NOVEMBER 1993 - Patrick Henry Library is scheduled to reopen on or about November 18, but normal library services, programs and parking will be greatly curtailed while the building undergoes extensive renovations. There will not be a book drop, and children's programs will be held at the Vienna Community Center.

NOVEMBER 1983 - Mayor Charles Robinson has been elected president of the Virginia Municipal League (VML), an organization of local governments and agencies. Real Estate Tax Due Next Month

The second installment on 2003 Town of Vienna real estate tax bills is due on December 5. Mailed payments must be postmarked on or before that date to avoid penalties and interest. Late payments will be assessed a penalty of 10% or \$5, whichever is greater, along with interest at 10%, which accrues until payment is made.

If you pay your real estate taxes directly to the Town rather than through a mortgage company and you do not receive your bill by November 15, please call the Real Estate Office at Town Hall, 703-255-6325, and make arrangements to pay your bill by December 5 to avoid penalty and interest charges.

If your Vienna taxes are paid through your mortgage company and you receive the tax bill, please notify your mortgage company immediately so it can make payment by the due date.

If you have sold the property and are not responsible for the tax bill you receive, please notify the real estate office immediately.

To pay by credit card online, go to www.ci.vienna.va.us and click on "Services." To pay by phone with a credit card, call 1-888-2PAYTAX (1-888-272-9829), and use the Jurisdiction Code 1094 for real estate. Make sure you record the confirmation number given to you at the end of the transaction, as this will serve as your proof of

Tons of Debris Left by Hurricane

During the weeks following Hurricane Isabel, which struck the area on September 18, Town crews worked from 7 a.m. until dark seven days a week to pick up storm debris.

As of mid-October, 536.86 tons of brush had been picked up from 2,144 houses along with other types of storm debris. All materials were hauled to the Fairfax County Transfer Station on West Ox Road.

Comment from the Council Table

Vienna Post Office Traffic Activity

When I returned to Council, several citizens asked me about what could be done to better traffic control at the Post Office on Lawyers Road.

There is a high traffic volume in this area. Traffic counts taken in the 200 block of Lawyers Road in October 2002 showed 13,289 vehicles in both directions during a 24-hour period. A count taken in the 100 block of Church Street, N.W., last February registered 7,788 vehicles in both directions during a 24-hour period.

This intersection is the most complex in town as can be seen in the diagram below provided by the Transportation Safety Commission. This is a multi-activity zone with multiple parking lot entrances and one intersection entrance with a short sight distance. The activity that occurs here is

Post Office vehicle traffic, curbside mail box drop-off, business vehicle traffic (funeral home, retail and fast food) and regular vehicle traffic. Complicating the situation are pedestrians attempting to cross the street to the Post Office during high traffic periods. A close look at this intersection reveals that the streets are not aligned, thus increasing the complexity of the situation. The natural reaction is to think in terms of placing traffic lights to provide control of the many movements. A minimum of two lights would be required at both Church Street entrances. I have been advised that the cost to install a three-traffic light system for this location would be approximately \$15,000. This cost does not include engineering and management aspects of the project.


Several traffic studies have been conducted, the last one in 1997. This study recognized the heavy congestion at the intersection as a serious problem, especially as it affected pedestrians crossing Lawyers Road to the Post Office. A traffic signal was discussed at that time as an alternative but was rejected along with a stop sign on Lawyers. The study viewed these devices as not effective because they would contribute to heavy traffic backup onto Maple Avenue and possibly Church Street.

Last year the Lawyers Road and Church Street intersection, with no traffic light, ranked fourth in the number of traffic accidents in town with nine accidents. The signaled intersection at Maple Avenue and Courthouse Road/Lawyers Road had the most accidents (31), followed by Maple and Park (16), and Maple and Nutley (14). These statistics seem to indicate that intersections in town that have traffic lights to control traffic flow do not fare as well as the Vienna Post Office location at Lawyers and Church.

I hope this review of traffic conditions around the Post Office has been of some benefit. This area will continued to be reviewed by the Town Council and the Transportation Safety Commission. At this time the Commission is of the opinion that the recently installed bollards and striping should be tested for a year to see if the accident rate is reduced. Your input on this matter is welcomed and encouraged.

Dogs trained and serving as guide dogs for the blind, hearing dogs for the deaf or hearing impaired, and service dogs for the mobility impaired must be licensed but are exempt from the license tax.

TOWN OF VIENNA DOG LICENSE APPLICATION

Town of Vienna licenses are required for all dogs four months of age or older and must be renewed each year between November 1 and January 31. The cost of a license for a spayed/neutered dog is \$5.00. The cost of a license for a fertile dog (male or female) is \$10.00. Certification must be provided that the animal has been vaccinated against rabies and, for a \$5.00 license, neutered by a veterinarian or is infertile. Your certificate(s) will be returned with the tag.


