OCTOBER 1994 – The Town Council has approved the final site plan for the expansion of Navy Federal Credit Union headquarters, 820 Follin Lane, S.E., in the Vienna Technology Park. NFCU will take several steps to offset increased traffic at the facility. including installation of a traffic light at Follin Lane and Echols Street. In addition to being the largest business in Vienna, NFCU is the nation's largest credit union.

OCTOBER 1984 - Maj. Donald G. Harper has been appointed Chief of the Vienna Police Department, effective upon his retirement from the Fairfax County Police Department. The Town Council unanimously selected Maj. Harper from among over 200 appli-

OCTOBER 1974 – The Town has filed a protest against the bureaucracy created by federal agencies. Most recently, a four-pound, 40-foot long form was received by the Town from the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. "We have no quarrel whatsoever with the intent of the legislation that brought about this form," said Town Manager C. Clay Harrell, "However, we are compelled to voice our complaints against the" volume of paper generated." The Town has received the assistance of U.S. Congressman Joel Broyhill to reduce the paper flood from across the river.



Time for Fall Leaf Pickup

Fall leaf collection will begin October 25 in north Vienna and October 29 on the south side of town. The complete schedule is given below.

ALL LEAVES MUST BE AT THE CURBSIDE PRIOR TO THE FIRST SCHEDULED COLLECTION DAY FOR EACH PASS THROUGH YOUR AREA. ONCE YOUR STREET HAS BEEN COVERED, CREWS WILL NOT DOUBLE BACK.

Department of Public Works crews using leaf vacuum machines will collect leaves that residents have raked to the curbside. If you miss your vacuum collection dates, the Public Works Department will still collect your leaves; however, the leaves must be bagged and placed at the curbside for pickup with your regular trash. Up to 20 bags of leaves will be picked up on any single refuse collection day throughout the year.

Please rake leaves just to the curbside, not into the street. Cars parked on leaf piles may catch on fire, and children playing in the leaves may be struck by a passing vehicle. Also, leaves may prevent rainwater from reaching stormwater inlets. Residents may wish to move vehicles off the street to avoid dust from the leaf vacuums when the weather is dry; the Town cannot be responsible for washing cars.

<u>Citizen Comment</u> More Comments on White Goods

A southwest Vienna resident writes: "I wholeheartedly agree with the resident who objects to the Town Council's arbitrary decision to discontinue the special pickup of 'white goods' because of a pitiful \$1 dump fee for each appliance. How much has this nominal fee really affected the budget of this relatively well-off community? If the Town's budget watchers are really so upset by this charge, why not simply add an additional \$1 surcharge to our property tax or water/sewer bill annually? That way, the Town budget would end up with an overall surplus and neither I nor the other residents of our community (I am sure) would have serious objections in the interest of the assurance of our continued special pickup services."

From another southwest quadrant resident: "In regards to the white goods decision to discontinue pickups in 2005, does this mean that Vienna does not have enough funding or staff for its continuation? I do not recall a reason given for this cutback. I believe that some municipal tax relief should be given to compensate for the added expense for personal disposal. Such unwelcome decisions should be decided in a referendum."

A resident in northeast Vienna writes: "As a Vienna resident for 40 years, I do wish that the Town Council would reconsider the white goods pickup. I seldom use the two free pickups a year but as I'm getting older and as the property ages, I'm sure I will soon be needing to replace many of the appliances or white goods items. As a senior citizen living on a limited income, it's not easy for me to haul anything to the curb, let alone pay to have someone haul things away."

Also from the northeast quadrant: "Admittedly, periodic unplanned special pickups of white goods are not cost efficient, but instead of unloading the chore on each citizen Vienna should allow pickup of white goods only on a designated day every two months. Each item would have a nominal cost, perhaps \$5 to \$10, which should offset most of the cost of the pickup. The Town budget can pick up the rest."

From southwest Vienna: "We would like to add our voices to support retention of the current method for disposal of 'white goods' by the Town. Although individual citizens may rarely need this service, it's nice to know it's available."

