JUNE 1997 – Aggressive drivers beware! In response to concerns expressed by citizens during several recent "traffic calming" meetings, the Town of Vienna has intensified its enforcement against serious traffic violations, in particular, speeding, red light and stop sign violations. Chief of Police Dan Boring has implemented this program of traffic calming through enforcement as a means to curb the multitude of aggressive driving violations that occur daily as a traffic volume many times in excess of Vienna's population flows through both the business and residential sections of town.

JUNE 1987 – Longtime resident William Moran will present a demonstration and display of his handmade stringed instruments at the Freeman House on June 14. Moran uses 100-year old wood, some of which he gathered from the Freeman House during its restoration in 1976 and from the attic of his own home on Mill Street, N.E. Some of the wood came from the old sawmills for which Mill Street was named.

JUNE 1977 – An ordinance designed to control the number of adult book stores and adult theaters allowed in Vienna was adopted by the Town Council at its June 6 meeting. Under the provisions of the ordinance, any adult book store or theater would have to be a conditional use in the C-2 commercial zone. Establishments could not be within 1,000 feet of a school or church. Vienna's ordinance makes it nearly impossible for an adult book store or theater to locate here.

Yard Sale Reminder

Each household in town may hold two yard sales per year. No permit is required. Signs advertising yard sales may not be exhibited more than two days prior to the start of the sale and are not permitted on public property, in the public right-of-way (10 feet from the curb or edge of pavement) or on utility poles. Don't Block Driveways

The Town Code prohibits stopping, standing or parking in front of a public or private driveway. Next time you park on the street, look in front of and behind your vehicle to make sure you are not blocking someone's driveway. Your neighbors will appreciate it!

Public Kickoff Meeting for Traffic-calming Study

Vienna's Transportation Safety Commission will host the public kickoff meeting for a townwide traffic-calming study at 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 26, in the Council Chamber at Town Hall. At the meeting, the firm of ATCS, P.L.C., contracted by the Town Council in January to conduct the traffic-calming study, will discuss the overall goals of the study and gather input from residents regarding their traffic concerns.

The traffic-calming study will include all streets in town, including those that already have traffic-calming measures in place, and will address traffic flow, cut-through traffic, pedestrian safety, the impact of MetroWest and other developments in the area, and other factors. The study will quantify and evaluate problems, propose solutions, and develop cost estimates. After a draft report is submitted, additional public meetings will be held before a final plan is approved by the Town Council.

Community Beautification Commission – created to act as the focal point for beautification and litter control programs.

Town Green Is for Everyone

The Town Green — I love how that sounds. After many years in the planning and many months under construction, the Town Green has been dedicated and is open for all to use and enjoy.

The credit for making this oasis in the center of our town goes to many people. Former Mayor Charles A. Robinson, Jr., and the Council recognized a need for some green space in the center of town years ago. Two locations were considered: the corner where Urgent Medical Care is now located and the Whole Foods property. Both negotiations came to nothing.

In 1999 former Councilman Albert J. Boudreau asked the Council to consider purchasing the property on Maple Avenue at Mill Street and the W&OD Trail. The Mayor and Council moved forward and the property was acquired in July 2001. A perfect location, next to the W&OD Trail, adjoining the historic Freeman House and right in the heart of Vienna!

The building space was leased out for several years (with all the rental income going toward the construction of the Town Green). At last, in the summer of 2005, a design firm was selected, the building

came down, and work began.

Many people had the foresight and vision for this addition to Maple Avenue: Mayor Charles A. Robinson, Jr., former Council members Steven D. Briglia, Albert J. Boudreau, Robert P. McCormick, Vincent J. Olson and Sydney H. Verinder, and current Council members Laurie Genevro Cole, Edythe Frankel Kelleher, George E. Lovelace, Michael J. Polychrones, Maud F. Robinson and Daniel M. Dellinger.

