#### PROGRESS REPORT

#### ROAD REPAIRS

The following streets will be resurfaced this month. Work on some is already in progress:

Spring St. - Moore to Battle Battle St. - Spring to Cottage Hillcrest Dr. - Meadow Lane to Tapawingo Marshall Rd. - Lynn to Hillcrest Cottage St. - Elm to Moore Mill St. - Ayr Hill to end

Drivers in these areas are asked to have patience while necessary repairs are underway.

## SEWER CONNECTIONS

The end of the County sewer moratorium means that emergency cases requiring immediate action because of overflowing septic fields, can now get their needed connections.

## BOWMAN PROPERTY ACQUIRED

Vienna has purchased the Bowman property, which is located on Center Street and separated from Town Hall by the Medical Center.

The location which is convenient to Town Hall, the Community Center and the Fire Department, is an ideal location for the future expansion of Town facilities.

## LIBRARY

Residents who have been putting up with the increasingly crowded conditions at the Branch Library will be heartened to see that preliminary work is well underway at the site of the new Library on Maple Ave. at Center.

### SPEED



Radar has been in frequent use in the Town this summer. Police reports reveal that the majority of violations have occurred on Nutley Road. Arrests in June totalled 93 as compared to 39 for the same period last year.

Council has requested the continued use of radar to insure greater safety on our streets.

The Highway Safety Commission has made a study of Vienna speed limits. indicating the possible advisability of raising limits on some major roads. The report is now under consideration by Council.

Although speed on residential streets is one of the greatest sources of citizen complaints, official clockings have not substantiated the complaints. Residents are asked to remember that to a person standing still, a car doing 25 m.p.h. can seem to be going much faster. Noise does not necessarily indicate speed, but often means a defective muffler. Cars can be made to "burn rubber" while not exceeding speed limits.

## DOGS



Residents are reminded that all dogs must be licensed. Rabies tags are necessary before a license is issued. Fairfax County has authorized Dog Wardens to knock on dog owners' doors to check on dog licenses.

## POOL HITS SNAG

The acquisition of a small piece of land necessary to the construction of the pool has encountered unexpected difficulties, causing further construction delays. The pool may have to be relocated.

meeting of the Vienna Town Council. Mini-Bikes are illegal on public roads

and sidewalks. Previously, they had been ridden chiefly along the W&OD railroad right-of-way, without authorization.

TOWN AUTHORIZES MINI-BIKE TRAIL

Owners of the bikes will be required to have a permission slip signed by parents. These slips may be obtained from the Community Center and when returned to the Center, will entitle the mini-bike owner to a permit allowing him to ride on designated paths.

No use of mini-bikes or other motorized equipment will be allowed in areas where play equipment is set up, or which are used as playgrounds by younger children.

The permit application which is to be signed by both bike rider and a parent, sets forth rules of safety to be followed, and frees the Town from responsibility in case of injury or accident. Permits must be carried by the mini-bike rider and may be revoked if the rider fails to operate his vehicle in a safe and courteous manner.

The program will be under the direction of Judson Hockman, Director of Recreation. Other paths may be made available at a future date, if the need arises. At the present time, the number of mini-bikes owned within the Town has not been determined.

# POLLUTION HINTS

Recent atmospheric conditions have dramatically pointed out the immediate dangers of air pollution. Fishing bans in many areas of the country, as well as the possibility of health warnings on frequent consumption of fish, have made us conscious of our water pollution, as have area sewer moratoriums.

What can we do. A few suggestions have been offered by National authorities:

- 1. Don't idle your car. Car pool when possible. Learn to walk short distances instead of driving.
- 2. Don't burn outdoors.
- 3. Don't buy things in heavy plastic containers or colored paper products which release toxic gases when burned.
  - 4. Buy only returnable bottles.
  - 5. Use only approved pesticides.