And last, from southeast Vienna: "I strongly agree with the comment in the September newsletter. The Vienna Department of Public Works should be allowed to continue the pick up of white goods. I do feel that the \$1 fee is not adequate. I would be happy to pay \$5 or \$10 to have an appliance that has cluttered my garage for several weeks removed."

Bicyclists Must Practice Sidewalk Etiquette

A special provision of the State Code allows bicycles to be ridden on sidewalks unless prohibited by the local jurisdiction. Children under 11 years old may ride a bicycle on any sidewalk in the Town of Vienna, and cyclists of any age may ride on the sidewalk wherever it is hazardous to ride in the roadway. Town ordinance requires bicyclists to yield the right-of-way to pedestrians on sidewalks at all times, and before overtaking and passing pedestrians cyclists must give an audible signal.

Vigilance Required to Protect Small-town Character

How did Vienna achieve and how does it manage to retain its small-town character in the midst of this area's rapid development? This is the question I am often asked by county residents outside of town. The short answer is simple – by having said a firm "no" to the frequent unsuitable rezoning requests prevalent from the 1950's to the mid-1980's, granting of which would have resulted in a town far different from the one we enjoy today.

But how many residents are still among us from those decades who remember the strong sense of purpose and commitment of time and energy that united residents and civic associations to actively involve themselves in town affairs, learn the issues, oppose unsuitable development and thereby bequeath to us the legacy that is the Vienna of today? I worry that after a 20-year respite from rezoning battles within and without our borders, we are so convinced the war is won that we have allowed complacency to overtake us.

Just the other side of the Vienna Metro station, the Fairlee project seeks an out-of-turn amendment to the Fairfax County comprehensive land use plan, and rezoning for 2,350 housing units, 300,000 square feet of office space and 25,000 to 75,000 square feet of retail and support services space. Little heed has been paid by County planners to its obvious traffic impact on Vienna despite vigorous objections from the Town Council and residents in our southwest quadrant. This project will be before the County Planning Commission October 14 and the Board of Supervisors October 18.

On our southeast border, the rezoning requested for the Wedderburn tract for more houses would, as proposed, have placed a cut-through traffic burden on town residents. They have become active and united in a way that revives the citizen spirit of past decades, and together with the Town Council have achieved a better traffic pattern for the development.

If this is not sufficient to arouse our interest, look toward Tysons Corner where

an approved 57-acre project will include residential, office and retail space in 8 high-rise buildings. And over at the mall, a major expansion underway includes an additional 3-story building, a parking deck, a 16-screen movie theater, 5 restaurants and 30 more retailers. By 2009, 1,300 residential units are planned for Westpark in anticipation of rail to Tysons Corner.

Meanwhile, here on our oasis there are issues we ought to be thinking about, even if they seem somewhat insignificant compared to what is taking place outside our borders. These include suggestions to raise the height limitations on buildings along Maple Avenue, thereby altering the low skyline many see as an important component of Vienna's small-town character; a possible townhouse rezoning request in the Historic District; and the problem of accomodating ever larger houses and additions to the maximum permitted square foot of lot coverage under current zoning. Since a sense of open space between dwellings has traditionally defined our residential areas, this is an issue that needs to be addressed and it will be studied by the Planning Commission in its review of Vienna's comprehensive land use plan.

I may sound like Chicken Little saying, "The sky is falling, the sky is falling"! All I am really trying to do is remind us that the town we have today was achieved only with citizen interest, involvement and input at both the Town and County levels. We seem to forget sometimes that we have the right not only to challenge the decisions of our Town Council, but also to question and challenge the Board of Supervisors. To roughly paraphrase Edmund Burke, all that is necessary for unfortunate events and decisions to adversely affect the town we have created is for all of us good citizens to do nothing. Please stay interested, informed and alert.

Fire Department Open House October 9

The Vienna Volunteer Fire Department will hold its annual Fire Prevention Week Open House on Saturday, October 9, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the fire station, 400 Center St., S. This year's theme is "Test Your Smoke Alarms," to highlight the importance of installing and maintaining smoke alarms in the home.

