OCTOBER 1997 – The Vienna Police Department's 50th anniversary gala dinner dance will be held October 18 at Westwood Country Club. The department will also hold an open house at police headquarters where golden anniversary commemorative items are for sale, including T-shirts, sweatshirts, mugs, baseball caps, and lapel pins, to benefit the Vienna Police Association.

OCTOBER 1987 – Gregory M. Hembree has been selected as Vienna's first Director of Planning and Zoning. This new department will incorporate the functions of the previously separate Planning and Zoning Offices. His first day on the job will be October 8. The new Department of Planning and Zoning was created to provide improved analysis of new developments and proposals for redevelopment and to strengthen enforcement of existing zoning regulations.

OCTOBER 1977 – Fairfax County planning staff members will be present at the October 3 Town Council meeting to explain the proposed Tysons II development and the related traffic problems. The Town Council has expressed great concern over the very substantial increase in traffic on Route 123 that such a development would generate. Council has urged the County Board of Supervisors that any final approval of Tysons II include conditions and agreements that the additional traffic will not aggravate the existing rush hour congestion on Route 123, when cars are often backed up bumper to bumper from the Tysons Corner area to the town limits.

Personal Property Tax Deadline

Town of Vienna residents pay Fairfax County personal property tax on motor vehicles, due every year on October 5. The current tax rate is \$4.57 per \$100 of assessed value. New residents or those registering a vehicle for the first time must file a personal property vehicle registration form within 60 days of purchase or entry into the County.

Town residents must continue to purchase Town of Vienna motor vehicle decals until April 15, 2008, when decals will no longer be required. If you have recently moved to Vienna and need to register your vehicles, or if you have new vehicles to register, please note that Vienna vehicle decals are reduced to half price on October 1 each year, and further reduced to one-third price on January 15.

Residents are reminded that Town vehicle registrations can be transferred for only \$1 upon presentation of the old decal.

Time for Fall Leaf Pickup

Fall leaf collection will begin October 22 in south Vienna and October 26 on the north side of town. The complete schedule is given below.

ALL LEAVES MUST BE AT THE CURBSIDE PRIOR TO THE FIRST SCHEDULED COLLECTION DAY FOR EACH PASS THROUGH YOUR AREA. ONCE YOUR STREET HAS BEEN COVERED, CREWS WILL NOT DOUBLE BACK.

Department of Public Works crews using leaf vacuum machines will collect leaves that residents have raked to the curbside. If you miss your vacuum collection dates, the Public Works Department will still collect your leaves; however, the leaves must be bagged and placed at the curbside for pickup with your regular trash. Up to 20 bags of leaves will be picked up on any single refuse collection day throughout the year.

Please rake leaves just to the curbside, not into the street. Cars parked on leaf piles may catch on fire, and children playing in the leaves may be struck by a passing vehicle. Also, leaves may prevent rainwater from reaching stormwater inlets. Residents may wish to move vehicles off the street to avoid dust from the leaf vacuums when the weather is dry; the Town cannot be responsible for washing cars.


- Approved the rental of storage space for Town records from United Storage of Vienna at a cost not to exceed \$28,872.
- Increased the cigarette tax from 50¢ to 75¢ per pack.

AUGUST 20, 2007

- Conducted a closed session to discuss assignments, promotions and salaries of Town employees.
- Conducted a public hearing on a proposed amendment to the subdivision ordinance to require completion of sidewalks for certain single-lot developments.
- Following a public hearing, extended until September 1, 2012, the Town's tax exemption program for certain rehabilitated real property.
- Directed publication of the delinquent real estate tax list for fiscal year 2007. The list will be posted on the Town's Web site and entered into Fairfax County records. Taxes delinquent for more than two years will be recorded as liens against the properties.
- Approved the installation of a crosswalk on Malcolm Road, N.W., at Orchard Street.
- Approved the day after Christmas 2008 and the day after New Year's Day 2009 as Town employee holidays.

Applications may be submitted by non-profit community organizations any time through November. Banner space will be awarded in December via a lottery. Each banner will be displayed for two weeks.



Voter Registration Deadline Oct. 9

Tuesday, October 9, is the last day to register to vote in the November 6 general election. Registration applications are available at various locations around Fairfax County, including the Town Clerk's Office at Town Hall, and may also be downloaded from the County Web site, www.fairfaxcounty.gov/eb.

To be eligible to vote, you must be a U.S. citizen, a Virginia resident and at least 18 years old on or before election day.

If you are already a registered voter, you should check your voter registration card to be sure it lists your current address and update it if necessary. You can submit your notice of change of name and/or address either by mail (12000 Government Center Parkway, Suite 323, Fairfax, Virginia 22035-0081) or by fax (703-324-2205). In either case, the notice must include your signature to be valid. Notice cannot be made by telephone or by e-mail. After your change is processed, you will be mailed a new Voter Information Card.

The deadline to submit an application to vote absentee by mail or fax is Tuesday, October 30.

No Campaign Signs in Right-of-way

The Department of Planning and Zoning reminds candidates for public office and their supporters that it is unlawful to place campaign signs on street lights, utility poles, markers or other signs, or to place a sign within ten feet of the curb or edge of pavement. Property owners may erect signs for the candidates of their choice on their own property, and signs may be placed on other private property with the owner's permission.

