APRIL 1997 – Young artists will display their work throughout the school year in the lobby of the Vienna Post Office. April will feature students from James Madison High School, thanks to art teacher Joanne Ramsey.

APRIL 1987 - The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority is asking for volunteers to assist in planting forsythia along the W&OD Trail April 4. The Park Authority has purchased 40,000 small forsythia plants to use as landscaping along the trail.

APRIL 1977 - Fairfax County Circuit Court Judge Thomas J. Middleton has issued a Writ of Mandamus ordering the Town of Vienna to approve the site plan for a sevenstory office building at 301 Maple Ave., W. Judge Middleton's order is based on Virginia judicial precedents which hold that after a developer has made substantial commitments based on existing zoning, then, in effect, his project may not be defeated by subsequent zoning changes. The project has been vigorously opposed by residents of the Windover Avenue neighborhood on the grounds that it would substantially deteriorate the abutting residential area and that the resulting traffic congestion would be intolerable.

APRIL 1967 – April 15 has been designated as kick-off day for the "My Kind of Town - Vienna" campaign. A Clean-up Parade led by the Town Council and the Vienna Jaycees will sweep Maple Avenue from Lawyers Road to Glyndon Street beginning at 11 a.m., followed by marching units and decorated cars. Campaign mascot Egbert the Elf will be in the parade, too, in a cart drawn by his friend, Agnes the goat.

Water Main Flushing

Water mains are flushed each spring beginning in early April to maintain a high standard of water quality and to ensure proper and efficient operation of the fire hydrants. Some discoloration and sediment in the water may be noticed, but these conditions are not harmful and should be of short duration. Information Meeting April 13 on Beulah Road Project

The Town of Vienna will hold a public meeting on the Virginia Department of Transportation's (VDOT) Beulah Road improvement project beginning at 7 p.m. Friday, April 13, in the Council Chamber at Town Hall.

The following VDOT representatives are expected to attend:

- The Design Project Manager will discuss the project scope and current status.
- The Construction Administrator will introduce the VDOT construction staff and the Project Manager who will be in charge of the job.
- The Project Manager will provide information about the project schedule and emergency contact numbers and introduce the Contractor and Contractor's staff.
- The Contractor will discuss hours of operation, location of the project trailer, and additional contact information.

WHAT'S BEING DONE?

The existing two-lane roadway from Maple Avenue to Sideling Court will be improved by reconstructing the pavement and installing new drainage, curb and gutter, and sidewalk.

WHY IS THE ROAD BEING IMPROVED?

Beulah Road is an urban minor arterial road and a major commuter and transit access to the shopping and business districts of Vienna and the surrounding area. Increasing traffic volume over the years has caused the road to deteriorate beyond repair so that a complete reconstruction is necessary.

The Vienna Town Council recognized the need for the improvements and on November 6, 1995, the Town requested VDOT to develop a plan to complete the project with the least disruption to the existing trees lining the roadway. The design process included a public hearing held on January 21, 2003. The Town Council passed a resolution on October 27, 2003, approving the project.

PROJECT FEATURES

The width of the reconstructed Beulah Road will comprise two 12-foot travel lanes, a 2-foot curb and gutter, a 2-foot buffer strip, and a 5-foot sidewalk. Improvements will also include the reconstruction of street intersections and entrances, and horizontal and vertical improvements for sight distance. The approach to Maple Avenue will continue to include a left-turn lane. Parking will not be permitted on Beulah Road upon completion of the project.

Stormwater run-off will be contained in a new pipe conveyance system that will eliminate the roadside ditches that currently exist. An underdrain system will help to drain the subgrade and extend the life of the pavement. (continued on page 2)

During construction of the project, traffic flow will be maintained through the use of detours. Access to adjacent property owners will be maintained at all times during construction and every effort will be made to minimize inconvenience to the public. The estimated completion date is May 30, 2008.

PROJECT COST

The Beulah Road project is identified in the VDOT Six-Year Improvement Program. It is funded through \$5,691,000 in state funds and \$128,000 in matching Town funds.

Storm Drains Aren't Trash Cans!

When it rains, the water that runs down your street "disappears" down the storm drains. Have you ever stopped to wonder where the water goes? Storm drains do not lead to wastewater treatment facilities. Any substance that goes into the storm drain goes directly into a local stream and eventually makes its way into the Chesapeake Bay.

Items typically placed in storm drains include:

- Motor oil, antifreeze, paint These substances can damage and kill underwater vegetation and aquatic life as well as the birds and animals that feed on them.
- Animal waste Dumped into a storm drain or left on the ground to run off with the next rain, animal waste contains bacteria that are harmful to the environment.
- Yard waste Once in the water, leaves and other yard waste decompose rapidly, adding excessive nutrients.
- Plastic and foam containers These items do not decompose and can kill wildlife that eat or become entangled in them.

Help save the Chesapeake Bay. Never dump anything down a storm drain.

Five Vienna Police Officers Receive Valor Awards

Five Vienna police officers were recognized at the 2007 Valor Awards ceremony held March 1. Valor Awards, the highest honor bestowed upon Fairfax County's public safety and law enforcement personnel, are presented annually by the Fairfax County Chamber of Commerce. The awards pay tribute to members of the Fairfax County, Town of Vienna and Town of Herndon Police Departments as well as the County Sheriff's Office and the County Fire & Rescue Department who have gone "above and beyond" the call of duty.

Vienna's award recipients include:

Master Police Officer Trent H. Nelson – Officer Nelson was on routine patrol when he received a call that a man was having a heart attack. As he arrived on the scene, he saw two men dragging a third man, who appeared lifeless, out of a van and into the street. The men did not speak English, but it was clear that the victim was not breathing and had no pulse. After an unsuccessful attempt at CPR, MPO Nelson retrieved the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) from his cruiser and administered a shock, then continued CPR until Rescue arrived and transported the man to the hospital where he eventually recovered.

Sergeant Michael R. Reeves and Officer Christopher W. Shaver – Sgt. Reeves was the first to respond to a report of a man threatening suicide with a knife. He found the man outside an apartment building with the knife pressed to his abdomen and making sawing motions back and forth. The man warned Sgt. Reeves to stay away or he would kill himself. Officer Shaver then appeared on the scene, startling the man. Seeing him temporarily distracted, Sgt. Reeves deployed his taser, hitting the man in the chest and the index finger of the hand holding the knife. The man dropped to the ground where Officer Shaver quickly disarmed him.

Sergeant Jamie L. Smith and Officer First Class Jarod B. Evans – Sgt. Smith was on patrol when he got a call about a person at a house unconscious from a drug overdose. On arrival, he announced himself as a police officer and followed a voice calling for help from a hallway where he found a man on his knees holding a woman's head in his hands as she lay motionless on her back. Officer Evans then arrived and together the officers administered CPR until a pulse returned and continued rescue breathing until the woman could breathe on her own. Shortly thereafter Rescue arrived to transport the woman, who had a severe cocaine and heroin addiction as well as Hepatitis C.




