MAY 1994 – Last month's dedication ceremony and open house at the new police headquarters building, 215 Center St., S., attracted a large turnout of residents to tour the facility, the construction of which was stalled for many months due to delays caused by the original contractor for the project.

MAY 1984 – "ViVa! Vienna!" the first annual Town Festival sponsored by the Greater Vienna Chamber of Commerce and the Vienna Jaycees, will be held on Church Street on Sunday, May 27. Church Street will be closed between Laywers Road and Mill Street, turning it into a pedestrian mall filled with craft booths, music, refreshments, children's entertainment and a special Memorial Day ceremony. Proceeds from the festival will be used by the Jaycees to send mentally handicapped children to a special summer camp.

MAY 1974 – The Vienna Economic Policy Advisory Commission intends to survey the business community's problems, strengths and weaknesses and is seeking citizen input to help in establishing a viable economic policy for the town. The Commission was created by the Town Council to recommend long-range goals related to the economic growth and well-being of Vienna.

Recycle Motor Oil, Antifreeze, Batteries

The next quarterly recycling day for used motor oil, antifreeze and car batteries is Saturday, June 5, from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Northside Property Yard, 600 Mill St., N.E. This service of the Public Works Department provides citizens a convenient and environmentally responsible way to dispose of vehicle waste products. For more information, call 703-255-6381.

Too often, used oil is improperly poured down storm drains or into sewers. Just one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, releasing toxic metals such as lead, cadmium and arsenic into the environment. Recycled oil is a valuable resource that can be re-manufactured into new fuels.

Antifreeze, like oil, can contaminate water and should never be disposed of in drains or sewers. In addition, antifreeze stored around the house presents a great danger to children and pets; it tastes sweet but is deadly poison.

Improper disposal of automobile batteries is a leading cause of lead contamination in landfills and energy recovery facilities. In Virginia it is illegal to dispose of automobile batteries with refuse.

Police to Test New Emergency Notification System

Beginning the week of May 3, the Vienna Police Department will conduct the first official test of its new emergency notification system, also known as reverse 911. Called "The Communicator!," the technology was developed by Dialogic Communications Corp. and is designed to alert the local community automatically in an emergency situation such as a natural disaster or public health threat.

The test is necessary to ensure that the system is fully operational should an emergency actually occur. The system will deliver a detailed phone message informing residents they are listening to a test and will not be required to take any further steps.

Testing will take place by town quadrants in the evening between 6 and 9 p.m. Test dates for each quadrant are: northeast – week of May 3; southeast – week of May 11; northwest – week of May 19; southwest – week of May 26.

The system was acquired with a data base of the most current available phone listings for the Town of Vienna. However, if you do not receive a phone message during the testing week for your quadrant, please fill out the form below and return it to the Police Department. If you do not want to be notified in the event of an emergency, you can elect to opt out of the program by filling out the form and checking the opt out box.



Vienna Receives Budget Award

For the tenth consecutive year, the Town of Vienna has received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada. This award is the highest form of recognition for governmental budgeting. In order to receive the award, a jurisdiction must satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how well a government's budget serves as a policy document, a financial plan, an operations guide, and a communications device. Budget documents must be rated "proficient" in all of these categories to receive the award.

Town Has Top Bond Rating

The Town of Vienna's general obligation bonds are rated "Aa1" by Moody's Investors Service This high bond rating for a local government the size of Vienna is enjoyed by very few towns in the United States.

This rating enables the Town to finance debt at more favorable interest rates compared to those of municipalities with lower bond ratings, resulting in substantial savings for Vienna taxpayers over the life of the bonds.

Moody's noted that its high rating is based on Vienna's healthy economy, sound financial condition and rapid debt retirement.

The Town of Vienna borrows money by issuing tax-free general obligation bonds to finance major capital projects. The \$4.8 million of public improvements funded in the latest (2002) issue include acquisition of property at Maple Avenue and Mill Street for a Town Center Park and additional phases of the Maple Avenue Enhancement Project.

