through a clerical error, some Vienna residents may also have received County decals; these may be discarded.

If you have recently moved to Vienna and need to register your vehicles, or if you have new vehicles to register, please note that Vienna vehicle decals are reduced to half price on October 1 each year, and further reduced to one-third price on January 15. The charges are:

## Voter Registration Deadline Oct. 6

Monday, October 6, is the last day to register to vote in the November 4 general election. Registration applications are available at various locations around the county, including the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall, and may also be downloaded from the County Web site, www.co.fairfax.va.us/eb.

To be eligible to vote, you must be a U.S. citizen, a Virginia resident, and at least 18 years old on or before election day. If you are already a registered voter, no additional registration is required for this election; however, you should check your voter registration card to be sure it lists your current address and update it if necessary.

## **Halloween Safety Tips For Kids**

Anytime a child has an accident, it's tragic. But the last thing that you want to happen is for a child to be hurt on a holiday because it would forever mar that day in the minds of the child and his family

There are many ways to keep your children safe at Halloween, when they are more prone to accidents and injuries. The excitement of children and adults at this time of year sometimes makes them forget to be careful. Simple common sense can do a lot to stop any tragedies from happening.

- ► Help your child pick out or make a costume that will be safe. Make it fire proof, with eye holes large enough for good peripheral vision.
- ► If you set jack-o-lanterns on your porch with candles in them, make sure that they are far enough out of the way so that kids' costumes won't accidentally be set on fire.
- ▶ Make sure that if your child is carrying a prop, such as a broom, wand or sword, that the tip is smooth and flexible enough not to cause injury if the child falls.
- ▶ Kids always want to help with the pumpkin carving. Small children shouldn't be allowed to use a sharp knife to cut the top or the face. There are many kits available that come with tiny saws that work better than knives and are safer, although you can be cut by them as well. It's best to let the kids clean out the pumpkin and draw a face on it, which you can carve for them.
- Treating your kids to a spooky Halloween dinner will make them less likely to eat the candy they collect before you have a chance to check it for them.
- Teaching your kids basic everyday safety, such as not getting into cars or talking to strangers and looking both ways before crossing streets, will help make them safer when they are out Trick-or-Treating.

## Political Signs Require a Permit

With election season in full swing, it is appropriate to consider the Town's zoning regulations pertaining to political signs:

The Town Code requires all candidates for political office to obtain a permit to erect signs from the Department of Planning and Zoning. The cost is \$15 for the temporary sign permit and \$25 for a sign bond that is refundable once the election is over and all signs have been removed. The permit entitles the candidate to post not more than five signs not exceeding a total area of 20 square feet. Any such sign must be posted on private property and may be erected in that time period between 30 days prior to election day and five days after the election.

Property owners may erect signs for the candidates of their choice on their own property. Based on a ruling by the Town Attorney, citizens are not subject to the permit or time length requirements in the placement of signs on property that they own.

It is unlawful to place signs on street lights, utility poles, markers or other signs, or to place a sign within ten feet of the curb or edge of pavement.

### Dog Owners Required To Clean Up After Pets

The Town of Vienna has a "pooper scooper" ordinance that requires dog owners to clean up after their pets when out for a walk. Please be a responsible pet owner and don't allow your dog to foul the lawns of neighbors. Tip: The plastic sleeves used on newspapers make excellent pooper scoopers!

Also, signs are posted in several Town parks to remind pet owners that dogs are not allowed on athletic fields, tennis and basketball courts, playgrounds, and picnic areas because of the nuisance and potential health hazard to park users. The Town Animal Warden is authorized to fine pet owners found in violation of these laws.

Dog owners are reminded that it is against the law to let dogs run at large on public or private property.

## This Month in History

from the Vienna Newsletter archives

OCTOBER 1993 – Town Hall received a visit from two dozen local officials from Saitama Prefecture, located just north of metropolitan Tokyo, Japan. The delegation spent time with Vienna Town Council members and Town staff learning about financial and land use planning, and other aspects of local government in the U.S. They said Vienna had been recommended to tham as an example of efficient and productive management.

OCTOBER 1983 – The Town Council will hold a public hearing on the proposed design of the I-66/Nutley Street interchange on October 24. The Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation held a hearing last month on the proposal to construct a full cloverleaf interchange and to widen Nutley from four to six lanes from the town boundary to Lee Highway in conjunction with the construction of the Vienna Metro Station.

OCTOBER 1973 – The Town Council passed a 90-day tree removal moratorium, effective October 2, in which time the Town staff plans to design a tree ordinance. The moratorium affects all tracts of land in Vienna. The only people exempt from the moratorium are homeowners wanting to remove diseased or dangerous trees. All other tree removal requests must go through Council.

OCTOBER 1963 – We are sure that Vienna citizens are anxiously awaiting the completion of the new Town Hall. The new wing has been completed sufficiently to permit the moving of the business offices; however, for perhaps 90 days the public is going to be inconvenienced by the absence of a front door.

## Change Smoke Detector Batteries

Battery-powered smoke detectors need to have the batteries replaced annually or when the battery alarm activates. Start a life-saving habit by replacing your battery in the fall when you change your clock. On October 26, when you change your clocks back from Daylight Savings Time, also change your smoke detector batteries.

Over the years, smoke detectors have become a standard feature in nearly every home. Like other household appliances, they are often taken for granted. Little attention is paid to smoke detectors until tragedy strikes. But tragedy can be averted and lives saved with the help of properly installed and maintained smoke detectors.

Fairfax County law mandates that all dwellings must have smoke detectors installed outside the sleeping areas and in basements. However, it is recommended that residents install smoke detectors on all levels of the home.

Having a smoke detector in the house is not enough. Proper placement and maintenance are also important. Clean and test detectors monthly according to the manufacturer's instructions. And don't forget to change those batteries!