Comment from the Council Table

Our Neighborhoods — Our Backbone

Vienna is more than a collection of people and buildings. Rather it is a mosaic of neighborhoods. Essentially, our neighborhoods represent the building blocks and glue that define the town. Our neighborhoods comprise residents who have lived here over 50 years as well as those who have moved here recently. As I talk to residents around town, both newcomers and long-time residents, all clearly indicate that they chose Vienna as a place to live and raise their children because of its small-town character.

The health of the town depends on the vitality of the neighborhoods. Neighborhood pride is demonstrated by wellmaintained properties, changing home styles, families in the parks, street improvements, and a sense of safety. Maintaining this atmosphere is critical to the continued vitality of neighborhoods and ultimately the town as a whole. Citizens have assumed the responsibility to make sure it stays that way. The neighborhood watch programs, block parties, volunteers in the youth sports programs, arts and craft opportunities, support of the library, churches, schools, and service organizations demonstrate their resolve.

Neighborhoods look to the town government for support in the way of events, communications, planning, infrastructure, recreation, and public safety. Citizens expect to be heard on issues that affect the neighborhoods. The tenacity of residents committed to ensuring that Vienna remains primarily residential is constantly demonstrated. Recently, a group of residents spoke clearly and in numbers, offering their opinions about a proposed development to be inserted into their neighborhood. The residents' voices were heard, and the development was unanimously rejected by the Council.


There are challenges. The primary challenge has been the arrival of McMansions, which provided impetus to overall change in the neighborhoods. This was the second change that I experienced, the first coming in the late 1960s to the mid-1970s when small cottages were replaced by larger two-story single-family homes;

McMansions added another story. The significant factor in each change is that the residential zoning code has not changed in a meaningful way. This code is the foundation for the policy to maintain Vienna as a single-family residential community in all of our neighborhoods.

The inflow of McMansions into the neighborhoods pumped up property values. For many, it proved to be a good thing. For others, particularly long-time residents who intend to remain in their homes, rising property values proved to be a burden. Some have left. Overall, the community has accepted this change as good. Our neighborhoods, although changed, have brought new families who believe in the small-town character of Vienna. They have become participating and valued citizens.

As the housing stock changes, the town government faces the challenge to ensure that new houses meet the building code, particularly building height, setbacks, and lot coverage. I recently accompanied members the Town's Planning and Zoning and Public Works staffs to observe how we ensure the Town's building code is met. On site, physical measurements were made to verify setback, lot coverage and adherence to the lot grading plan approved by Public Works. Building height measurements are taken from engineering drawings provided by the developer. In order to assure our citizens of building height compliance, we will have to adjust our methods for verifying the height measurements.

Stormwater runoff from newly constructed McMansions has had in some cases a deleterious effect on the Town's infrastructure. We are challenged to address stormwater runoff at the construction stage. One way to approach this issue is to assess the first floor height of the property adjacent to the planned new construction as well as other houses along the street. The approved grading plan for the new house would adhere to the grade in the area. In upcoming work sessions the Town staff and the Council will determine how these issues will be best accomplished.

Another challenge is improved communications with town citizens. The widespread use of the Internet might make the delivery of news, events and other areas of citizen interest more efficient over this medium. Also, infrastructure maintenance, particularly street and water and sewer maintenance, must continue to be a high priority.

The future of our neighborhoods is dependent upon our ability to resist relaxing restrictions as outlined in the residential zoning code. Current residential development is now at the limit of the code. We must resist proposed changes that purport to take us to the "next level." Pressure on residential zoning can come from several directions, for example, blighted properties. There are several areas in Vienna where properties are old but they have not fallen to the condition of being blighted. Usually, properties such as these are purchased by developers and become candidates for infill development. Another scenario might be applications from developers for townhouse/condo units in residential zones requiring a rezoning. The historic district must be protected from the pressure to change zoning categories.

My goal in writing this article was to point out how valuable neighborhoods are to our town. Keeping Vienna a residential community is the vision of founding citizens and elected officials. I believe that strong, vibrant neighborhoods are the backbone of this community. I look forward to hearing from you on any matter, especially matters that will aid in the improvement of Vienna.

Tax Exemption Available to Homeowners for Improvements

The Town provides a partial real estate tax exemption to property owners for the renovation, rehabilitation or replacement of certain residential structures. The Town Council recently approved the extension of this program until September 1, 2012.

For single-family homes, the following requirements must be met in order to qualify for the exemption:

- 1. The structure must be at least 25 vears old.
- 2. The improvements must increase the assessed value of the structure by a minimum of 25%.
- 3. The improved structure may not exceed the total square footage of the footprint of the original structure by more than 30% and may not cause lot coverage of the site to exceed 25%.
- 4. A building permit must be obtained before any construction begins and a certificate of occupancy issued for the completed work. Property owners will apply for the tax exemption at the same time they apply for the building permit.

The exemption will run for ten years at 100%, with the exemption percentage tapering down to zero over the next four years. The exemption is non-transferable between owners.