Debt financing spreads the cost of capital projects over a period of many years, rather than charging the full cost to today's taxpayers. Also, the Town's policy of using meals and lodging tax revenues for a large portion of annual debt amortization payments limits the need for property tax increases to fund these projects.

Town of Vienna, Virginia A Look at the Proposed Budget For Fiscal Year 2004-2005

MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN MANAGER

At the time the proposed Town budget was prepared, the uncertainty over the Commonwealth budget presented a problem in forecasting certain revenues for the 2004-05 fiscal year. We were forced to take a very conservative approach where state-shared revenues were concerned. The only "new" revenue source that has become available to us is the ability to levy a utility tax on cellular telephones, which would prevent Fairfax County from collecting the same tax from our residents and businesses.

The proposed FY 2004-05 General Fund budget is based on reducing the real estate property tax rate from 27%¢ to 26%¢. However, due to reassessments of properties, the 26%¢ rate represents an effective tax increase of 3.15%. The actual increase will vary by property depending on the percentage increase in the assessment, but the average homeowner in Town will experience an annual increase in the real estate tax bill of \$49.89. Total real estate assessments, including new construction, increased 10.24% in Town over calendar year 2003. With residents facing rising real estate taxes due to reassessment, it was our priority to attempt to lower the real estate tax rate as much as possible without compromising the level of service provided to our citizens. We have attempted to maintain all existing levels of service and, in some cases, increase funding in those areas identified as needing more resources to meet the requirements of residents and our departments. We have included funding for our annual market adjustment to certain employee salaries along with a 2% salary adjustment for all employees.

Proposed expenditures for the Water and Sewer Fund total \$5,173,300, an increase of \$151,300 or 3.0% over the previous year. Almost two-thirds of the increase is due to the higher costs of retirement contributions, health insurance, the cost of purchased water, and sewage treatment costs. Because of these rising costs, the severe reduction in billings caused by the abnormally high rainfall during the past year, and the need to maintain adequate reserves, we are recommending an increase in our water and sewer rates. We propose to increase the water rate for in-town customers from \$2.71 to \$2.83 per thousand gallons and the sewer rate from \$3.39 to \$3.57 per thousand gallons. Overall, a Town resident will pay an additional \$30 per year or just over 8¢ per day for water and sewer service based on a quarterly usage of 25,000 gallons. This represents an increase of 4.95% over current rates.

I invite you to read the entire budget message and proposed budget. The budget is available for public review at Town Hall and Patrick Henry Library. Citizens are also encouraged to attend the public hearing on the budget, which is scheduled for the Town Council meeting on Monday, May 10, beginning at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

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Budget Preparation And Adoption

The Code of the Town of Vienna requires that by July 1 of each year, the Vienna Town Council adopt by ordinance a budget establishing the tax rate for the incoming year. Estimated revenues must be equivalent to estimated expenditures. It is mandated in the Code that the fiscal year begin on July 1 and end on June 30.

At least one public hearing must be held on the budget prior to its adoption. Seven days prior to this hearing, the Town Clerk must publish a notice of Council's intention to hold such an event. The budget cannot be adopted at the same meeting at which the public hearing is held. Two notices, again at least seven days apart, must then be published in a paper of general circulation announcing Council's intention to adopt the budget. Following this advertisement, Council may then adopt the budget. After this action is taken, the Town Clerk publishes the final notice of adoption.

The Town of Vienna's budget process begins in January of each year when Council presents to the staff its budget priorities for the upcoming year. Citizens who have suggestions about what items should be given priority for funding are encouraged to express their views in writing to the Town Manager. In addition, non-profit Vienna organizations may apply for donations of Town funds.

The Town Manager then prepares and submits to the Town Council his proposed budget, and copies are made available to the public. This year, budget work sessions were scheduled for April 12 and 17 and, if needed, April 22. The public hearing on the proposed budget will be held at the Town Council meeting on May 10, which begins at 8 p.m. in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. If Council considers it necessary, a final budget work session to discuss comments made at the public hearing will be held on May 18. Adoption of the budget is scheduled for the June 7 Council meeting.