Open house activities will include home fire escape planning, practice spraying real fire hoses, kids' smoke maze, tours of fire engines and ambulances, fire prevention and safety brochures, blood pressure checks, prizes, refreshments and more.

Like other household appliances, smoke detectors are often taken for granted. Little attention is paid to them until tragedy strikes. But tragedy can be averted and lives saved with the help of properly installed and maintained smoke detectors. Battery-powered smoke detectors need to have the batteries replaced annually or when the battery alarm activates. Your Vienna Volunteer Fire Department encourages you to start a life-saving habit by replacing your battery in the fall when you change your-clocks. On October 31, when you change your clocks back from Daylight Savings Time, also change your smoke detector batteries.

Vienna Glass Celebrates 50th

On October 1, 1954, Vienna Glass Co. opened for business on Church Street. Founded by Charles Glaze, the business is now run by his sons, Rick and Ron, and son-in-law, Scott Williams. The company moved to Branch Road for several years and is now located at 204 Mill St., N.E., near the original location.

In the early years, Vienna Glass glazed all the Yeonas-built homes in Vienna Woods and most recently worked on the Vienna Marketplace at Maple Avenue and Park Street. Although the company focuses on commercial storefronts, it retains a retail counter for local residents who need mirrors, windows, tabletops or shower enclosures.

Town Residents Pay County Personal Property Tax, but Don't Need Decal

Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals are renewed every year on April 15. Fairfax County personal property tax is due every year on October 5, and Fairfax County motor vehicle decals are also renewed at that time. If you live within the town limits you only need a Vienna decal, NOT a Fairfax County decal. So, if you have a valid 2004 Vienna decal, it is good until April 15, 2005.

If you have recently moved to Vienna and need to register your vehicles, or if you have new vehicles to register, please note that Vienna vehicle decals are reduced to half price on October 1 each year, and further reduced to one-third price on January 15. The charges are:

Monday, October 4, is the last day to register to vote in the November 2 general election. Registration applications are available at various locations around the county, including the Town Clerk's Office at Vienna Town Hall, and may also be downloaded from the County Web site, www.co.fairfax.va.us/eb.

To be eligible to vote, you must be a U.S. citizen, a Virginia resident, and at least 18 years old on or before election day. If you are already a registered voter, no additional registration is required for this election; however, you should check your voter registration card to be sure it lists your current address and update it if necessary.

No Campaign Signs in Right-of-way





Make a Capitol Holiday Tree Ornament

A 70-foot red spruce from Virginia's George Washington National Forest has been selected as the 2004 Capitol Holiday Tree. This is the first time Virginia has provided the holiday tree that will adorn the front lawn of the U.S. Capitol in Washington, D.C. The theme for

this year's Holiday Tree is "From Virginia – Birthplace of Presidents."

Ornaments for the Capitol Holiday Tree and 60-80 smaller "Companion Trees" will showcase Virginia's history, natural resources, agricultural products, cultural diversity and heritage. Vienna area schools have already received information about the project. Design criteria, sample ornaments and entry forms are also available at www.capitolholi.ng/. All ornaments must be received by October 22.

Every child under the age of 18 who submits an ornament will be eligible for a random drawing for a free trip to Washington, D.C., to attend the Capitol Holiday Tree lighting ceremony and reception in early December along with two parents/guardians. It is tradition that the chosen student will help the Speaker of the House of Representatives "flip the switch" that will turn on over 10,000 lights and make the ornaments shine. In addition, a teacher or leader (scouts, church group, etc.) who assists a child in making an ornament will also be eligible for a free trip.

The tree will travel to 34 communities throughout the Commonwealth so that all Virginians will have a chance to see the tree before it goes to Washington, D.C. The Town of Vienna is the last stop on the route to the Capitol. A truck carrying the tree will arrive around 4:30 p.m. Sunday, December 5, and park in front of the Freeman House on Church Street, N.E. The Town is planning a "Capitol Holiday Tree Festival" from 6 to 8 p.m. to give residents a chance to see the giant spruce up close and enjoy holiday music and revelry.

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