U.S. Congressman Tom Davis, State Senator Jeannemarie Devolites-Davis and State Delegate Steve Shannon were able to obtain funds to help finance the construction.

Town Manager John Schoeberlein and the Town staff were instrumental in the planning and building of the Town Green. Director of Parks and Recreation Cathy Salgado, who served as project manager, was on the job daily. She and her staff were responsible for the very successful dedication ceremony, the program entertainment, food, and goody bags everyone took home.

Real Estate Tax Due Next Month

The first installment on 2007 Town of Vienna real estate tax bills is due on July 30. Mailed payments must be postmarked on or before that date to avoid penalties and interest. If your Vienna taxes are paid through your mortgage company and you receive the tax bill, please notify your mortgage company immediately. If you have sold the property and are not responsible for the tax bill you receive, please notify the real estate office immediately.

To pay by credit card online, go to www.viennava.gov/Town_Departments/onlinepay.htm. To pay by phone with a credit card, call 1-888-2PAYTAX (1-888-272-9829) and use the Jurisdiction Code 1094 for real estate. Make sure you record the confirmation number given to you at the end of the transaction, as this will serve as your proof of payment.

Virginians Can Order Special Vienna License Plate

A special license plate has been designed for Vienna featuring a full-color rendering of Town Hall in the center of the plate and the words "Town of Vienna" at the bottom. The special Vienna license plate is not limited to town residents; any vehicle registered in Virginia may display the plate. The Virginia Department of Motor Vehicles will issue the special plate once 350 prepaid orders have been received. Application forms are available in the Finance Department at Town Hall, DMV customer service centers, and at the DMV Web site, www.dmv.state.va us. The annual fee for the special plate is \$25, plus \$10 extra for personalized plates, in addition to the regular DMV registration.

2006 Crime Statistics Reflect Trends in Fairfax County

The most notable category in the Vienna Police Department's crime statistics for 2006 is the increase in robbery cases from a total of four in 2005 to a total of twelve in 2006, eight of them bank robberies. According to Police Chief Bob Carlisle's report to the Town Council, this number of robberies is very unusual for the town but corresponds to the 126% increase in bank robberies reported by Fairfax County. "It is important to note that this increase is not in character with general crime levels in our town and is consistent with the increase we have noted in this crime category in the larger population that surrounds us," Chief Carlisle wrote.

Misdemeanor crimes decreased by 18% with significant reductions in simple assault and driving while intoxicated offenses. The general upward trend in calls for service continued with a 12% increase to 12,849 calls. Total traffic accidents remained almost flat with a 1% increase. Overall, the 2006 crime summary is "a mixed report," noted the Chief, but "for a jurisdiction of our size and proximity these numbers are indicative of a very safe community. I believe they reflect the commitment of our employees and citizens to work together to make the town a very safe place in which to live and work."

Vienna Names in the News

Community Services Officer Virginia Palmore is retiring after more than 21 years with the Vienna Police Department. She is the first female retiree. Officer Palmore is well known to many town residents for her involvement with the Neighborhood Watch program, self-defense training for women, drug awareness education in the schools, bike safety rodeos, the Cops and Kids run, and many more. Mayor Jane Seeman has proclaimed July 1 as "Virginia Palmore Day" to recognize her contributions to the town.

Share the Trail

Tips for W&OD Trail users from the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority

- Walkers and runners have the rightof-way over skaters and bicyclists.
- Move slowly when the trail is congested or when passing.
- * Always look ahead for obstacles such as gates, potholes, other trail users, etc.
 - Obey traffic signs.
 - Do not use the trail after dark.
- Avoid areas that may offer concealment to potential assailants.
- Cross roads only at designated crossings; look both ways before crossing.
- Do not use headphones at a high volume.
- Give an audible warning before passing.
- Do not block the trail when stopped. Move all equipment to the side, away from traffic.
- Report suspicious or dangerous behaviors to the police. Call 911 for emergencies.
 Always keep a maximum distance
- from others when passing.