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Your Tax Dollars at Work — Budget Highlights

PUBLIC WORKS

In the street maintenance budget funding is proposed for street resurfacing and concrete repair/replacement at the same levels as in the FY 2003-04 budget. Funds are also included for silt removal from Wolftrap Creek along with other areas where buildup has occurred. Also included in this budget is \$17,250 to satisfy new federal permitting and state mandated storm water management program requirements. In the refuse disposal budget costs for disposal of trash, yard waste and brush are anticipated to increase by approximately \$36,000. The snow removal budget proposes the replacement of one snow plow and the purchase of two additional magnesium chloride distribution systems for ice control.

PARKS AND RECREATION

The Parks and Recreation Department had a very successful FY 2003-04 with expanded program offerings resulting in a sharp increase in revenues subject only to space availability. The department will continue



to offer more programs for the community, and FY 2004-05 will see the Parks Maintenance Division relocated to a permanent facility at the Nutley Street Property Yard. At Club Phoenix Teen Center new programs have been initiated such as the Summer Teen Excursion Camps as well as additional teen class offerings. Sponsorship opportunities are being developed with local businesses and service groups.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The addition of one employee is proposed in the Information Technology (IT) budget to meet the growing need for networking and general computer assistance. Interns are provided throughout the year through Northern Virginia Community College. During the past year the IT Administrator managed final installation of an I-Net fiber optic network to enable wide area network connectivity among Town buildings. The computer replacement program continues to be funded at the \$50,000 level to ensure timely replacement of departmental computers. Through this program the Town has been able to keep all computers and software current, and breakdowns have been held to a minimum. Funding has also been continued at \$59,000 for the future replacement of the financial systems.

VEHICLE & EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT

Funding for the Vehicle and Equipment Replacement Program would rise by \$20,542 to \$361,542. This is \$4,458 less than the

amount projected for FYE 2005 in the original plan. The plan continues to provide for replacement of the Town's vehicles and major equipment through four-year financing designed to level annual funding requirements from year to year and maintain the level of reserves required for debt service in future years. The Town continues to be successful in purchasing most replacement vehicles and equipment below budget estimates, thereby strengthening the fund for future years.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Funding has been included in the proposed budget for one additional officer in the Investigations Division to be assigned to the 10th/11th Districts Congressional Gang Task Force that was recently created to combat gang activity in Northern Virginia. It is anticipated that the costs related to this position will be funded by a federal grant; otherwise, the position will not be filled.

ADMINISTRATION

In the FY 2004-05 budget personnel related expenditures account for 70% of the total proposed General Fund budget. Health insurance costs continue to rise and are expected to increase by approximately 15% this year. Retirement related costs (Virginia Retirement System, Local Pension Funds) are expected to increase in FY 2004-05 by \$357,527 over FY 2003-04. In addition, the Town will be required to contribute to the Virginia Retirement System Life Insurance Program in the amount of \$100,160 for the first time in several years.

PROJECTED REVENUES

\$132,000 in General Fund revenues are included in the proposed budget, which is estimated to represent 8 months of receipts, from a utility tax to be imposed on cell phones. Vienna has been given authority to levy this tax by the General Assembly effective July 1, 2004. Once Vienna approves the tax, Fairfax County will no



longer receive the revenue from cell phone utility tax in Vienna. The end user will see no change in the monthly bill as the cellular providers will now remit the tax to Vienna rather than Fairfax County. Slow improvement in the local economy

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has allowed us to project higher revenues from sales, utilities and business license taxes. It is estimated that the Meals and Lodging Tax will generate \$2,000,000 in FYE 2005, an increase of \$158,000 or 8.5% over the preceding year. This increase is due to both the improving economy and the opening of several new restaurants in town. Revenue from this tax is used exclusively to retire debt used to fund the Town's capital improvements.
